First Reading Jer 31:31-34

See, the days are coming – it is the Lord who speaks – when I will make a new covenant with the House of Israel and the House of Judah, but not a covenant like the one I made with their ancestors on the day I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt. They broke that covenant of mine, so I had to show them who was master. It is the Lord who speaks. No, this is the covenant I will make with the House of Israelwhen those days arrive – it is the Lord who speaks. Deep within them I will plant my Law, writing it on their hearts. Then I will be their God and they shall be my people. There will be no further need for neighbour to try to teach neighbour, or brother to say to brother, 'Learn to know the Lord!' Let All Glamour Decay and Allow the True Life to Shoot Up

Stephen Hawking who recently died was a legend. He was born in a time England was struggling to get over the consequences of World War II. To make it worse this brilliant boy's body was paralysed at the age of 21 and the doctors gave him only two more years of life. But the gift of the brilliant mind, which he had, is to be put to greater use. Tracing his development as a thinker, he explains how the prospect of an early death urged him onward through numerous intellectual breakthroughs. Yes the awareness of degeneration can evoke total dedication to a single direction in life, with great results.

Stephen Hawking defied the debilitating motor neuron decease and the forecast of the brevity of life. He defied a natural disaster. There are also cases of self-inflicted disasters causing new lease of life. A lady once asked a reformed Alcoholic from an AA group how to help her husband who has a drinking problem and making their lives a total mess. The advice she received was to wait till the alcoholic husband hit the rock bottom. Only from the total regeneration of his life, a new life of dignity could rise.

Last Tuesday I attended the Clergy Conference of Sydney Archdiocese. It was very alive with passionate priests, Deacons and bishops mapping out a Church that will show the face of Christ to the world. This is happening at a time all are made aware of the degeneration of the Church hierarchy through heinous child abuse and other corruptions. Having hit the rock bottom of losing integrity the Body of Christ, the clergy is very hopeful of a rise to a life of glory for the Church.

It is not just the disasters, natural or man-made, that can lead to glorious life. Words of Wisdom Jesus had for the gentile Greeks who came to meet him was this. "Unless a wheat grain falls on the ground and dies, it remains only a single grain; but if it dies, it yields a rich harvest. Anyone who loves his life loses it; anyone who hates his life in this world will keep it for the eternal life." (Jn 12:24-25) We need to bury our Ego, Pride, Flamboyance, Comforts and all that make up our worldly self to rise to the glory of eternal life. Here it is not a disaster, but self sacrifice. Jesus is asking us to make self-sacrifice of burying our worldly self, to rise to the glory of eternal life.

Jesus entered Jerusalem, ready to sacrifice his life on the Cross. We enter the Church ready to sacrifice all worldly glamour of our life so that we can attain true life. Let all glamour decay and allow the true life to shoot up.

REFLECTIONS ON JOHN 12:20-33

Scriptural Context: The Final Days

Today's reading reminds us that we are closing in on the events of the Passion that we will remember more closely over the next couple of weeks.

Although the Gospel of John appears to have Jesus in and in around Jerusalem quite often, the events described in this week's reading take place in the preparation for Passover, immediately before the final days leading of to Jesus' death and resurrection. It is a fitting culmination to the Sunday gospels of Lent. It prepares us for the account of the Passion that will be the gospel next week.

Have You Thought? Why Greeks?

The gospel reading begins with some Greeks wanting to meet Jesus. Why is it significant that they were Greeks? The Jews were very clear about the distinction between Jews and non-Jews (Gentiles). Regardless of their intentions and goodwill, a Gentile was simply not a Jew. Greeks, who worshipped an entire pantheon of gods, were regarded as almost as far from Jewish belief in one God as was possible. Yet Jesus made clear that his message was for everyone: Jew and Gentile alike. His death and resurrection would bring a 'rich harvest' of belief among Gentiles as well as Jews.

Gospel Focus: Love of Life

Jesus says, 'Anyone who loves (their) life loses it; any one who hates (their) life in this world will keep it for the eternal life.' This can seem pretty tough! It challenges us about how much we cling to the 'things' of this life. Are we concerned about the labels on our clothes; the number of our friends; how much money we have; the sort of house we live in? If this is the 'life' that we place meaning on, then we will surely lose it. However, if we put aside the world's focus on material things and focus our attention on others then we are assured of eternal life.
