Judge yourself, not others

Father Benedict was sentenced to death in 1966 for the murder of a widow on the basis of "circumstantial evidence." However, on hearing the appeal he was acquitted for lack of evidence. All the same, the label "murderer" was stuck to the priest. Even movies were made based on the assumption that the priest was the murderer. But after 34 years of a reputation as a "murderer", his innocence was revealed through the confession of the true culprits. In the year 2000, a 93-year-old woman approached him pleading forgiveness and mercy. It was her doctor husband who carried out a forced abortion on the victim at the insistence of a rich man who was responsible for the poor widow's pregnancy. When the widow in question died during the abortion bid, they dumped the body in a riverside and set Fr Benedict up as the murderer. Though Fr Benedict well knew who set him up and who the real criminal was, he did not reveal it to the court or anyone else, because there was confessional secret involved. Till his death a year later, Fr Benedict did not complain at all about his suffering or injustice. Though late, people now realise how wrong they were to accuse Fr Benedict of the murder.



It is human nature to be judgemental of others and fail to own up to our own sins and failures. There would be a lot of peace and joy if only we all were prepared to own up to our sins and failure. Jesus' opponents were setting up a trap for him when they brought the woman caught in adultery for him to Judge. If Jesus was to approve of capital punishment for the woman, he would have been violating Roman law which reserved such judgements to Roman officials. If Jesus asked the people to set her free, they would have questioned him about the duty of a Jew to follow the Law of Moses which prescribed capital punishment for adultery. Jesus took them from the level of judging others to a different level; the need for mercy and compassion. Instead of judging the woman, Jesus made the people examine their own conscience. Do not hurry into executing their so called 'justice'. That was his message. After all, our Father in heaven is patient and merciful and provides us opportunities to change. We may not always be capable of understanding other's lives. But we can always go to the depth of our own lives. And we should do it. The problem most times we have is that we are quick to judge others and unwilling or unable to understand our own lives properly. Even when you know you are set up, do not lose heart; trust in God and pray. God's mercy will open its door to you.



Choir Practice



Project Compassion: Sreymom's story - Cambodia

Education and training have helped Sreymom transform from an inexperienced young midwife into a confident healthcare worker. Now she has the skills to provide vital healthcare, support and information to indigenous mothers and children in remote Northeast Cambodia.

Sreymom, now 26, lives in the remote Mondulkiri province of Northeast Cambodia, where extreme poverty has led to many health issues for the region's indigenous population.

When she started work at the local Health Centre, Sreymom was eager to use her three years of midwife training to help care for indigenous mothers and children in the surrounding villages. But soon she realised she lacked the practical experience she needed to safely assist in childbirth. "When I had to assist a delivery," Sreymom recalls, "my body and knees were trembling. I was sweating and losing confidence."

Seeing Sreymom's difficulties – and her true potential – a local healthcare worker helped Sreymom to enroll in the Mondulkiri Community Health Program. Established by Caritas Cambodia and supported by Caritas Australia, the program empowers and trains local health centre staff in pre- and post-natal care, safe delivery practices and children's health.

The course not only improved Sreymom's skills as a midwife, but also gave her information on broader health issues, which she could take back to the indigenous women in her community.

These days, Sreymom delivers one or two babies each month and is trusted by the indigenous community. "If we did not have the program, more pregnant women would face death," Sreymom says. "I hope Australian people will support my communities more in building awareness in healthcare, hygiene, nutrition and sanitation."


Feasts of the Week.

17 March - St Patrick Born in Roman Britain around the end of the fourth century. Died in Ireland about the middle of the fifth century. Faced hardship as a missionary bishop in Ireland, and opposition even from his friends and fellow Christians. Yet worked to conciliate, to evangelise, and to educate local chieftains and their families. Remembered for his simplicity and pastoral care, for his humble trust in God, and for his fearless preaching of the gospel to those who had enslaved him in his youth. Specially honoured in Australia because the many Irish people who came to settle here brought with them the faith and zeal of Saint Patrick.



19 March - St Joseph, Husband of Mary A carpenter, though born of the royal house of David, Joseph was an upright man who, as husband of the Virgin Mary, cared for Mary and the child Jesus. Venerated in the East after the fourth century, and his cult flowered in the West during the fifteenth century, following the development of medieval nativity plays, the Christmas crib, and increased devotion to Mary. Join one hour adoration at 9AM-10 AM on this feast day

20 March - Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord Palm Sunday is the final Sunday of Lent, the beginning of Holy Week, and commemorates the triumphant arrival of Christ in Jerusalem, days before he was crucified. Palm Sunday is known as such because the faithful will often receive palm fronds which they use to participate in the re-enactment of Christ's arrival in Jerusalem. In the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a young donkey, and to the lavish praise of the townspeople who threw clothes, or possibly palms or small branches, in front of him as a sign of homage. This was a customary practice for people of great respect.



Palm branches are widely recognized symbol of peace and victory, hence their preferred use on Palm Sunday. The use of a donkey instead of a horse is highly symbolic, it represents the humble arrival of someone in peace, as opposed to arriving on a steed in war. A week later, Christ would rise from the dead on the first Easter.


