First Reading

Jer 20:10-13

Jeremiah said: 'I hear so many disparaging me, "Terror from every side! Denounce him! Let us denounce him!" All those who used to be my friends watched for my downfall, "Perhaps he will be seduced into error. Then we will master him and take our revenge!" But the Lord is at my side, a mighty hero; my opponents will stumble, mastered, confounded by their failure; everlasting, unforgettable disgrace will be theirs. But you, Lord of Hosts, you who probe with justice, who scrutinise the loins and heart, let me see the vengeance you will take on them, for I have committed my cause to you. Sing to the Lord, praise the Lord, for he has delivered the soul of the needy from the hands of evil men.'

Second Reading

Rom 5:12-15

Sin entered the world through one man, and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. Sin existed in the world long before the Law was given. There was no law and so no one could be accused of the sin of 'law-breaking', yet death reigned over all from Adam to Moses, even though their sin, unlike that of Adam, was not a matter of breaking a law.

Adam prefigured the One to come, but the gift itself considerably outweighed the fall. If it is certain that through one man's fall so many died, it is even more certain that divine grace, coming through the one man, Jesus Christ, came to so many as an abundant free gift.

Gospel

Mt 10:26-33

Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Do not be afraid. For everything that is now covered will be uncovered, and everything now hidden will be made clear. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the daylight; what you hear in whispers, proclaim from the house-tops.

'Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell. Can you not buy two sparrows for a penny? And yet not one falls to the ground without your Father knowing. Why, every hair on your head has been counted. So there is no need to be afraid; you are worth more than hundreds of sparrows.

'So if anyone declares himself for me in the presence of men, I will declare myself for him in the presence of my Father in heaven. But the one who disowns me in the presence of men, I will disown in the presence of my Father in heaven.'

SCRIPTURAL CONTEXT

The Q source

This gospel passage that appears at Mt 10: 26-33 is virtually reproduced in the gospel of Luke (12:2-12) but does not appear in the gospel of Mark. Both the gospels of Matthew and Luke draw extensively on the gospel of Mark as a source for their writing but scholars have also deduced that they shared another unknown source. The content of this lost source can only be deduced by the identification of parallel passages such as this one that appear in Matthew and Luke but not Mark. The undiscovered document is known as the 'Q source' after the German word, Quelle (source).

LIVING THE GOSPEL

From the house-tops

One of the messages of Jesus to his disciples and, through him, of Matthew to the original community, is to have courage and to have pride in their belief. No matter what threat or persecution they are to endure, the command is to proclaim the message of Jesus from the house-tops. They are to be proud of what they believe and be prepared to share it with others. In a world today that is not always open to the message of Jesus, we too are called to be proud of what we believe and not whisper it in the darkness.

GOSPEL FOCUS

Fear

When scripture uses the term fear, it tends to fall into one of two meanings. When used in the context of 'do not be afraid' or 'fear not', it is a command to not be daunted by the woes and trials that the world imposes. The other use tends to be a command that we should fear God. In this context, the word does not mean to be frightened of God but rather to show proper reverence. To fear God is to stand in wonder and awe rather than to cower and hide. So, fear God, but do not be afraid!

Sin is Lack of Trust in God

Thomas More whose book, Utopia, depicting a society regulated by the natural virtues, is still read today. He was a lawyer and a friend of King Henry VIII who made him the Lord Chancellor – the highest legal position in England. When Henry VIII demanded a divorce from his first wife, Catherine of Aragon, Thomas More opposed him. He resigned the chancellorship and retired from public life. But Henry VIII would not leave him. The king got Thomas More was tried on the charge of high treason for denying the king's supreme headship of the Church, because he would not go against the Papal authority and Catholic Church. Thomas More was found guilty and sentenced to death. Thomas More went to his execution with a clear conscience and a light heart; he told the spectators that he was still "the king's good servant – but God's first." He carefully adjusted his beard before he was beheaded. Where did he get this serenity even as he faced his executioners? The only answer is that his faith and trust in the goodness of God and eternal life was such that he did not fear anyone who could kill his body. We observed the memorial of St Thomas More last Thursday.



It was a shocking news for me as a child in 1966 to hear of a Catholic priest in Kerala, Fr Benedict, convicted of murdering a widow. Fr Benedict never admitted killing Mariakutty and the torture he had to endure from the police who interrogated him was very cruel. Yet he could not prove his innocence the whole world knew the priest as a criminal in self-denial until year 2000. At the turn of this millennium, the family of the actual murderer owned up the crime and confessed how Fr Benedict was set up. By then Fr Benedict was a sickly 73 year old man. One would consider this as very late admission that deprived Fr Benedict of real life all this time and for ever. But in spite of the bad reputation Fr Benedict was a serene man and continued to be so after the revelation of his innocence too. How could he do it? His faith and trust in his saviour Jesus Christ was such that even when he faced all the torture and ill reputation, he knew his real life will be rewarded by God with eternal joy and peace. Otherwise he only had to reveal the secret of a confession he heard from one of the criminal who set him up to spare himself from the tortures and conviction. But he did not. He trusted in the Gospel words, "Do not be afraid. For everything that is now covered will be uncovered. ... Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell." (Mt 10:26, 28)

The real sinfulness is a manifestation of our lack of trust in God. We act as if we were god to ourselves. But we sinners must not be afraid. God will have the last word, and Jesus will be there to present his sinful and saved brothers and sisters to his Father and our Father.

Feasts & Memorials of the Week

Tuesday—St Cyril of Alexandria



Saint Cyril of Alexandria, (born c. 375—died June 27, 444) Christian theologian and bishop active in the complex doctrinal struggles of the 5th century.

He was the most brilliant theologian of the Alexandrian tradition. His writings are characterized by accurate thinking, precise exposition, and great reasoning skills. Among his writings are commentaries on John, Luke, and the Pentateuch, treatises on dogmatic theology, and Apologia against Julian the Apostate, and letters and sermons. He was declared a doctor of the Church by Pope Leo XIII in 1882.

Wednesday—St Irenaeus




Irenaeus was a Greek who was born in Asia Minor. He was blessed to be taught by St. Polycarp of Smyrna, who had been a disciple of

St. John the Apostle. Irenaeus once told a friend: "I listened to St. Polycarp's instructions very carefully. I wrote down his actions and his words, not on paper, but on my heart."

St. Irenaeus' books were read by many people and soon people began to ignore the Gnostics teachings. St. Irenaeus was killed around the year 202 dying a martyr for Jesus.

Thursday— Sts Peter and Paul



They were two great leaders of the early church. Peter was a fisherman whose original name was Simon. Jesus called him and his brother Andrew to be
