## Holy Family



It is with horror that we read or listened to the news of a mother killing her many children, or a mother throwing the fruit her womb into a drain. That is not the kind of relationship we expect from parents with their children. Families are places where the relationship between the parents and the children is nurtured. It is the parents who influence the personal development of the children. That is the natural order God has created for us human beings. When it came to baby Jesus, God became human, it was no different. Today we celebrate a feast that reminds us of the humility of God to share in the lowliness of human existence.

Just like any human child, baby Jesus also needed the protection of Joseph and Mary to survive and grow. His life also was threatened like millions of children around the world today. Like the agonising parents in every age, Mary and Joseph also agonised over the safety of baby Jesus. God did not spare it even for his own only Son. When there was persecution in the land of his birth, the Holy Family migrated to Egypt for safety and returned home after the terrorising ruler died. Truly the Word became flesh and dwelt among us in our lowliness.

Jesus' human nature was very much shaped by Joseph and Mary as they lived in Nazareth as an ordinary family. In times of peace as well as in times of atrocities, nothing should interrupt the business of family – growing up and formation of children.

Families used to be the place where people learned their occupation, received medical attention, received faith formation, and cared for in their old age. Now society has become more complex. We have schools and universities to educate and equip people for various specialised occupations. We have religious education in our schools. There is a big industry running to look after the aged. In addition to these specialisations and compartmentalisation, the influence of social media and technologies are pulling apart family unity. Yet when it comes to the fundamental beliefs and formation of the personalities, nothing can substitute families. Therefore it is important to work on being a family.

One of my main tasks is to emphasise the importance of families and the parish as a wider family in the faith formation of the children. In the case of sacramental preparations, the schools do the teaching of the religious truths. But it is in your family and in the parish where faith is imparted and nurtured.

Few families are perfect. Yet families today, big or small, in struggle or in pain, are all places where love can still be shared. It is families that can primarily help us understand the formative value of pain and rejection, when that occurs from the rest of the world. If God chose to have a family for the full human realisation of his only Son, there is a good reason for us to root ourselves in families in our growth towards the divine.



### *Feasts of the Week.*

**1 January - Mary the Holy Mother of God** Venerated as Mother of God from ancient times, the Virgin Mary was acclaimed Theotokos (God-bearer) in 431 by the Council of Ephesus, and commemorated on this day in Rome in the seventh century. Soon eclipsed by other feasts of Mary. Restored to the liturgical calendar in 1931, and to this day in 1969. Celebrates Mary's role in the mystery of the incarnation, enriches the octave of Christmas with a Marian perspective, and provides a solemn beginning to the New Year.



**2 January - St Basil the Great & St Gregory** Basil was Born about 330 at Caesarea (Turkey). Died there on 1 January 379. First a hermit, then bishop of his native city. Remembered for his pioneering monastic rule, and for writings which developed the doctrines of the incarnation and of the divinity of the Holy Spirit. Gregory was Born at Nazianzus (Turkey) in 329. Died there in 389. Also a hermit before becoming bishop of Constantinople. Remembered as the "Theologian" because of his wisdom and acumen in maintaining orthodox doctrine against the Arians. Basil and Gregory are commemorated together because of their friendship in life and their enduring influence on the Church, especially in the East.



**4 January - The Epiphany of the Lord** The earliest Christmas feast, originating in the East in the third century and passing to the West in the fourth century. Celebrates the divine "manifestation" or "coming". In the East it commemorates the baptism of the Lord and in the West the visit of the Magi. The mystery of the incarnation is now revealed to everyone in the world, represented by these wise men from foreign lands.


