First Sunday of Lent—Year A 5 March 2017

First Reading

Gen 2:7-9; 3:1-7

The Lord God fashioned man of dust from the soil. Then he breathed into his nostrils a breath of life, and thus man became a living being.

The Lord God planted a garden in Eden which is in the east, and there he put the man he had fashioned. The Lord God caused to spring up from the soil every kind of tree, enticing to look at and good to eat, with the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden.

The serpent was the most subtle of all the wild beasts that the Lord God had made. It asked the woman, 'Did God really say you were not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?' The woman answered the serpent, 'We may eat the fruit of the trees in the garden. But of the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden God said, "You must not eat it, nor touch it, under pain of death".' Then the serpent said to the woman, 'No! You will not die! God knows in fact that on the day you eat it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods, knowing good and evil.' The woman saw that the tree was good to eat and pleasing to the eye, and that it was desirable for the knowledge that it could give. So she took some of its fruit and ate it. She gave some also to her husband who was with her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened and they realised that they were naked. So they sewed fig-leaves together to make themselves loincloths.

Second Reading

Rom 5:12, 17-19

Sin entered the world through one man, and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. If it is certain that death reigned over everyone as the consequence of one man's fall, it is even more certain that one man, Jesus Christ, will cause everyone to reign in life who receives the free gift that he does not deserve, of being made righteous. Again, as one nor about your body and how you man's fall brought condemnation on everyone, so the good act of one man brings everyone life and makes them justified. As by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience many will be made righteous.

Gospel Mt 4:1-11

Jesus was led by the Spirit out into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights, after which he was very hungry, and the tempter came and said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to turn into loaves.' But he replied, 'Scripture says:

Man does not live on bread alone but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.' The devil then took him to the holy city and made him stand on the parapet of the Temple. 'If you are the Son of God,' he said, 'throw yourself down; for scripture says: He will put you in his angels' charge, and they will support you on their hands in case you hurt your foot against a stone.' Jesus said to him, 'Scripture also says:

You must not put the Lord your God to the test.' Next, taking him to a very high mountain, the devil showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendour. 'I will give you all these', he said, 'if you fall at my feet and worship me.' Then Jesus replied, 'Be off, Satan! For scripture says:

You must worship the Lord your God, and serve him alone.' Then the devil left him, and angels appeared and looked after him. 'That is why I am telling you not to worry about your life and what you are to eat, are to clothe it. Surely life means more than food, and the body more than clothing! Look at the birds in the sky. They do not sow or reap or gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not worth much more than they are? Can any of you, for all his worrying, add one single cubit to his span of life? And why worry about clothing? Think of the flowers growing in the fields; they never have to work or spin; yet I assure you that not even Solomon in all his regalia was robed like one of these. Now if that is how God clothes the grass in the field which is there today and thrown into the furnace tomorrow, will he not much more look after you, you men of little faith? So do not worry, do not say, "What are we to eat? What are we to drink? How are we to be clothed?" It is the pagans who set their hearts on all these things. Your heavenly Father knows you need them all. Set your hearts on his kingdom first, and on his righteousness, and all these other things will be given you as well. So do not worry about tomorrow; tomorrow will take care of itself. Each day has enough trouble of its

DO YOURSELF A FAVOUR

Last Wednesday, putting ash on the forehead we were told, "Repent and believe in Gospel". Repentance is turning away from sin. Most times we think of sin as transgression against God. That is how the Jewish faith also thought of sin. But Jesus redefined sin. When you and I make choices that does not help us to grow into the proper maturity we are meant to, then it is a sin. Adam and Eve were meant to have the fullness of happiness in paradise. It is their wrong choice that made them lose it.

One of our fundamental needs is food. But if you cannot go beyond what the world feeds you with, then we are not able to live a life of meaning and purpose. Unlike the animals, human lives find fulfilment by living with a purpose and meaning. We need to rely on the Word of God to live a life of meaning and purpose. That is why Jesus said, "Man does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God." Therefore if you are worried too much about earning plenty of money to have best pleasures of the world and neglect the wisdom of the Word of God, your life will not have the satisfaction it should have. If we cannot look any further than money and pleasure that is shunted life. Such choices are sinful, since it is not helping you ultimately.

There are times we complain like a child and say "God does not listen to my prayers" when things do not go the way we have prayed for and hoped. Without trusting in God we cannot have a life of hope and joy. If only we submit to God's will and plan, we will our life full of hope and joy. Any lack of such trust in God is disservice to yourself and it is a sin. That is why Jesus, when tempted by the devil said, "You must not put the Lord your God to the test".

Ultimate happiness and fulfilment is far beyond our worldly achievements. That should explain why a lot of high achievers are found unhappy and living self-pity or misery. We should not therefore make the achievements, whether it is money or status or other worldly accomplishments as the prime focus in our life. Should you do that, you will be doing a loser's choice. That is a sin. Jesus said, "You must worship the Lord your God, and serve him alone."

The choice is ours. What we make of our life depends on our choice. This Lent is a time for you to examine your conscience and make sure you are making the right choice in life. Do yourself a favour, turn away from sin and believe in Gospel.



The Greek word translated as 'sin' in the New Testament literally means 'miss the mark'. Its origin may lie in archery where the object was always to hit the mark; to miss the mark was to not achieve at one's best. Jesus set about trying to redefine the Jewish notion of sin from being a transgression against God that deserves punishment to the more compassionate idea that sin is a wandering off course that can be rectified — a missing of the mark. When he encountered someone who was missing the mark, Jesus called them back into right relationship.

The testing and temptation of Jesus echoes the plight of the people of Israel as they wandered in the desert for forty years. They relied on God to provide them with food and protection and ultimately lead them into the land that was promised to them. They had to trust that God would deliver these things in God's own time and way. Jesus is tempted to ignore God's time and ways by seizing for himself food, protection and ownership of the land. The temptations of Jesus and the people of Israel are all about trusting God.

Feasts & Memorials of the Week

Tuesday—Sts Perpetua & Felicity—Martyrs

Perpetua was a young married woman with a newly born son and arrested for refusing to offer sacrifice to the Emperor. She had many visions, including that of a ladder extending to



Heaven and a battle whereby she defeated
Satan. Felicity, a slave girl was also arrested and gave birth to a girl while in prison.
Perpetua and Felicity and several men were all found guilty of treason and were taken to the arena to be killed by wild beasts. Perpetua and Felicity showed great bravery and survived their encounter with a mad heifer, but at the request of the jeering crowd were eventually put to the sword.

Wednesday—St John of God

He was originally a soldier who fought for Spain against the French and the Turks. Around the age of forty, he repented his former life and converted to a life of service to God. In 1539 he bought a house and gave shelter and care to the sick and needy. After his death, John's followers formed a Religious Order of hospitalers, the Brothers of St John of God. He is the patron saint of nurses, hospitals and
