Fourth Sunday of Lent—Year A 26 March 2017

First Reading

1 Sm 16:1. 6-7. 10-13

The Lord said to Samuel, 'Fill your horn with oil and go. I am sending you to Jesse of Bethlehem, for I have chosen myself a king among his sons.' When Samuel arrived, he caught sight of Eliab and thought, 'Surely the Lord's anointed one stands there before him,' but the Lord said to Samuel, 'Take no notice of his appearance or his height for I have rejected him; God does not see as man sees; man looks at appearances but the Lord looks at the heart.' Jesse presented his seven sons to Samuel, but Samuel said to Jesse, 'The Lord has not chosen these.' He then asked Jesse, 'Are these all the sons you have?' He answered, 'There is still one left, the youngest; he is out looking after the sheep.' Then Samuel said to Jesse, 'Send for him; we will not sit down to eat until he comes.' Jesse had him sent for, a boy of fresh complexion, with fine eyes and pleasant bearing. The Lord said, 'Come, anoint him, for this is the one.' At this, Samuel took the horn of oil and anointed him where he stood with his brothers; and the spirit of the Lord seized on David and stayed with him from that day on.

Second Reading

Eph 5:8-14

You were darkness once, but now you are light in the Lord; be like children of light, for the effects of the light are seen in complete goodness and right living and truth. Try to discover what the Lord wants of you, having nothing to do with the futile works of darkness but exposing them by contrast. The things which are done in secret are things that people are ashamed even to speak of; but anything exposed by the light will be illuminated and anything illuminated turns into light. That is why it is said: Wake up from your sleep, rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you.

Gospel

Jn 9:1. 6-9. 13-17. 34-38

As Jesus went along, he saw a man who had been blind from birth. He spat on the ground, made a paste with the spittle, put this over the eyes of the blind man and said to him, 'Go and wash in the Pool of Siloam' (a name that means 'sent'). So the blind man went off and washed himself, and came away with his sight restored.

His neighbours and people who earlier had seen him begging said, 'Isn't this the man who used to sit and beg?' Some said, 'Yes, it is the same one.' Others said, 'No, he only looks like him.' The man himself said, 'I am the man.'

They brought the man who had been blind to the Pharisees. It had been a sabbath day when Jesus made the paste and opened the man's eyes, so when the Pharisees asked him how he had come to see, he said, 'He put a paste on my eyes, and I washed, and I can see.' Then some of the Pharisees said, 'This man cannot be from God: he does not keep the sabbath.' Others said, 'How could a sinner produce signs like this?' And there was disagreement among them. So they spoke to the blind man again, 'What have you to say about him yourself, now that he has opened your eyes?' 'He is a prophet' replied the man.

'Are you trying to teach us,' they replied 'and you a sinner through and through, since you were born!' And they drove him away.

Jesus heard they had driven him away, and when he found him he said to him, 'Do you believe in the Son of Man?' 'Sir,' the man replied 'tell me who he is so that I may believe in him.' Jesus said, 'You are looking at him; he is speaking to you.' The man said, 'Lord, I believe', and worshipped him

Blind Vision, See with Eyes of Christ

Van Tuong Nguyen was executed in Singapore in December 2015 for drug trafficking. He was an Australian citizen. While his trial was underway, so many, including politicians, church leaders, and even our Pope, prayed for him and pleaded with Singapore government for clemency. In this well publicised case of Van Nguyen, most people felt compassion for him, not because he was not guilty, but because what he did was perceived as the self-sacrificing filial love of a brother. In his apparently Christian love for his sibling, he failed to see the gravity of the crime he was committing. It took such tragic turns like being arrested and tried for him to see the severity of his wrong doing. Though he thought he was seeing things in proper perspective, he was blind to real Christian virtues.

John's narrative of Jesus giving sight to a man born blind is more of a revelation about the lack of sight the Pharisees and other religious people had. These people were really convinced that they had the right perspective and were doing the right thing by God. Their mind set up was no different to that of Van Nguyen who also thought that he was doing the right thing by his brother and his Christian faith, until the rude awakening. In spite of the miracles Jesus performed, and the various revelations he provided, the Pharisees failed to accept Jesus as the Christ who could lead them to the Kingdom of God. On the contrary, the man who knew of his limitations was open to the work of God in his life. Therefore he not only got his physical sight, but also the insight to know that Jesus is the Christ who has come with the Good News of the Kingdom of God. It gave him such a delight he wanted to follow Jesus. Whereas the Pharisees were busy finding reasons to condemn Jesus.

The comfort of the financial security and higher education can also make us blind to the revelations of God. There are plenty of people who are judgemental of the Body of Christ (Church) and quick to justify their lack of commitment. They think they have the right vision of everything, including demands of the Kingdom of God. Sadly for many of them it takes some shocking things to happen in their lives to wake up to the truth and look at life and need of commitment to the Kingdom of God in the proper perspective. About them Jesus said: "It is for judgement that I have come into the world, that those without sight may see and those with sight turn blind." Therefore my friends, never be tired of reading the sacred Scriptures, and participating in the Holy Communion of Eucharist to become part of the Body of Christ. Thus being with Christ you will always see everything in life with the eyes of Christ.

Lenten Light

The story of the man born blind is a perfect choice for the Lenten season. During this season we are invited once again to open our eyes to Jesus; to step out of darkness and into the light; to look towards the future with hope and not despair. When we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus at the Easter vigil, we celebrate the coming of the Light of the World into our lives. This annual call to turn away from darkness and walk in the light is a powerful and poetic call to focus our lives on the way of Jesus.

gospel focus

None so blind

There's a very old saying that has its roots in the Bible but is not a direct quote from the Bible: 'There are none so blind as those who will not see.' It would be a fitting summary of today's passage for there are two movements between darkness and light that are evident in the story. Firstly, there is the blind man who can see. He can see physically but can also see the truth of who Jesus is. Secondly, there are the Jewish authorities who have physical sight but are completely blind to the truth of Jesus.

Historical

Light of the World

The events of today's gospel passage occur within an extended passage of the gospel of John in which Jesus attends Jerusalem for the Feast of Tabernacles (Jn 7:1 following). A feature of the feast was the illumination of the Temple. Pilgrims would cover the Temple with lights and torches so that it shone out over the entire city. It was during this feast that Jesus declared himself to be the Light of the World and, a few verses later, healed the blind man and brought light into his world.

Nguyet's Story - Vietnam—Love Your Neighbour



Nguyet lives with a severe disability, and has suffered isolation in her native Vietnam as a result. A Caritas-supported program offered her education, creative outlets and much-needed community interaction. In a small town in Vietnam, a severe disability kept young Nguyet behind closed doors. Constrained by the high demands of her condition, her parents were also isolated from their neighbours.

There is a high level of disability in Vietnam, particularly as a legacy of war, but little support for families whose children have disabilities. People with disability have poorer health outcomes, lower educational achievements, lower economic participation and higher rates of poverty than people without disability.

The future seemed bleak for the whole family, until Nguyet's family became participants in a program supported by Caritas Australia. A neighbour kindly introduced the family to the Capacity Building for Parent Associations Supporting Children with Disabilities program, which has given them support on several levels.

The neighbour, a teacher, has been able to offer Nguyet home-based education, and there is capacity building for her parents and others in the same situation, through their local Parents' Association. At Association meetings, Nguyet's mother has been able to increase her skills for managing her daughter's condition, and share her experiences with other parents of children with disabilities.

Nguyet has learnt to read and write and better manage her physical needs, and her creative gifts have been unlocked. Now she is increasingly engaging with her neighbours, and she and her parents are more confident about her future.

"Whenever they are supported and cared for properly, children with disabilities can [achieve] change." - Duong, Nguyet's case manager
