Reflections Scriptural Context: Quoting Scripture

he question and response that we see in this gospel passage was a common form of scholarly debate in the Jewish tradition. The Pharisees ask Jesus which of the commandments is the greatest. Jesus responds directly by quoting the commandment from the ancient scriptures. His reply, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind,' compared to the form Doubern and Compared to the form the ancient service to the form the f directly from Deuteronomy 6:5. Further, Jesus' follow up, 'you must love your neighbour as yourself,' comes from Leviticus 19:18. Deuteronomy and Leviticus are two of the first five books of the Bible that make up the Jewish Torah,

Living the Gospel: Compassion.

Jesus' words call us to love our neighbour as ourselves. We are called to treat

others as we would like to be treated ourselves. To be able to do this, we need to picture ourselves in their placeexperiencing all that they are experiencing; not imposing our own values and circumstances. To see ourselves in the palce of another is the key to responding with compassion. The origin of the word, compassion, means experiencing with. If we are able to truly 'experience with' another person perhaps then we can genuinely recognise and respond to their needs.

Gospel Focus: Love your neighbour as yourself.

There is an implicit, or understood, commandment within the command to love your neighbour as yourself. That is, we must first love ourselves. Whilst to say someone 'loves themselves' is used as a criticism of a person who is a bit too vain, that is not what is intended here. If we are to love others as we love ourselves we must first be content and happy with who we are. It is only when we are comfortable with who we are that we are able to reach out to those around us with compassion.

Loving God and Neighbour

Islamic terrorists do the atrocities in the name of God. Their version of love of God does not have any consideration for the people at large. Therefore they consider their violence as Jihad, or holy war. At the same time the communists and other movements think religion is against any welfare of the people. A lot of people find themselves between these two polarised views. Though not so much extreme, the Judaism of Jesus time also debated whether loving God is the greatest commandment or is it loving our neighbour. They based their arguments on their scripture. Deuteronomy 6:5 says "You must love the Lord you God with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your mind". For many Jews therefore this was the most important commandment. But in the Book of Leviticus, another Book of the Scripture, says, "love your neighbour as yourself." (Lev 19:18,34). So much emphasis is given to 'loving the neighbour' that some Jewish Rabbis considered this as the most important commandment. After all both Deuteronomy and Leviticus are part of the Torah on which Judaism was based. In fact the Rabbis identified 613 commandments in the Torah as important. Therefore the Pharisees thought they could trap Jews in an apparently simple question like "which is the greatest commandment?" They thought whichever commandment Jesus chose as the most important, they could find a counter argument for it and prove Jesus wrong. But "Jesus said, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: you must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also." (Mt 22:37-38) No one need to chose between 'loving God' and 'loving neighbour'. In fact both these precepts together make the most important commandment. No one can say honestly that they love God if they do not have proper love of the neighbour. Similarly we cannot have the best welfare strategy for our fellow human beings if we do not have real love of God. For example, someone with the love of God, the author of life, will think of a better palliative care for the dying, than legalised killing. But for someone without any love of God, a terminally ill person is only a disposable commodity.

In a humanitarian society like ours, loving the neighbour is easily understood. Most people support charities and welfare activities all over the world. Therefore we do not mind digging deep into our pockets to support causes like the mission school in Garo Hills, India. But the same cannot be said about loving God. Many may not know how to express their love of God. If we love God, we will always aspire to be in touch with God, like a child is always wanting to be with his/her parent. A life of prayerfulness is an expression of longing for God. As people initiated into Eucharist, we are even more privileged to communicate with God in a special way, through the Sacrament of Holy Communion with the Body of Christ. Loving God and Neighbour is the mark of our Christian Faith.

Saturday – St Charles Borromeo



St Charles Borromeo Born in Arona (Italy) in 1538. Died on this day in 1584 in Milan. Only twenty-two when he was appointed cardinal, secretary of state, and given the administration of the diocese of Milan by his uncle, Pius IV. Prominent in the final sessions of the Council of Trent during 1562-1563 and, at its end, was ordained presbyter, then bishop and became archbishop of Milan. Known for implementing the Council's reforms in liturgy, education, presbyteral formation, and diocesan organisation. Remembered as an exemplary and pastoral bishop and an ardent proponent of reform and renewal.

Drop in Clergy Remuneration

Last Wednesday, I received the Pastoral Revenue returns survey for the Year ended 30 June 2017. It shows the First Collection of all parishes in Sydney Archdiocese and compare it with the First Collection of the previous year (year ending 30 June 2016). It shows that last Financial Year the parish First Collection to support your priest was \$48160 which was \$5582 less than the previous year. The Christmas and Easter Collections also were substantially lower last Financial Year. It dropped from \$6102 to \$2219 last year. I am not sure why parishioners have decided to pay less for their priest's expenses.

What is Halloween?

Halloween is a celebration catching on with many young people in Australia, thanks to American culture finding its way Down Under. It is seen as another excuse for young people to have a fun time, to party and dress in outlandish costumes. I do not think many who take part in this are aware of the origin and meaning of the Halloween tradition. The term 'Halloween' is derived from the concept of 'Holy Evening'. Christians traditionally had a day dedicated to remember the good people who have passed away from this world. Along with this tradition there were non-Christian traditions especially in Europe, of the belief that unless the spirits of the dead are treated well with food and drinks they will not leave the human world. Combination of these two traditions brought about some of the practices of Halloween.

Non-Christian traditions relating to the dead also had rituals of divinizing, using symbols of death. Carved vegetables and dressing up like dead bodies or spirts were part of such divinations. Thus were the origins of Halloween. Celebrations of Halloween became popular in Americas and with American influence it is reaching places like our own country Australia. Thus, though the roots of the celebrations were in the aspiration to please the dead spirits, not many of those who celebrate it are aware of those fundamentals. The Christian approach to our beloved friends and family who are deceased is different. All good people, especially those who have found favour with God are remembered on All Saints Day, 1st of November. It is a day of celebration. It celebrates the goodness of our beloved ones. It also celebrates God's goodness to our beloved ones.

The Day of All Souls which is observed the day after the All Saints day is the day to pray for all deceased people we know of. On this day we pray for God's mercy on our dear departed ones especially for the shortcomings they may have had in their lives due to human weakness. There will be a special Mass for the deceased on Thursday the 2nd of November at SPC Church at 7 PM. Then on the last Friday of November (24th), there will be a candlelight Mass at St Peter Chanel Church commencing at 8 PM. This will conclude the month of remembering the dead. But on these occasions none of the participants will be dressing up to mimic dead bodies or spirits. The focus will be more on God's love and his goodness as well as the goodness and fondness of our dear ones. Every participant will be invited to light candles to remember the dear departed ones.
