Be Enlightened

From your Pastor News about refugees returning to the newest country South Sudan was one of the highlights in the world news recently. This was portrayed as mark of this country coming of age. Watching these news I was thinking that the people of South Sudan could be looking back on the troubled times of their past and retell their stories as we tell of ANZAC day. Gallipoli was a disaster. People who went to fight at Gallipoli were not thinking of Australian identity. Yet looking back we can see the Australian identity emerging at a battle that was lost though the war was won. I might also say that we could see God's plan unfolding at a bigger scale in these historical incidents, which was not apparent while things were happening.

Four hundred years before Jesus, a Levi looked back at some of the disasters of his own community and could see God's presence in a strange way. Part of that retold story is what we have as the first reading today. The book of Chronicles looks at the deportation of the Jewish people and destruction of the Temple of Jerusalem about 200 years before the book was written. After the destruction and deportation, it was a Persian king, Cyrus who allowed the Jews back to Israel and helped rebuild Jerusalem temple. They could see God's hand in work in all these.

Only people filed with Holy Spirit would have the ability to see God alive and active in the adversities of history. Without faith one could easily miss the point. Since the time of Chronicles, more important things have happened. God has come down to our history in a unique way. It was Jesus Christ, Son of God who came down to live with us. God, living with us, gives us an enlightenment which will help us see clearly through life.

Our life is full of uncertainties. Most times we are in the dark like Pharisees in today's Gospel. While most Pharisees were satisfied relying on their own scholarship of the scriptures. In spite of their scholarship, they did not acknowledge or accept Jesus as their saviour. Therefore, John the evangelist would say that they are walking in darkness. But Nicodemus was different. Though he too was a Pharisee (learned Jew), he came to see Jesus and accepted Jesus as the expected Messiah and his saviour. Therefore he was enlightened. He could see clearly through life.

Our acceptance of Jesus Christ as our saviour will enlighten us to see more clearly through life. Therefore this time of Lent is a time to remove all that would hinder the light of Christ shining in our lives.

Feast Day of St Joseph, Spouse of Blessed Virgin Mary

Monday, 19 March is the Solemn Feast of St Joseph. For this feast we take exception and sing Gloria for the Mass. Feast Mass will be at 6.45 AM. A carpenter, though born of the royal house of David, Joseph was an upright man who, as husband of the Virgin Mary, cared for Mary and the child Jesus. Venerated in the East after the fourth century, and his cult flowered in the West during the fifteenth century, following the development of medieval nativity plays, the Christmas crib, and increased devotion to Mary.


Bae Lisa's story

Since the 1970s more than two million people have been displaced, and 120,000 killed, in Mindanao's bloody conflict. For decades, the Philippines' mineral-rich island has been mired by land grabbing, economic exclusion, and a disregard for customary laws and practices that breeds widespread poverty and injustice. Today, the island is the Philippines' poorest: high maternal and child mortality, malnutrition and

lack of education are among the many development challenges contributing to insecurity and injustice.

Bae Lisa lives in Mindanao with her husband and their nine children. She is a traditional leader of the Talaandig tribe and a 'mother of peace' – one of over 300 indigenous leaders engaged by Mindanao Peoples Caucus (MPC) to work

together towards peace. "In times of crisis I comfort women and children traumatised by conflict, who fear for their lives. I deliver food to displaced people and mediate between government officials and traditional leaders." Since 2008, Caritas Australia has supported MPC as they pursue justice and authentic human development in Mindanao's fractured communities. The Ancestral Domain Protection, Peace Advocacy and





does MPC provide urgent humanitarian relief in conflict-affected communities, but also enables indigenous communities to peacefully protect their traditional lands whilst encouraging robust community participation in the peace process. Whilst the barriers to peace in Mindanao are vast and complex, stewardship of indigenous communities' lands remains critical to the development process. As Bae Lisa explains: "The biggest challenge we faced was the intrusion of outsiders interested in our trees, our water, mining and agriculture. Military harassed us, disregarding our rights as the original stewards." For many years, MPC has been at the forefront of national advocacy, highlighting the ongoing humanitarian crisis in Mindanao and appealing to the government for a ceasefire. Volunteers, like Bae Lisa, are crucial to this process – her voice ensures that marginalised community concerns are heard at the highest levels. "I participated in peace advocacy in Manila and dialogue with government agencies, representing indigenous peoples," Bae Lisa recalls. "It's important to participate in the program's policy and planning. I've learned to interact with authorities and built a network of friends for our cause." As an eager member of the MPC volunteer network, Bae Lisa works to deepen her community's understanding of the conflict, enhancing grassroots support for peace.

Through community forums, interfaith dialogues and reflections, a radio program, and translation services, MPC has begun to address the deep-seated causes of violence, poverty and injustice in Mindanao. In a nation plagued by religious dissonance, MPC's interfaith initiatives are particularly successful in contributing to a peace process wholly owned by those communities most affected by the protracted conflict. Within both Christian and Muslim communities, MPC has garnered broad support for its transformative approach to conflict resolution and determined pursuit of authentic change. "I was elected as an MPC council member for indigenous people, alongside Christian and Muslim representatives. I participated in peace advocacy in Manila and dialogue with government agencies, representing indigenous peoples." "We're more open to engaging with other groups in the name of peace, not like before when we feared strangers. The Talaandig tribe is regarded as a peace maker and negotiator. Usually our place is the venue for meetings and festivals. When armed men create trouble, the women are the first to talk with the troublemakers to defuse tension." In periods of ceasefire, MPC volunteers also monitor community behaviour and respond where threats occur. As Bae Lisa explains, volunteers are critical to the preservation of peace: "The quick response in communities to avert violence is the biggest achievement of MPC. Our ability to access authorities and influence them to stop dangerous operations that may hurt civilians has increased." "As traditional leaders we're very thankful. We can respond to critical situations and contact decision makers to defuse volatile situations." Thanks to your compassionate support for Caritas Australia, MPC and its volunteer network will continue working for sustainable peace in Mindanao.

"I'm hoping for lasting peace; the program has uplifted our outlook." Bae Lisa tells us. "This land is our universe, our school, our hunting ground and source of food, a market, health and sports arena given to us to preserve and protect."
