First Reading

Jer 20:7-9

You have seduced me, Lord, and I have let myself be seduced; you have overpowered me: you were the stronger. I am a daily laughing-stock, everybody's butt. Each time I speak the word, I have to howl and proclaim: 'Violence and ruin!' The word of the Lord has meant for me insult, derision, all day long. Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it. What, then, will a man gain if he wins the whole world and ruins his life? Or what has a man to offer in exchange for his life?'

'For the Son of Man is going to come in the glory of his Father with his angels, and, when he does, he will reward each one according to his behaviour.'

Reflections

Historical Context

At the time of the writing of Matthew's gospel (around 75-80 CE), Christians were being persecuted and put to death for their beliefs. They were literally giving up their lives for their faith. These persecuted Christians saw Jesus' triumph over death as a sign of great hope and trust in the future for themselves. Jesus' words in the gospel—'whoever loses his life for my sake will find it'—would give hope to those under persecution that ultimately they too would triumph and that the deaths of their friends were not in vain.

Scriptural Context

This passage immediately follows the passage of last week's gospel which featured Peter's confession of faith—his inspired revelation that 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the Living God.' The

reader might think, 'Aha, the disciples have finally got it!' But in a very clever piece of writing, the author of Matthew's gospel follows this revelation of faith immediately with an example of the lack of clarity that the disciples, including Peter, still possess. This happens throughout the gospels. Whenever the disciples have a bit of an insight, they are almost immediately shown to only have a partial understanding of the truth. The full revelation of Jesus' mission and ministry is not easy to grasp and even the disciples were not quite there until they had seen the 'full story' played out before and within them.

Living the Gospel. Have you got what it takes?

For some people, to be a Christian is a 'soft option' - they see being Christian as being a bit 'fluffy'. This week's gospel is a reminder of the real challenge of being a Christian. Jesus reminds us that to be one of his followers we must be prepared to pick up our cross—whatever our particular cross might be—and still follow his example. To be a Christian means that we don't fall in a heap when difficulty comes our way; we take up the burden—our cross—and continue to look forward with hope. To live like Jesus is no easy option.

Bear the Cross and do the Will of the Father

To some people being Christian is an easy option. Having children baptised into the church, one can easily get into Catholic Schools for a better education. Going to church whenever it pleases them, feeling good and making others feel good are the kind of commitments some people consider as Christian identity. But for Mary it was different.



Mary is a high achiever, practicing corporate law. She is also beautiful looking and many young men liked to court her. But she decided to join a convent and spent rest of her life for evangelisation. Her friends, hearing of her decision said, she got to be mad to throw away such a successful life and become a recluse. But Mary's decision to give up fame, money, and the prospect of a great husband and a family of her own, was a sacrifice God will reward. That is the only thing Mary wanted in her life. This is one scenario of sacrifice.

When Jesus told Peter that he is a rock when it comes to profession of faith and he is to be the foundation of the Church, it must have been very flattering. But when Jesus said he is on his way to Jerusalem for a self-sacrifice, the disciples found it very difficult to accept. But doing the will of the Father in heaven is the best thing you could do as a follower of Jesus. That involves sacrificing our own personal interests. Without the Cross there is no glory of the resurrection. The question is, 'are you prepared to carry the Cross with Jesus?'

Why do people like Mary take drastic steps in their lives? We may not be required to be that radical in our approach. There are enough challenges in our own lives to opt for the will of the Father in Heaven against the selfish motives of our human mind. While the Church's teaching on the Confidentiality of Confession, Sacrament of Marriage as heterosexual commitment, and Assisted killing (Euthanasia) are challenged in our times, as Christians we are called to show courage and stand up for the will of Our Father in Heaven. Jesus demands that his disciples be willing to bear such crosses for the sake of the Kingdom of God.

Feasts & Memorials of the Week

Friday—The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary



The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a feast that commemorates the birthday of Jesus' mother. Even though Mary's birth is not recorded in the scriptures, it is mentioned in the Apocryphal writings from the second century, the Protoevangelium of James and is even mentioned in Islamic scripture. Her parents are named as Saint Anne and Saint Joachim and tradition places Mary's birthplace in Jerusalem. The feast has been celebrated since the fifth century – on September 8 in the Roman Calendar.

Saturday—St Peter Claver



St Peter Claver was born in Spain in 1581 AD. After studying at the University of Barcelona, he became a Jesuit at the age of 20. St Peter was influenced by St Alphonsus Rodriguez to become a missionary in the Americas, where he ministered both physically and spiritually to the African slaves. He spent the next 40 years working for the humane treatment of slaves on plantations, and he reportedly converted some 300,000 African slaves to Christianity. Within the Spanish community living in America, St Peter organised charitable societies, similar to those organised by St Vincent de Paul across Europe. He said of the slaves, "We must speak to them with our hands by giving, before we try to speak to them with our lips."

Sr Dorothy Reached South Sudan

I received the following email from Sister Dorothy on 29 August.

Dear Fr Thomas

Well I finally arrived at my destination on Friday PM after a 20hr flight time plus 3hours wait in Dubai. Then an hours flight to Yambio followed by a car trip for 2 to RIIMENZE my final destination Spent two nights in Juba desperately trying to buy medical supplies as here in RIIMENZE there is next to nothing.

On the road we passed a UN convoy with its guns on display and heavily armed soldiers. On arrival I was told that they had spent three night here looking for rebels not finding any they left. Yesterday I went out and walked through the newly established IDP camp where we are endeavouring to look after 6000 and while we were there we were told that 34 new families arrived and again more came early this morning. The little clinic I left is practically non functioning so I will have to start from scratch ,that's nothing compared to the thousands suffering.

As I went through I could see the pain on their faces behind their smiles and warm greetings of welcome. The children and elderly are the most vulnerable, so many children have most of the preventable childhood disease coupled with malnutrition anaemia and malaria. So much to be done with so little, but as I said to them today together and with the grace of God we will make a difference small as it may be.

I will include a few photos showing how's the 6+ thousand are living and trying to survive. In spite of all the singing at mass this morning nearly lifted the roof off.

At the offertory procession I was so humbled to see two large pumpkins being brought up for the priest. It always the same the poor are the most generous.

Please continue to pray for me/us I will email when I can to share with you and the parish the cry of the poor.

Does Pope Francis support same-sex marriage?

A number of commentators have recently suggested that loyalty to Catholic teaching, and especially to Pope Francis, would allow, even require, support for same-sex marriage; by implication, the Australian bishops misunderstand Catholic teaching and have been disloyal to Pope Francis by saying Catholics should vote NO. But what has Pope Francis actually said about this?

In April 2010, while still Archbishop of Buenos Aires, he issued a strongly worded pastoral letter on behalf of his fellow bishops against the redefinition of marriage in Argentine law. He reminded public authorities of their responsibility to protect marriage and its unique contribution to the common good. He pointed out that the state is not discriminating unjustly when it requires a man and a woman to make a marriage: “it merely recognises a natural reality”. The future pope continued: “A marriage – made up of man and woman – is not the same as the union of two people of the same sex. To distinguish is not to discriminate but to respect differences... At a time when we place emphasis on the richness of pluralism and social and cultural diversity, it is a contradiction to minimise fundamental human differences. A father is not the same as a mother. We cannot teach future generations that preparing yourself for planning a family based on the stable relationship between a man and a woman is the same as living with a person of the same sex.”

But has Cardinal Bergoglio changed his tune since becoming Pope Francis? He has famously emphasized the need for the Church to be close to people, accompanying them pastorally amidst the complexity of their lives, and helping to heal their wounds. He is acutely aware that many people with same-sex attraction feel alienated from the Church and society. He says that he will not judge homosexuals who are genuinely searching for God and seeking to do the good.

However, sensitive pastoral care towards gay and lesbian people, including same-sex couples, is consistent with upholding the truth of marriage as the lifelong union of man and woman open to procreation. Indeed, Pope Francis has been critical of the “narcissistic individualism” of contemporary culture, which promotes “a freedom disengaged from responsibility” and the common good – whether among heterosexual or homosexual persons. He has criticised “ideologies that attack the family project directly”. These cultural forces, he thinks, undermine the natural and divinely-given plan for marriage and the family.¹ And he argues that upon the health of marriages and marriage-based families depend not only happiness and holiness for many individuals, but also the transmission of faith and ethics, the vigour of economies and polities, the care of life and the generations, and thus the very direction of peoples through history.²

In this context Pope Francis has repeatedly argued that the legalisation of same-sex marriage would be “a step backwards for humanity” (an ‘anthropological regression’)³ and gravely harm us all – homosexuals included – because the health of the ‘human ecology’ depends on a healthy marital culture.⁴ Such a culture draws the two sexes together in married life and ensures that, as far as

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possible, children receive the gift of the contributions of both male and female parents, committed to each other and to them.⁵ Quoting from the Australian Bishops' Pastoral, Don't Mess With Marriage, and making it his own in his celebrated exhortation, *Amoris Laetitia*, Pope Francis insists that each of the spouses "contributes in a distinct way to the upbringing of a child. Respecting a child's dignity means affirming his or her need and natural right to have a mother and a father."⁶ The 'ideological colonisation' resulting from confusing presentations of sexuality and marriage disfigures God's plan for creation, denies children their natural rights, harms individuals and communities, and must be resisted.⁷ Yet sadly "many countries are witnessing a legal deconstruction of the family, tending to adopt models based almost exclusively on the autonomy of the individual will."⁸

Far from revoking the Catholic Church's two-thousand-year-long insistence that (according to divine revelation and the natural law) marriage can only be between a man and a woman,⁹ Pope Francis has been a strong advocate of that very position. Those claiming his support in their campaign for a Yes vote in the forthcoming plebiscite have either not read him or are deliberately misrepresenting him. To vote with Pope Francis is to VOTE NO.
