## First Reading

Acts 4:8-12

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Peter said: 'Rulers of the people, and elders! If you are questioning us today about an act of kindness to a cripple, and asking us how he was healed, then I am glad to tell you all, and would indeed be glad to tell the whole people of Israel, that it was by the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene, the one you crucified, whom God raised from the dead, by this name and by no other that this man is able to stand up perfectly healthy, here in your presence, today. ## Ideal to Follow

Who is an ideal person? Look at what the young parents insist their children to do. That would tell us what we consider as ideal or good. Academic excellence is what some parents want their children to focus on. No expenses are spared for tuition and for finding the best of colleges and universities for their children. Then there are others who are good at sports, athletics, or some forms of art. Thinking of the money and prestige that can be gained, the focus for such people would be to top the rank in their skills and abilities. Most of the world make ideals of these high achievers.

The imagery Jesus picked up to present as ideal to follow is that of a shepherd. In a world where most people looked up to the learned rabbis, people of high status like Pharisees and Scribes, kings and royals, shepherds were hardly any ideals or heroes to follow. Yet Jesus chose the shepherds as the ideal imagery to learn from for life. It is not might, or social status that make the lives of shepherds good. Though their contemporaries called them gossipers, the shepherds were notable for their heroic dedication to their sheep fold they cared for. Moreover they made a 'personal relationship' with each of their sheep. In fact there is nothing more noble than a life of dedication and personal relationship.

While most people live a life of dedication and personal relationship in their families, I, like most of the religious, find fulfilment and meaning in my life through the dedication to my parish and personal relationship I am able to develop with my parishioners.

It is not enough to be dedicated and related at a human level. With God also we need to be intimately related and dedicated. Jesus Christ dedicated his life for us so much that he died on the cross for us. He loved us so much that he won victory over death and promised us resurrection. He also invited us to enter into a personal relationship with him. Coming into union with Christ through the Sacrament of the Holy Communion is the best of personal relationship I can have with God. When it comes to meaning and fulfilment of life, my dedication in the name of Christ and the personal relationship I maintain with Christ surpasses everything else. Christ knows me and you like a shepherd. Jesus sacrificed his life for you and I like a good shepherd would do it for his sheep. Therefore Jesus Christ is the ideal to follow.

# **REFLECTIONS ON JOHN 10:11-18**

### Scriptural Context. The Shepherd Messiah

The gospels go to great lengths to affirm the lineage of Jesus and associate him with the house of David, the first great Jewish king. David began life as a simple boy tending his father's flock of sheep. When the line of kings was instigated through David they were charged with being 'shepherds' of their people. However, down through the line of kings, this care for the people was lost and they ceased to be 'shepherds'. Jesus' claim to be the good shepherd is his claim to be in the line of the true kings of Israel—a shepherd of the people.

# Historical Context. The GOOD Shepherd?

The John gospel writer's use of the image of Jesus as the good shepherd would have been a confronting image for the initial audience. Shepherds in first century Palestine were far from the idyllic pastoral image that we generally associate with the image. They occupied one of the lowest steps on the social ladder—men of such poor reputation that they could only be trusted to herd sheep; they certainly couldn't be trusted around other people! Jesus' use of the image cut two ways: it was a confronting image for the audience; but it was also a challenge to those leaders who had been charged to 'shepherd' their people and behaved no better than thieves-Jesus was giving them an image of what it means to be a good shepherd.

# Different View. The Modern-Day Shepherd.

Today's audiences can tend to struggle a bit with the image of Jesus as the good shepherd. In countries like Australia and the United States, the image of sheep is one of huge flocks of sheep that number in their hundreds and thousands and roam freely over enormous open plains. I guess we also tend to look on sheep as pretty stupid animals that will follow anything anywhere. It doesn't seem to work to put Jesus into this image of vast sheep stations. The idea of a shepherd knowing his sheep individually seems a bit ridiculous in this context.

### **FEASTS & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK**



### Thursday, 26 April - St Mark, evangelist

Died about the year 74. Usually identified with the John Mark whose mother's house in Jerusalem was a meeting place for the apostles, and with the young man who followed Christ after his arrest (Mark 14:51). A cousin of Saint Barnabas (11 June). Accompanied Saint Paul (29 June) on his first missionary journey and later followed him to Rome. A companion of Saint Peter (29 June) and traditionally credited with the gospel which reflects Peter's teaching and memoirs. Honoured as the founder of the Church in Alexandria.

# Saturday, 28 April - St Peter Chanel, Parish Patron (Memorial)

The protomartyr of the South Seas, St. Peter Chanel was born in 1803 at Clet in the diocese of Belley, France. His intelligence and simple piety brought him to the attention of the local priest, Father Trompier, who saw to his elementary education. Entering the diocesan Seminary, Peter won the affection and the esteem of both students and professors. After his ordination he found himself in a rundown country parish and completely revitalized it in the three year span that he remained there. However, his mind was set on missionary work; so, in 1831, he joined the newly formed Society of Mary (Marists) which concentrated on missionary work at home and abroad. To his dismay, he was appointed to teach at the seminary at Belley and remained there for the next five years, diligently performing his duties.



In 1836, the Society was given the New Hebrides in the Pacific as a field for evangelization, and the jubilant Peter was appointed Superior of a little band of missionaries sent to proclaim the Faith to its inhabitants. On reaching their destination after an arduous ten month journey, the band split up and St. Peter went to the Island of Futuna accompanied by a lay brother and an English layman, Thomas Boog. They were at first well received by the pagans and their king Niuliki who had only recently forbidden cannibalism. However, the kings jealousy and fear were aroused when the missionaries learned the language and gained the people's confidence; he realized the adoption of the Christian Faith would lead to the abolition of some of the prerogatives he enjoyed as both high priest and sovereign.

Finally, when his own son expressed a desire to be baptized, the king's hatred erupted and he dispatched a group of his warriors to set upon the saintly head of the missionaries. Thus, on April 28, 1841, three years after his arrival, St. Peter was seized and clubbed to death by those he had come to save. And his death brought his work to completion - within five months the entire island was converted to Christianity.


