

Prayer and Forgiveness

Last Sunday, at the Parish Day, we reflected on the importance of hospitality. We also found that good hospitality leads to greater friendship and even intimacy. The disciples of Jesus found him in such a union with God. So they begged him to teach them how to pray properly so that they too can achieve a similar union with God. Therefore Jesus taught them what we call 'The Lord's Prayer'. It is a prayer to obtain union with God, a peace with self, an integrity unaltered by praise or criticism, favour or threat.

Have you realised that there is no 'I', 'me', or 'my' in this prayer? The basic character of this prayer is that it is 'other' centred. The focus is the Father in heaven and our fellow human beings. In this prayer we praise God, present our needs to Him, and declare our willingness to forgive others. Prayer is not asking God to do what we want, but being in contact with God so that we know what He wants and what He desires. Through prayer, we are welcoming God's hospitality.

Persistent prayer will always make our lives holier and peaceful. Therefore a true Christian approach makes prayer part of our day to day living.

True Christian prayer demands readiness to forgive others. It does not mean that one must forget what was done. Nor does it mean one gives up rights to justice. It is the ability to deal with the hurtful experiences in such a way that it would not brood into anger or revenge and spoil your peace. Forgiveness is the ability to continue to see God's goodness in the offender in spite of the offence. One would require spiritual maturity to forgive others.

Forgiveness leads to reconciliation. And reconciliation is a process. Reconciliation takes time. It requires persistent efforts from a forgiving person for a period of time.

A lot of hurt and pain are born out of the lack of proper awareness. It is the Holy Spirit who can provide us with enlightenment in such cases. When it happens, it could be a total conversion in life.

The story of John Newton, whose life is associated with the popular hymn 'Amazing Grace', is about conversion. His conversion did not happen overnight. First of all it involved the tragedy of a ship wreck and then guidance of some good people over a period of time. Our conversion is a process. Even when we think we are good Christians, we could be in need of further conversion. Listening to the prompting of the Holy Spirt one can identify the areas in need of conversion. Any true seeker will be guided by the Holy Spirit to forgiveness and reconciliation.

Parish 2020 and our Parish

At the pastoral Planning meeting in early May this year I spoke about the Parish 2020 program of the Archdiocese. Now consultations are being conducted among priests in preparation for this cussion in the Clergy conference in October. The discussions are around 3 aspects:

- a. collaboration between parishes in sharing staff and resources for greater efficiency;
- b. Partnering parishes that are not viable on their own;
- c. new structures for Mission.

The proposed criteria around partnering parishes may be of some interest to you as a parishioners. Criteria for parishes at the risk of non-viability are as below. (The text within the comas after each point and in Italics are my comments.)

- *fewer than one or more of Masses in the parish. (We have managed to maintain the overall Mass attendance to average 500 on weekends, in spite of the catholic Population in our area declining at the rate of 3% every 5 years for last 2 National Census terms. Two out of three Masses of our Masses meet this criteria.)
- *The sacramental indicators of the parish are considered low: number of baptisms, weddings, first communions, first reconciliations, and confirmations. (our weddings numbers are very low)
- *The evangelizing indicators of the parish are diminished, eg youth and children's ministry, RCIA, Charitable outreach (Our Youth Ministry and Charitable outreach remain poor)
- *The parish primary school has a low Catholicity. (Our school enrolments are a concern)
- * The parish church is located less than 2 KM from another parish church. (Sefton, the nearest church to St Peter Chanel is 3 km away)
- *1st Collection is inadequate to support the parish clergy. (Thanks to the parishioners, our 1st Collection adequately supports me)
- *2nd Collection is inadequate to finance the operation of the parish requiring other sources like property rental income. (Our 2nd Collection is never enough for the running of the parish. Supplementing it with rental income we currently manage the running of the parish. Thanks to various grants and special donations, currently we have a healthy bank balance. But without an ongoing topping up, it will not last long.)

Parish 2020 committee goes on to say, "If a parish meets some or all of the above criteria, it is prudent consider now whether it should be partnered with another parish."

This does not mean that there is currently any proposal to partner our parish with any other parish. But knowing the facts would help the parish to have a realistic discussion on future pastoral plans.

South Sudan update.

Sr Dorothy, after returning from South Sudan, provided me with a number of updates. Below is an excerpt. Sr Dorothy will be returning to South Sudan soon to continue her mission there. We pray God's blessing on her as she courageously decided to go back to the war torn South Sudan.

DOCTORS IN JUBA: 'OUR PATIENTS ARE TELLING US TERRIBLE STORIES'

15 July 2016 – (radiotamazuj.org) - Medical workers in South Sudan's capital Juba say that many of their patients are psychologically traumatized after their family members were killed or abused. Doctors Without Borders, known also by its French name Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF), is running mobile clinics among displaced people in Juba in the wake of four days of fighting in the city.



The aid group says they received reports of "very terrible" events in the city, including killings, looting and humiliating acts, according to an article published on the MSF website yesterday.

MSF field coordinator Ruben Pottier explained that their teams have done more than 500 consultations at St. Theresa's Church, which is serving as a refuge for thousands of people who fled violence in their own neighborhoods.

"Our patients are telling us terrible stories—how armed men came into their houses and shot the people inside. In escaping from the violence, many people lost family members."

Pottier recalled, "Today I met an eight-year-old boy whose mother and father were both shot and who now has no one to take care of him."

He added, "I saw a girl of 12, her three-year-old sister in her arms, come for a consultation, saying she had lost both parents. My colleagues in the mobile clinic have seen at least three other children who came without any family, saying their mother and father had been shot."

During the killings, many people fled in panic, leading to injuries from climbing over wire fences, for example. Others were wounded by bullets in crossfire.

Some patients have reported that soldiers deliberately humiliated them. According to Pottier, "Two patients told us that armed men without uniforms came to their house, took away their children, [and] took away all their possessions, including their clothes. They said they had to flee naked out of the house. They received some clothes from people in the neighbourhood, and those clothes are now all they have."

MSF says many people are afraid to return home and are remaining at the St. Theresa's Church compound, or elsewhere in the city. Others tried to go back but found that all their belongings were looted. The aid group pointed out that some of these incidents happened after the end of serious fighting on Monday.



Feasts of the Week

25 July St James Born at Bethsaida in Galilee, a son of Zebedee. Died about 44, the first apostle to die, beheaded by Herod. A fisherman, summoned by Jesus together with his brother Saint John (27 December). They were called the "Sons of Thunder" (Mark 3:17). Remembered as a favoured apostle: with Saint Peter (29 June) and Saint John he was present at the transfiguration, the raising of the daughter of Jairus, and the agony in the garden.





26 July St Joachim & Anne are named as Mary's parents in a late second century tradition. Churches dedicated to Saint Anne are found in Jerusalem and Constantinople from the middle of the sixth century.

The feast of Saint Anne was kept in Rome by the eighth century, that of Saint Joachim from the fifteenth century. The feast honours the parents of the Virgin Mary and grandparents of the Lord.

29 July St Martha The sister of Mary and Lazarus of Bethany. Honoured for her confession of faith in the Lord in which she beseeched him to restore life to her dead brother (John 11:27). Remembered too for her hospitality to Jesus and her concern for the details of service to guests.
