First Reading **Lv 19:1-2, 17-18**

The Lord spoke to Moses; he said: ‘Speak to the whole community of the sons of Israel and say to them: “Be holy, for I, the Lord your God, am holy.

“You must not bear hatred for your brother in your heart. You must openly tell him, your neighbour, of his offence; this way you will not take a sin upon yourself. You must not exact vengeance, nor must you bear a grudge against the children of your people. You must love your neighbour as yourself. I am the Lord.”.

Second Reading **1 Cor 2:16-23**

Didn’t you realise that you were God’s temple and that the Spirit of God was living among you? If anybody should destroy the temple of God, God will destroy him, because the temple of God is sacred; and you are that temple.

Make no mistake about it: if any one of you thinks of himself as wise, in the ordinary sense of the word, then he must learn to be a fool before he really can be wise. Why? Because the wisdom of this world is foolishness to God. As scripture says: The Lord knows wise men’s thoughts: he knows how useless they are, or again: God is not convinced by the arguments of the wise. So there is nothing to boast about in anything human: Paul, Apollos, Cephas, the world, life and death, the present and the future, are all your servants; but you belong to Christ and Christ belongs to God.

Gospel **Mt 5:38-48**

Jesus said to his disciples: ‘You have learnt how it was said: Eye for eye and tooth for tooth. But I say this to you: offer the wicked man no resistance. On the contrary, if anyone hits you on the right cheek, offer him the other as well; if a man takes you to law and would have your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. And if anyone orders you to go one mile, go two miles with him. Give to anyone who asks, and if anyone wants to borrow, do not turn away.

‘You have learnt how it was said: You must love your neighbour and hate your enemy. But I say this to you: love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you; in this way you will be sons of your Father in heaven, for he causes his sun to rise on bad men as well as good, and his rain to fall on honest and dishonest men alike. For if you love those who love you, what right have you to claim any credit? Even the tax collectors do as much, do they not? And if you save your greetings for your brothers, are you doing anything exceptional? Even the pagans do as much, do they not? You must therefore be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect.’.



Have you thought?

Being present in the Now

99 per cent of the time when we are in a ‘conversation’ with someone we spend more time thinking about what we will say next than we spend actually listening to what they’re saying. Jesus calls us to be present and to be in the present. To be present to another person means to be fully attentive to them and more concerned about them and what they’re saying (and not saying) than we are about ourselves. Next time you’re talking with a friend, try asking open, honest questions and then really listening to what they say.

Living the gospel

Don’t be distracted

When we read in today’s gospel that we are ‘not to worry’, the word, worry, might better be translated as distracted. Jesus says to not be distracted or consumed by the pursuit of money, food and nice clothes. He says that it is the gentiles – those who do not know the love of God – who set their hearts on attaining these things. We are immersed in a culture in society that values these outward signs of success above all else. The challenge is to avoid being caught up in the distractions of our material society. One way to do that is through regular prayer and reflection.

Scriptural context

The Sermon on the Mount

Often, the Sermon on the Mount is understood purely as the Beatitudes (Mt 5:3-12), but in the gospel of Matthew this sermon stretches over all of chapters 5 to 7. These chapters provide a solid core of the explicit teaching ministry of Jesus in this gospel. The gospel writer begins the section with the Beatitudes and then, in a very Jewish style, presents Jesus as a rabbinic teacher reinterpreting and refocusing the Law of Moses for his listeners. Unlike the parables that are more familiar, this portion of the gospel seeks to spell out some very explicit teachings of Jesus about life and the kingdom.

In our family farm there was a mango tree. We spoke of it as a perfect tree. As a healthy tree it had grown into tall tree with lush green canopy and its branches weighed down heavily with mangos in season. Since it realised its full potential, it was a perfect tree.


Tuesday—St Peter Damian



He was born to a large but poor Italian family in 1007 AD. He was orphaned at a young age and was mistreated by an older brother. He was eventually cared for and

educated by another brother who was an archpriest. He joined a Benedictine monastery where he lived the simple and strict life of a hermit. Peter was made the cardinal bishop of Ostia in 1057 and began many local reforms. He wrote numerous sermons and biographies, and was a strong supporter of church reforms and discipline.

Wednesday—The Feast of the Chair of St Peter



Commemorates St Peter's founding of the Church of Antioch and his role as the first bishop of Rome. The chair believed to have been used by St Peter himself is

preserved at St Peter's Basilica. In ancient times it was customary for teachers to sit while teaching their students, who would stand around them. Even in the early church, bishops would give the homily seated, with the congregation standing as they listened. And so it is that the celebration of St Peter's Chair is a remembrance of his role as both teacher and bishop.

Thursday—St Polycarp



He converted to Christianity by St. John the Apostle and became an important leader throughout western Asia Minor as the Bishop of Smyrna. Polycarp was

eventually betrayed by a servant who had him arrested. He was urged to denounce his religion and to curse Christ, to which he replied, "I have served him for eighty six years and he has done me no wrong." He was ordered to be burnt alive, and it is said that he offered a prayer of praise and glory to God and the flames did not harm him.

Mrs Joyce McDonald is a loving caring person who gives 200 percent to what ever she takes on and now in her retiring years likes to have things go her way.

Joyce is the second daughter of Steve and Mary Downie who was born in 1927 in the suburb of Kogarah. Joyce and her sister Elizabeth (Betty) grew up during the depression years and had the advantage of walking across the Harbour Bridge on the day it opened, and also ran down Martin Place at the end of WW11. Was married to Leonard McDonald for some 47 years till his passing, he was greatly missed for some years after. Raised her family of 4 children in both South Granville and then Birrong where she attended mass at Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Sefton. Some years later changed parish churches to St Peter Chanel Church at Regents Park, Berala where in 1988 she took up the role of Special Minister and to this day still is extremely active within this role.



Keeps the roster up to date and filling in for those that are away or unable to make the commitment that was made previously. Her home and hospital visits are the delight of every one that she visits. Always prepared to stay and have a chat and listen to the stories/gossip the person has to talk about. Sometimes she is the only person that the sick/infirm person sees from week to week. Then there is the MS Centre where all patients and staff just think she is the greatest thing since slice bread, she brings a ray of sunshine into what would be a very depressing place.

Joyce is a wife, mum, grandmother and great grand mother and enjoys all of there company when ever they can come to visit. A few years ago Joyce decided to take up a flower arrangement course only to enhance her own knowledge, from this she has had great pleasure to create some magnificence arrangement of flowers for special occasions to adorn the altar of St Peters Chanel Church, giving many hours of hard work to do so.

Many functions that have been held in the parish over the years have had the beautiful and lovingly prepared foods laid out and ready to consume for all to taste. Not only cooking for some days but she is usually the first to turn up and set up the hall for the function. Collection of the aged of the parish for the mass for the sick was never a problem. But what she does without many noticing is that your church is opened, altar and readings in relevant books made ready and flowers, candle sticks kept cleaned and all ready for the Priest of the day to say Mass. In Fr Kings day it was a confidence he had that it would be perfect every day and if Joyce happened to go on vacation she would get a 100% guarantee that someone would take her place for the short time she could not be there. During a trip to Italy she was on the hunt for an altar cover made of lace she knew what she wanted and we found it, But was not prepared to return without the right thing.

If some of the family members are a challenge because they either do not care about religious practices or hate the Church, Jesus would say it is the opportune time for you to make sure, "the people that lived in darkness has seen a great light". (Ref. Mt 4: Isaiah 8:24) If sickness or some other failures in life has challenged your faith, Jesus would say, "on those who live in the land of deep shadow a light has shown." (Ref. Mt 4: Isaiah 8: 24-25).

The way Jesus commenced his ministry of preaching the Kingdom of God is an encouragement for us at this time of Parish 2020 program and our plans for the renewal programs in the parish. If cultural diversity and difficulties caused by lack English proficiency among many parishioners challenging us, going by Jesus' logic, it is the opportune time to commence the renewal program in the parish. If you find the lack of resources and even the parish Priest is hard to understand, then it is an opportune time to commence our renewal program in the parish. Just as Jesus chose the unsophisticated people to be his apostles, we too do not need experts to make up a team to work towards Parish 2020 renewal program. It only require an openness of heart and mind to the Word of God and willingness to work with your pastor. I am, therefore not waiting for the people with leisure time in their hand and expertise to assist me with the ministries and evangelisation programs. I am looking for people who are prepared to challenge themselves, in spite of busy life. Open your heart and mind to the Word of God and respond to the call of the parish to the renewal ministries, so that 'the people in darkness will see a great light'.

MESSAGE FROM ARCHBISHOP ANTHONY FISHER OP, SYDNEY

February 16, 2017

My dear friends,

This week the Royal Commission into Institutionalised Responses to Child Sexual Abuse released details of the money paid to survivors of sexual abuse by the Church in Australia. In the case of the Archdiocese of Sydney, between 1980 and 2015 we provided financial assistance or compensation in the order of \$17.16 million.

It is important for everyone in the Archdiocese to know these payments did not come from money collected in the parishes. The Archdiocese made these payments by drawing down its assets and investments. All money collected in parishes goes to support the living costs of the clergy, and the needs of the parish where the money is collected. Parishioners need to be assured their generosity, week after week, is not contributing to Archdiocesan payments to meet our responsibilities towards victims or survivors. I want to thank all parishioners for your support, friendship and prayers during these difficult and often frustrating times.

We should be grateful that the work of the Royal Commission will help us understand more clearly what happened in our Church and what were the contributing factors, how and why we failed to respond as we should have, and the changes we must still put in place to ensure we are never again faced with such an horrific situation.

The Commission has also heard this week about the safeguarding policies and protocols we have developed in the Archdiocese. They are extensive and comprehensive and they are continually being improved. I want to thank our Safeguarding Office which has led this work, and all clergy, parish leaders and volunteers for their willingness to implement the new policies and practices required to ensure the safety of children and other vulnerable people.

Next week I will join other Archbishops on a panel at the Royal Commission to discuss the key issues of this current hearing.

Above all let us pray for all survivors and their families, both inside and outside the church, that they will experience God's healing grace.

Our Lady, Help of Christians, Comforter of the Afflicted, pray for us.
