Reflections

From the Perspective of a Disciple

As we passed through a little village near Sidon this Canaanite woman suddenly started calling on the master to help her daughter. We all expected the master to help her out as usual but he really put her in her place! He told her that his ministry was not for pagans like her. That should have stopped her, but she kept on and on, even turning the master's words back on him! She was rude. We were about to push her out of the way so that the master could move on when he suddenly told her that her faith was great and that her daughter was better. Great faith? A Canaanite? He never ceases to surprise us!

Historical Context

When Moses led the Israelites out of Egypt, the 'Promised Land' they sought was the land of Canaan (approximately the area of modern Israel, TransJordan, Syria and Lebanon). Here they were commanded to utterly destroy the Canaanites and to

subdue the land. (Exodus 23:23-24) The Israelites never successfully removed all the Canaanites from the Palestine region. By the time of Jesus, the Israelites had established themselves in the region between Judea in the south and Galilee in the north, while the original inhabitants of the area had been 'squeezed out' predominantly to the north. The Canaanites were dispossessed of their land by the Israelites and it is easy to see why there was tension between them.

Scriptural Context

This passage is the second of a group of three stories that make up Chapter 15 of Matthew's Gospel. The first story shows Jesus challenging traditional views of cleanliness and uncleanliness—one of the great separators between Jews and Gentiles. The story in this week's gospel follows with its account of the Canaanite woman's great faith being recognised. Finally, Matthew relates the story of the feeding of the four thousand—a dramatic sign by Jesus of the open invitation to receive his message and ministry. The three stories taken together, form a powerful chapter that makes clear that the message of Jesus is not exclusively for the

The Canaanite Woman who Subverted the Idea of Faith

I got home from my home visit last Tuesday night. The next day, Wednesday, I was at the regional conference of Pastor, Principal, REC, Family Educators of the Catholic Schools, the whole day. The facilitator of the conference was Mons Tony Dougherty, and he spoke about the 'spirituality of contradictions'. He enumerated a number of bible passages to make his point. The bible presents us with a number of contradictions. Jesus' encounter with the Canaanite woman (Mt 15:21-31) is one of such kind. While Tony calls it contradiction, I would say that it is something more than a contradiction. In this passage and in most of the Gospels we see how Jesus subverts the religious view as well as the world view of the people. While you and I should be expecting real faith-filled response from the Jews who were considered the chosen people of God, it is the non-Jewish, Canaanite woman who demonstrated the best of the faith-filled response to the Messiah, Jesus Christ.

The hypocrisy of the elite of the Jewish religion, Pharisees and the Scribes angered Jesus. He asked, "Why do you break God's commandments for the sake of your own traditions?" (Mt 15:3) Jesus also accused the Jewish people, who boasted of the Law of Moses they possess, as the 'blind leading the blind' (Mt15:14) which would bring nothing but disaster. Such harsh criticism of the powerful Jewish leaders made so many powerful enemies that it was hard for Jesus to continue in his homeland. Therefore he escaped into a non-Jewish territory, Tyre and Sidon, present day southern Lebanon.

Locals of this area are not Jewish and the Jewish people would refer to them as dogs, such was the hate. In such a situation a local woman, a Canaanite, pleads to Jesus to heal her daughter. Jesus first ignores her plea. Then when the plea is more intense he dismisses her harshly saying, "I am sent only to the lost sheep of Israel" That made the woman all the more insistent. What follows next is terrible. Jesus says "it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the house-dogs". Jesus in effect was calling her a house dog. Such contempt is typical of Jewish people against pagans. But in this Gospels case, this brings about a great profession of faith from the part of the pagan Canaanite woman. She has already called Jesus Son of David alluding to him as the Saviour the Jews were waiting for. The pagan woman makes a profound profession of faith in Jesus and says "but even house-dogs can eat the scraps that fall from their master's table" (Mt15:27). At that strong expression of faith, the Canaanite woman had her wish granted. In doing so Jesus makes another revelation that the Saviour the Jewish people were waiting for, is not just for the Jewish people, but for anyone who has faith. Salvation and Jesus's message goes beyond all cultural barriers. Jesus subverted the world about Faith and Religiosity.

What are the implications of this message for us? We cannot be satisfied by the inheritance of our faith. We cannot be satisfied by doing the so called "Christian things" and boast about our Christian culture. We have to actively put our trust in God. Is your faith strong like that of the Canaanite woman or is it more like that of the Pharisees and the Scribes whom Jesus called hypocrites?

Feasts & Memorials of the Week

Monday—St Pius X, Pope



Guiseppe Sarto was born in 1835. From this humble beginning he was eventually elected pope in 1903. His motto was "To restore all things in Christ". Pius X was remembered for advocating the frequent reception of holy communion of children from the age of about seven; reform of church

music, encouraging the use of Gregorian chant; reform of Canon Law; reorganization of the Roman curia; and separation of church and state in France. He found some aspects of the Vatican's wealth and ceremony distasteful. Before his death in 1914, he wrote in his will, "I was born poor, I have lived poor, and I wish to die poor.

Tuesday - The Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Feast was established by Pius XII in 1955 and was celebrated on 31 May. Since 1969 it hás been observed on 22 August to stress its

relationship to the Assumption (15 August). On the day of her Assumption, Mary our Mother was solemnly crowned by Christ and received by the whole court of Héaven as Queen. What Christ has done in Heaven and the Church was done on our behalf we should now do individually, that is, we should recognize Mary's Queenship, enthrone her in our homes, consecrate ourselves to her and, by this means, establish in our lives the reign of Mary Immaculate Queen of the Universe. Thursday—St Bartholomew

St Bartholomew was one of the twelve apostles, but very little is known about him. Scholars believe that he was the man known as Nathanael, who was introduced to Jesus by St Philip. In the synoptic Gospels he is named Bartholomew, which means "son of Tolmai". Some believe that he may



have preached in India, where a Hebrew copy of Matthew's Gospel was found – believed to have been left by Bartholomew. He is also believed to have preached in Armenia where

he was martyred.

Sydney Catholic Schools—Media Release

Outstanding gains in NAPLAN sustained in Sydney Catholic Schools

Sydney Catholic schools have experienced their best year ever in the 2017 NAPLAN test gains, maintaining a trend of continual improvement in academic achievement. This year's results in Catholic schools showed a substantial improvement in all year levels, particularly in the areas of Reading and Numeracy. Once again, Sydney Catholic schools performed significantly above the national and state means in every dimension of the national testing data.

The Executive Director of Sydney Catholic Schools, Dr Dan White, was delighted with the 2017 results.

"The rate of student growth achieved by our students was particularly impressive," he said. "On virtually every indicator, the level of improvement exceeded the comparable improvements in overall NSW data."

Of special note was the outstanding performance of Year 3 students in Reading with more than 64% of all children achieving results in the top two bands, compared to a state average of 51%.

Similarly in Numeracy, 41.5% of Year 5 Catholic school students were placed in the top two bands, nine percentage points higher than their state counterparts (32.5%). Dr White especially commended Year 9 students in Catholic schools for a 'across the board' lift in standards.

"For many years, the national Year 9 performance in Writing has shown a gradual decline. This year our students improved their mean scores by 21 points, and the percentage of students in the top two achievement bands jumped from 13% in 2016 to 22% this year."

Dr White also paid tribute to the outstanding professional work of Sydney Catholic Schools' teachers, principals and support staff.

"Our system of 152 Catholic schools has strongly embraced a whole of school improvement culture. Driven by the detailed analysis of student data and informed by the latest educational research, each school has formulated explicit improvement goals that focus on meeting the needs of every child.

"It is all about maximising the learning growth of every child", Dr White added. "Teachers and learning support officers have dedicated themselves to a multi-faceted program of professional learning and devote enormous time and energy in personalising the learning program for each student.

"The success achieved in Catholic schools has not happened overnight or by accident, but rather by our community of schools being focussed and committed to ensuring each child achieves their God-given potential." Sydney Catholic Schools (SCS) offers a non-selective, low-fee education for over 70,000 children, across 152 schools in the Archdiocese of Sydney.

Dear brothers in the ministry of mercy

The Royal Commission's Report on Criminal Justice issued yesterday is more than 600 pages long, with 85 recommendations, and will take quite some time for Church leaders and their advisers to digest, let alone the rest of the community. But we understand it recommends that the civil law no longer privilege what Catholics and Orthodox Christians confess to God through their priest in the Sacrament of Confession.

Australia has always recognised the freedom of the Christian Churches and other serious faiths to practice their sacraments and other rituals unimpeded. I believe we should continue to give people of faith that space.

One in four Australians belongs to a church – Catholic or Orthodox – that believes in Confession. Some came to this country from Communist Vietnam or totalitarian regimes in Eastern Europe, precisely to enjoy the freedom to practice that religion in Australia. What is now proposed would be a grave interference with the practice of their faith.

Child sexual abuse is a terrible crime. It is very, very rare for a perpetrator to confess it, as sadly perpetrators do not accept how evil their deeds are. If trust in the "seal" or absolute confidentiality of Confession is diminished, then it is less likely that the rare perpetrator who does approach a priest will be encouraged to face the evil of their actions, to report to the authorities, and to take appropriate action to cease the offending.

Moreover, If a perpetrator or a victim of abuse tells a Confessor of this crime in Confession, the Confessor is free to ask the penitent to repeat this to him outside Confession so that they can resolve together what further action might be taken.

It is also noteworthy that the Royal Commission report does not propose removing the legal privilege currently recognised for confidential communications with lawyers or psychiatrists. Nor does it examine the non-institutional settings where most child abuse occurs. Why should priests be the only ones targeted here?

I understand that some people purporting to speak for the Catholic Church have welcomed the proposed change in the law, or suggested that contrite penitents might be refused absolution until they self-incriminate, or claimed that what victims of abuse report in Confession need not be treated as confidential. I do not agree.

Like Archbishop Hart (whose statement I attach), I believe the spiritual encounter between a penitent and God must remain inviolable and that Catholic priests and penitents should not be threatened with a criminal offence for practising their religion. The proposal to abolish the confessional seal will help no child. We should focus on measures that really will protect children and I fully support every effort by the Royal Commission and others to do that. We should not interfere with a practice core to the religious belief of so many Australians.

In the meantime I exhort all priests to maintain an absolute seal on everything they learn from beginning to end of each Confession. And I thank you, dear brothers in the ministry of mercy, for persevering in generously offering your people opportunities to participate in this sacrament.
