Second Reading

Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed man, and say, 'Come this way to the best seats'; then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that?

Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

Gospel Mk 7:31-37

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly.

And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'

Reflections by Fr George Kallumkal

The first reading is taken from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah 35:4-7 and it says, "Have courage, do not fear." and "Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unsealed, then the lame shall leap like a deer and the tongues of the dumb sing for joy; for water gushes in the desert, streams in the wasteland, the scorched earth becomes a lake, the parched land springs of water." With the Saviour everything will be changed and a wonderful blessing is waiting for everyone. Everything will be changed.



The second reading is from the Letter of St. James 2:1-5. "It was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him." The subject is that we should not grade people according to external appearance, for a person's quality is something that derives from his union with God—the more humble and understanding he is, the more honour he deserves.

The gospel is taken from the gospel of Mark 7:31-37. When we meditate deeply on this passage we can see Christ as the Lord, Christ as a teacher, Christ as a friend and how Christ should be in my life everyday.

Christ the Lord: Even after so many miracles and wonders people took Jesus as only as a wonder worker, or just as a politician and considered his Kingdom to be merely another earthly reign. He wanted more time to explain his vision, to convince people that the Kingdom of God went far beyond politics and economics, touching people's hearts and bringing them back into communion with God. The miracles were meant to be signs, confirmations of the truth of his teachings, and invitations to trust and obey him. Unfortunately, although many people were willing to be cured by him, few were willing to suffer with him – that became clear at the time of his passion.

And yet, to be a citizen of his Kingdom means both enjoying his benefits and living under his rule – that is bringing thoughts, words, and actions into line with his standard and example.

Christ the Teacher: We should never despair of the power of God. No soul is too hardened to be penetrated by Christ's love and forgiveness; the greatest sinners often make the greatest saints. Though someone appears deaf to the Word of Life and unable to respond to the invitations of the Holy Spirit, our confidence must never be shaken, for Jesus "makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak. He is a faithful and committed teacher He is always with the needy.

Christ the Friend: Jesus is touching this poor man's ears and tongue and speaking the word of command. What comes across in this encounter is God's humility. Christ designs to bring the healing power of God into this man's life through symbolic gestures and visible signs. He comes to save us in a way appropriate to that nature. Whatever God created is good and useful for us and it must be used properly and carefully. We should be grateful for all his gifts and for his patience with us.

Christ in My Life: I want to follow you through thick and thin, Lord. You are faithful, and you govern my life and the entire world with perfect wisdom. Open my eyes, enlighten my mind, so that I will discover your presence and your will in each moment, in every circumstance. You never cease to draw me to yourself; never let me stop seeking your face.

Sometimes the obstacles to making your Kingdom grow seem insurmountable, but in truth they never are. You made the deaf hear and the mute speak, Lord! You can give me all the grace I need to overcome every sinful habit and fulfil my mission in life. Make me a channel of your peace, Lord.

Thank you for the sacraments, and thank you for the beauties of nature and culture. You show your patience and gentleness by speaking to me through these things, in ways that I can understand. Help me to take advantage of every moment in order to know and serve you better. In all my relationships, Lord, especially the ones most difficult for me, grant me the grace to be like you: patient, humble, and generous.

REFLECTIONS ON MARK 7:31-37

Scriptural Context. Isaiah's Prophecy.

All three synoptic gospel writers were at pains to demonstrate that Jesus was the fulfilment of the prophecies of the scriptures. This reference to Isaiah's prophecy appears in all three synoptic gospels. It is perhaps most familiar in the context of the Gospel of Luke, where the gospel writer actually combines it with a different passage from Isaiah and portrays Jesus as reading it in the synagogue as an announcement of his mission (Lk 4:16-21). It is good to have the Isaiah text as the first reading this week and then see the way it is referred to in the gospel of the day.

Living the Gospel. Open to compassion.


When Isaiah described the sings by which the Messiah would be recognised, he identified those people who were isolated from society by their physical afflictions. He portrayed a Messiah who released them to re-enter society. That is what Jesus did time and time again. In the healing of the deaf and dumb man, Jesus called on all those around him to also be opened—that their hearts may be opened to compassion. Jesus called to us through today's gospel to also be open to compassion and open to the needs of those around us.

Gospel Focus. Ephphatha.

The healing that Jesus works in this passage is perhaps one of the most 'physical' of his healing actions. He puts his fingers in the man's ears and places spittle on his tongue. It is an incredibly intimate contact with a complete stranger and someone regarded as outcast and unclean because of his disabilities. When Jesus speaks the word of healing, Ephphatha ('Be opened'), he appears to be speaking not only to the man but to all those listening. Be open to the possibility of embracing those you have cast out; be open to a different understanding of Messiah.

FEASTS & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Thursday, 13 September—St John Chrysostom



Born in Antioch about 347. Died in exile in Comana (Turkey) on 14 September 407. After some years as a hermit, he was a priest at Antioch, where his brilliant preaching and catechesis earned him the sobriquet "Chrysostom" (goldenmouthed). Appointed patriarch of Constantinople in 397. His reforms,

preaching, and ascetic life led to opposition from court and clergy and eventual banishment. Remembered for his simplicity of life, his care of the poor, the courage of his witness, and his effective preaching of the Scriptures.

Friday, 14 September - The Exaltation of the Holy Cross
Originally this day commemorated the dedication of
Constantine's Basilica of the Holy Sepulchre in the fourth
century; after the celebration, the wood of the cross was
venerated. The feast spread in the West after the recovery of
the relics of the cross from Persia in the seventh century. A
feast of the Lord, it celebrates the "lifting up" of the Son of

Man on the cross, into glory, and the paradox of the cross as a sign of humiliation and death, yet the source of victory and life.



Saturday, 15 September - Our Lady of Sorrows



This commemoration originated in the medieval devotion to the seven sorrows of Mary. Approved for the Servite order in the seventeenth century, it was extended to the whole Western Church in 1814 by Pius VII in thanksgiving for his release from captivity under Napoleon. In the light of Simeon's

prophecy about a sword piercing Mary's soul (Luke 2:35), the feast celebrates Mary, first disciple and first to share in the pain and triumph of the cross.

The cross is Christ's glory and triumph

A discourse of St Andrew of Crete

We are celebrating the feast of the cross which drove away darkness and brought in the light. As we keep this feast, we are lifted up with the crucified Christ, leaving behind us earth and sin so that we may gain the things above. So great and outstanding a possession is the cross that he who wins it has won a treasure. Rightly could I call this treasure the fairest of all fair things and the costliest, in fact as well as in name, for on it and through it and for its sake the riches of salvation that had been lost were restored to us.

Had there been no cross, Christ could not have been crucified. Had there been no cross, life itself could not have been nailed to the tree. And if life had not been nailed to it, there would be no streams of immortality pouring from Christ's side, blood and water for the world's cleansing. The legal bond of our sin would not be cancelled, we should not have attained our freedom, we should not have enjoyed the fruit of the tree of life and the gates of paradise would not stand open. Had there been no cross, death would not have been trodden underfoot, nor hell despoiled.

Therefore, the cross is something wonderfully great and honourable. It is great because through the cross the many noble acts of Christ found their consummation – very many indeed, for both his miracles and his sufferings were fully rewarded with victory. The cross is honourable because it is both the sign of God's suffering and the trophy of his victory. It stands for his suffering because on it he freely suffered unto death. But it is also his trophy because it was the means by which the devil was wounded and death conquered; the barred gates of hell were smashed, and the cross became the one common salvation of the whole world.

The cross is called Christ's glory; it is saluted as his triumph. We recognise it as the cup he longed to drink and the climax of the sufferings he endured for our sake. As to the cross being Christ's glory, listen to his words: Now is the Son of Man glorified, and in him God is glorified, and God will glorify him at once. And again: Father, glorify me with the glory I had with you before the world came to be. And once more: "Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven: "I have glorified it and will glorify it again." Here he speaks of the glory that would accrue to him through the cross. And if you would understand that the cross is Christ's triumph, hear what he himself also said: When I am lifted up, then I will draw all men to myself. Now you can see that the cross is Christ's glory and triumph.

John at Ecce Homo

It is a delightful experience to be at Jerusalem at this time of the year. There are three major Jewish Feasts celebrated in this month. This Monday is the Feast of ROSH HASHANA, which is commonly known as Jewish New Year. But surprisingly it is not the beginning of the year. It is actually the middle of the Jewish Year. This feast has origins in harvest festivities and thanksgiving to God for His providence. Next week is YOM KIPPUR, another major feast in Jewish Calendar. Five days later there is a week-long celebration of Sukkot. Yes, September is the month of feasts for the Jews. John's Gospel is written with OT background. (Old Testament is Scripture for Jews also.) Therefore it was a deliberate decision of the Biblical Formation Program of the ECCE HOMO Institute to select September to conduct the course on the Gospel According to John. The teachers I am with are also loving it.

There are 32 students from 9 countries doing this study of John's Gospel. But Australians make up two third of the total group. Sydney itself makes up nearly one third of the group. Fr Kieran O'Mahony OSA from Dublin lectures on the Gospel according to John. Amongst many insights, Fr Kieran showed how the prologue of the Gospel is influenced by Wisdom Literature and Jewish prayers. Then came a couple of Jewish Scholars providing some understanding to Jewish Feast and the biblical basis for them.

Ecce Homo where I stay and study is in the Old City of Jerusalem. Al Aqsa Mosque on the site of the Jewish Temple which was destroyed in 70 CE is almost reachable from the terrace of my room. Turn 30 degrees and I can see the Holy Sepulchre, the Empty Tomb and Calvary. This city which is important for all three Abrahamic Religions (Jews, Christians and Muslims) is always buzzling with pilgrims, vendors, and celebrations.

In between the classes, I have been visiting Churches and Holy Sites and praying for my parishioners and friends. So far, I have prayed for you at the Holy Sepulchre, in the Garden of Gethsemane, at the place from where Jesus wept over Jerusalem, at the site where Jesus taught the Lord's Prayer, and at the site from where Jesus ascended to Heaven. The weather is hot like Australian Summer. But study and pilgrimages keep me fully focussed on Jesus Christ and his ministry. A number of you have given me intentions to pray for. They are in my heart and mind as I progress in Pilgrim's Way.

Dedication of the Church and Installation of the Relic

St Peter Chanel Church will be dedicated 60 years after its blessing. Archbishop Anthony Fisher will do the ceremony on 17 February 2019. Program will start with a procession with the Relic of St Peter Chanel, our Patron and the Proto-Martyr of Oceania, from the grounds of SPC Primary School to the Reliquary in the Church. With this installation of the Relic in our church, SPC Church Berala will be the first and only Church with a relic of St Peter Chanel on permanent display.
