First Reading

Dt 8:2-3, 14-16

Moses said to the people: 'Remember how the Lord your God led you for forty years in the wilderness, to humble you, to test you and know your inmost heart – whether you would keep his commandments or not. He humbled you, he made you feel hunger, he fed you with manna which neither you nor your fathers had known, to make you understand that man does not live on bread alone but that man lives on everything that comes from the mouth of the Lord.

'Do not then forget the Lord your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery: who guided you through this vast and dreadful wilderness, a land of fiery serpents, scorpions, thirst; who in this waterless place brought you water from the hardest rock; who in this wilderness fed you with manna that your fathers had not known.'

Second Reading

1 Cor 10:16-17

The blessing-cup that we bless is a communion with the blood of Christ, and the bread that we break is a communion with the body of Christ. The fact that there is only one loaf means that, though there are many of us, we form a single body because we all have a share in this one loaf.

Gospel

Jn 6:51-58

Jesus said to the Jews:

'I am the living bread which has come down from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever; and the bread that I shall give is my flesh, for the life of the world.'

Then the Jews started arguing with one another: 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' they said. Jesus replied: 'I tell you most solemnly, if you do not eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood,

you will not have life in you. Anyone who does eat my flesh and drink my blood has eternal life, and I shall raise him up on the last day. For my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I live in him. As I, who am sent by the living Father, myself draw life from the Father, so whoever eats me will draw life from me. This is the bread come down from heaven; not like the bread our ancestors ate: they are dead, but anyone who eats this bread will live for ever.'

GOSPEL FOCUS

Real Presence

In the gospel passage, Jesus speaks a number of times about his followers eating his flesh and drinking his blood; "For my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink." In the Eucharist, we celebrate the 'real presence' of Jesus, understanding that bread and wine is changed into the body and blood of Christ. This change does not occur in a physical, observable way. The Church teaches that the 'substance' of bread and wine (what makes them bread and wine in essence) is changed but not the physical attributes. This is known as 'transubstantiation' – change of substance.

LIVING THE GOSPEL

Meals are very important events. Not only do we physically need food and drink to keep ourselves alive, but we use meals to mark occasions and celebrate events: birthdays; weddings; dates; achievements; disappointments; reunions. There is a sacredness about gathering with friends and family and sharing a meal together. Stories are told; memories shared; the food is appreciated and more often than not there's a drink to accompany the meal. Treating such occasions with gratitude – as blessed moments of grace – is living out the Eucharistic reality of welcoming Jesus into our lives and seeking to be more like him.

SCRIPTURAL CONTEXT

Eucharist in Scripture

The gospel of John does not include any account of Jesus taking bread and wine and urging the disciples to 'do this in memory of me'. The three synoptic gospels, however, all feature these actions and words, as does Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, which predates all of the gospels. Rather than using these words of institution, the gospel of John includes an entire chapter much earlier in the gospel in which Jesus theologises about the image of himself as the Bread of Life. It is this discourse, more than the Last Supper accounts, that provides much of the theological understanding of Eucharist.



Are you with 'Leaf People' or 'Branch People'?



In this winter we see many trees with bare branches after they have shed their leaves. Before shedding them, the leaves turned very colourful, attracting everyone's attention. Perhaps it is the most photogenic time of the trees. Yet it is the branches that will survive the winter and produce new leaves and fruits. It is a good parable for the human life. There are people who are like the colourful leaves in autumn. They attract a lot of attention and admiration of the world. But it cannot last for ever. Come the harsh tests of life, they fall away. Whereas there are people who are like branches, who do not live on the admiration of the world, yet can endure any harsh tests of life. The only thing that can fail them is to be cut off from the trunk of the tree. Just as branches can produce new leaves and fruits these people also are full of real life. Whereas the 'leaf people' though can be good show offs, cannot produce fruits. That is because, unlike branches, they do not contain any qualities of stem in them.

The Body and Blood of Christ is a great gift we have from God that help us to the 'branch people'. People who have come into a union with Christ through Eucharist are able to withstand the tests and hardships of life. They are capable of producing shade giving leaves and good fruits. Because they contain in themselves divine qualities like branches sharing the qualities of the stem. Jesus said, "He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I live in him." (Jn 6:54) There are over 30 children from the parish now preparing for their First Communion this year. The parents and the teachers of these are trying to make these children understand the merits of being 'branch people than leaf people'. You too may ask yourself whether you are with 'branch people or with leaf people'.

Or whatever they like that makes them feel happy and safe with others.


Terms and Conditions:

Friday—The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus



The Sacred Heart is a devotion to Jesus's physical heart as the representation of divine love for humanity. It stresses the central Christian concept of loving and adoring Jesus. Also in the Sacred Heart is the salvation of the world and lasting peace.

Devotion to the Sacred Heart, encouraged by medieval mystics and promoted by St Gertrude, St Margaret, Mary Alacoque, St John Eudes and others, represents a devotion to Jesus in his human nature, in particular referring to the heart as the seat of the emotions.

Traditionally, school kids make contribution to St Vincent de Paul to observe this feast.


Feasts & Memorials of the Week



Monday - St Romuald was born to a wealthy family in Ravenna, Italy in around 951. He lived a life of indulgence, but after witnessing his father kill a relative in a duel, Romuald went to the Basilica of Sant'Apollinare and did 40 days of penance for his father. He became a monk then he moved to Venice and lived the severe life of a hermit for 10 years. Romuald spent the next 30 years travelling, founding and reforming monasteries and hermitages, before once again withdrawing to live his remaining years as a hermit.

Wednesday—St Aloysius Gonzaga

St. Aloysius was born in Castiglione, Italy. The first words St. Aloysius spoke were the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary. He was destined for the military by his father (who was in service to Philip II), but by the age of 9 Aloysius had decided on a religious life, and made a vow of perpetual virginity. To safeguard himself from possible temptation, he would keep his eyes persistently downcast in the presence of women. St. Charles Borromeo gave him his first Holy Communion. A kidney disease prevented St. Aloysius from a full social life for a while, so he spent his time in prayer and reading the lives of the saints. Although he was appointed a page in Spain, St. Aloysius kept up his many devotions and austerities, and was quite resolved to become a Jesuit. His family eventually moved back to Italy, where he taught catechism to the poor. When he was 18, he joined the Jesuits, after finally breaking down his father, who had refused his entrance into the order. He served in a hospital during the plague of 1587 in Milan, and died from it at the age of 23, after receiving the last rites from St. Robert Bellarmine. The last word he spoke was the Holy Name of Jesus.



Thursday—Sts John Fisher & Thomas More


St John Fisher was born in Yorkshire in 1469. Studied at Cambridge University when he was only 14 and gained a Double University degree before training for the priesthood.

He was appointed Bishop of Rochester in 1504. He wrote about many spiritual matters and his sermons were famous throughout Europe. He defended the traditional Catholic Doctrines and was renowned and repeated for his holiness.

Pope Paul III made him a Cardinal before he was convicted of high treason and sentenced to death in June 1535.

He was canonised in 1935, 400 years after his execution.

St Thomas More was Oxford educated, a lawyer and served in Parliament. He wrote the world famous book "Utopia" and spent many years writing in defence of the Church, for which he was imprisoned. He spent 15 months in the infamous Tower of London before he was executed, nine days after St John Fisher.



Saturday - The Nativity of St John the Baptist as told in the Gospel of Luke, begins with the Angel Gabriel appearing to John's father in the temple. Gabriel told Zachariah that his elderly wife Elizabeth was to have a son named John. When Zachariah left the temple he was unable to speak, for Gabriel had told Zachariah that he would be left mute until his son was born. After Elizabeth gave birth there was disagreement among the family's relatives over the naming of the baby. When they approached Zachariah he wrote, "His name is John". From that moment, Zachariah was able to speak again and he praised God and made a prophesy about John, saying: "You will be called the prophet of the Most High."
