## **23 DECEMBER 2018**

First Reading Mi 5:1-4

The Lord says this:

You, Bethlehem Ephrathah, the least of the clans of Judah, out of you will be born for me the one who is to rule over Israel; his origin goes back to the distant past, to the days of old. The Lord is therefore going to abandon them till the time when she who is to give birth gives birth. Then the remnant of his brothers will come back to the sons of Israel. He will stand and feed his flock with the power of the Lord, with the majesty of the name of his God. They will live secure, for from then on he will extend his power to the ends of the land. He himself will be peace.

#### Second Reading Heb 10:5-10

This is what Christ said, on coming into the world: You who wanted no sacrifice or oblation, prepared a body for me. You took no pleasure in holocausts or sacrifices for sin; then I said, just as I was commanded in the scroll of the book, 'God, here I am! I am coming to obey your will.' Notice that he says first: You did not want what the Law lays down as the things to be offered, that is: the sacrifices, the oblations, the holocausts and the sacrifices for sin, and you took no pleasure in them; and then he says: Here I am! I am coming to obey your will. He is abolishing the first sort to replace it with the second. And this will was for us to be made holy by the offering of his body made once and for all by Jesus Christ

Mary set out and went as quickly as she could to a town in the hill country of Judah. She went into Zechariah's house and greeted Elizabeth. Now as soon as Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leapt in her womb and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit. She gave a loud cry and said, 'Of all women you are the most blessed, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. Why should I be honoured with a visit from the mother of my Lord? For the moment your greeting reached my ears, the child in my womb leapt for joy. Yes, blessed is she who believed that the promise made her by the Lord would be fulfilled.'

## **MOTHERS CLUB**

There is a joke about mothers bragging about their children. Very proudly said a mother, "my son is a priest and when he enters everyone gets up and says good morning Father". Another mother said, "That is nothing. You know what people say when they see my son? He is a bishop and people call him 'My Lord'. Then the third mum said, "That is nothing. My son is seven foot two and when he enters a room everyone says, 'Oh My God'.



Mary went into Zechariah's house and greeted Elizabeth. She hurried to meet Elizabeth because of their pregnancies. They both got reasons to boast. Elizabeth could boast of bearing a special child in her advanced age. She who was experiencing humiliation so far is to become a proud mother of a prophet. But Mary could boast of even greater favour from God; she is bearing the Son of God. What greater divine gift a woman can get! Yet this gathering of mothers is different to other mothers club. While the thrust of conversation in most mothers club would be their children alone, Elizabeth was keen to praise Mary, her cousin, for the favour she has received from God. Mary in turn praises God, not herself.

It is the humility of Elizabeth and Mary that are remarkable. Humility is not thinking less of oneself, but it is less thinking of oneself. That is what we see in Mary especially. This quality is divine and with such divine quality Mary could bear Jesus Christ, Son of God.

Mary is a model and example for all Christians. By the name Christian, we are Christ bearers. Like Mary we too need to be humble, thinking not less of ourselves, but by less thinking of ourselves. Like Mary we too should be praising God and his plan in our lives. Like Mary we too need to be at the service of others. Like Mary we too need to be open to God's call.

## **REFLECTIONS ON LUKE 1:39-45**

**Gospel Focus.** Blessed are you. Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of they womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now, and at the hour of our death.

Elizabeth's greeting to Mary forms the second portion of the traditional prayer the Hail Mary. The first portion of the prayer also comes from Luke's gospel and is the greeting of the angel Gabriel to Mary at the Annunciation. The final portion was framed by the Church. Use of the Hail Mary dates to about the 11th Century.

## Scriptural Context. John the Baptist.

The gospel of Luke pays greater attention to John the Baptist than any of the other three gospels. In this gospel the foretelling of John's birth precedes the foretelling of the birth of Jesus and then the birth of John immediately precedes the birth of Jesus. In the gospel of Luke, John is the forerunning of Jesus. The story of his miraculous birth is paralleled with that of Jesus but always comes first. Luke makes it abundantly clear that John came first and prepared the way for the coming of Jesus.

## Living the Gospel. Looking for signs.

When Mary went to visit Elizabeth she was not looking for a sign that she had made the right decision. Rather, because she had accepted God's will the sign was given to her. Her acceptance and action came first. The sign came later as a confirmation. At times we look to God to provide us with a sign that our impending action is the right choice. However, faith acts in trust and confidence; it doesn't wait around for a green light from God. When we do act in faith, the flowon effects are the sign of confirmation.

## The Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary

St Ambrose's commentary on St Luke's Gospel

The angel Gabriel had announced the news of something that was as yet hidden and so, to buttress the Virgin Mary's faith by means of a real example, he told her also that an old and sterile woman had conceived, showing that everything that God willed was possible to God.

When Mary heard this she did not disbelieve the prophecy, she was not uncertain of the message, she did not doubt the example: but happy because of the promise that had been given, eager to fulfil her duty as a cousin, hurried by her joy, she went up into the hill country.

Where could she hurry to except to the hills, filled with God as she was? The grace of the Holy Spirit does not admit of delays. And Mary's arrival and the presence of her Son quickly show their effects: As soon as Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting her child leapt in her womb and she was filled with the Holy Spirit.

See the careful distinction in the choice of words. Elizabeth was the first to hear the voice but her son John was the first to feel the effects of grace. She heard as one hears in the natural course of things; he leapt because of the mystery that was there. She sensed the coming of Mary, he the coming of the Lord - the woman knew the woman, the child knew the child. The women speak of grace while inside them grace works on their babies. And by a double miracle the women prophesy under the inspiration of their unborn children.

The infant leapt and the mother was filled with the Spirit. The mother was not filled before her son: her son was filled with the Holy Spirit and in turn filled his mother. John leapt and so did Mary's spirit. John leapt and filled Elizabeth with the Spirit; but we know that Mary was not filled but her spirit rejoiced. For the Incomprehensible was working incomprehensibly within his mother. Elizabeth had been filled with the Spirit after she conceived, but Mary before, at the moment the angel had come. "Blessed are you," said Elizabeth, "who believed".

You too, my people, are blessed, you who have heard and who believe. Every soul that believes - that soul both conceives and gives birth to the Word of God and recognises his works.

Let the soul of Mary be in each one of you, to proclaim the greatness of the Lord. Let the spirit of Mary be in each one of you, to rejoice in God. According to the flesh only one woman can be the mother of Christ but in the world of faith Christ is the fruit of all of us. For every soul can receive the Word of God if only it is pure and preserves itself in chastity and modesty.

The soul that has been able to reach this state proclaims the greatness of the Lord just as Mary did and rejoices in God its saviour just like her.

The Lord's greatness is proclaimed, as you have read elsewhere, where it says Join me in magnifying the Lord. This does not mean that anything can be added to the Lord's greatness by human words, but that he is magnified in us. Christ is the image of God and so any good or religious act that a soul performs magnifies that image of God in that soul, the God in whose likeness the soul itself was made. And thus the soul itself has some share in his greatness and is ennobled.

## **FEASTS & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK**

#### Wednesday, 26 December - St



Stephen (Feast) Died in Jerusalem about 35. The feast of Stephen has been celebrated on this day since the fourth century. A Greekspeaking Jew, one of seven appointed by

the apostles for special service (diakonia). Died confessing Christ and seeking divine mercy for those who were stoning him. Named in the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer I). Remembered for preaching with wisdom and the Spirit (Acts 6:10), as one "full of grace and power" who "did great wonders and signs among the people" (Acts 6:8).

## Thursday, 27 December - St John,



*apostle (Feast)* First-century Galilean fisherman, son of Zebedee, who, with his brother James, left their nets to follow Jesus. With Peter, these "sons of

thunder" form an inner group among the twelve. Probably the "disciple whom Jesus loved" of the Fourth Gospel and, according to ancient tradition, the author of this Gospel and also of three letters and the book of Revelation. Remembered for his contemplative reflection on the life and death of Jesus and for his emphasis on Christian love.

#### Friday, 28 December - The Holy



*Innocents (Feast)* In an attempt to kill the child Jesus, Herod ordered the massacre of all male children, two years old and under, in and around Bethlehem. The Holy Innocents

have been honoured as martyrs for Christ since the fourth century and their feast has been celebrated on this day since the sixth century. In remembering them, the Church laments the suffering and death of children everywhere and honours all who die in innocence.

- Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold 7. gifts of the Holy Spirit: Prophesy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy.
- The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes. 8.
- Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy 9. Spirit: Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self Control.
- 10. The ten lords a-leaping were the ten commandments.
- 11. The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.
- 12. The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.
