# Passion Reading, different personalities

From your Pastor The lengthy reading of the Passion of Jesus from the Gospel according to Mark is done in part, different people sharing parts of different characters in the story. Having a peep into various characters we also see dome aspects of them in our lives.

Jesus entered Jerusalem to the shouts and cheers of the crowd who were waving palms to him. He, in spite of a celebrity treatment, did not wave back as other celebrities would do. He knew that this crowd will disperse soon. Many will disown him soon. The suffering and crucifixion he was to undergo will be too much a scandal for them to stand by. Yet Jesus was not deterred; he was set on doing his father's will. May not be many, but you would be able to identify times you have felt like Jesus where you knew that not many are going to be with you; you have to tread the tough road in life by yourself. But your consolation is that you are not alone in this. Jesus has before you in the way of the cross and he is with you now as you walk in the way of the Cross.

Sometimes we can relate to the Crowd that cheered Jesus. Like them we are good at hailing the praise of Jesus when it suites us. Come trial and risks, easily we falter. Praise the Church when there is big show like World Youth Day. But when challenged by Church's teachings on morals, and obligations, easily we switch over to the side of the critiques.

We can be easily indignant about Judas. But aren't there occasions we betrayed the trust of others? There could be a lot of times we easily break the promise made to God Himself. At baptism and First Communion and Confirmation promises were made to God and the community of our participation in the weekly celebration at the Lord's Supper. How lightly we sometimes dismiss such obligations and promises to God!

Little did Peter knew, when made his promise to stand by Jesus, come whatever may, that his weakness is greater than his strength. Like Peter we too are weak by ourselves to stand by Gospel always. Only God's assistance can help us to be missionaries of the gospel.

Caiaphas is someone who gave the impression of providing legality to his condemnation of Jesus. We all hate hypocrisy; but we know how to look good when our motives are less than good.

The lying witnesses are examples of the lowest level humanity can go. Every time we try to undermine others using rumours and false statement we too join the category of the lyres.

Pilate was in dilemma and could not make up his mind. Therefore he decided to wash his hands off the whole issue. Taking no responsibility is seen as the easy way out by us sometimes. Lack of guts is no Christian virtue.

The reading of the Passion of the Lord makes us reflect on our lives.

#### AN EXAMINATION OF CONSCIENCE FOR HOLY WEEK

"If you want your prayers to fly to God, equip them with the two wings of fasting and almsgiving." This good advice from St. Augus-tine encourages us to pursue the "holy trio" that the church calls us to each Lent

Like faith, hope, and charity, the three practices of fasting, prayer, and almsgiv-ing work together to turn us away from self-centeredness and help equip us to love God and our neighbour more deeply. By opening us to his love and mercy, they help empower us to become his ambassadors in the world.

We all know that these practices are not always easy. But God knows our weakness. He also knows our potential. He knows that every step we take toward him can transform us a little bit more into the image of Christ.

This Lent, as you prepare for the Sacrament of Rec-onciliation, ask yourself how your life reflects the humility and trust in God that are at the heart of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving. Where have you fallen short of God's call away from self-centeredness? And even more important, how can you become more like Jesus—who lived com-pletely for God and other people, and not for himself?

Jesus "went off to the mountain to pray." (Mark 6:46)

- Are there subtle—or not so subtle— ways that I have ignored my relationship with God?
- Have I made time every day to meet God in prayer? Do I read, reflect, and act on his word to me in Scripture?
- Have I given priority to God on Sundays and holy days by attending Mass and making a special effort to seek him?
- "Return to me with your whole heart, with fasting, and weeping, and mourning." (Joel 2:12)
- Are there areas of myself that I am holding back from God—secret parts that I don't want to expose to his light and his love?
- How much do I rely on the Lord for fulfilment, compared with the security I seek from money, possessions, or other relationships?
- Have I entertained impure thoughts geared toward self-gratification? Have I acted on these thoughts?
- "This ... is the fasting that I wish: releasing those bound unjustly ... sharing your bread with the hungry, sheltering the oppressed and the homeless; clothing the naked." (Isaiah 58:6-7)
- Am I doing what I can to stand up against injustice and to protect the unborn, the poor, and the defenceless? Are there recent situations where I failed to follow the Spirit's lead in this?
- Are there situations in which I neglected to care for the people God has put in my life? Have I resisted putting their needs before my own?
- Is there anyone I have failed to treat according to the respect and dignity he or she deserves as a child of God? "Give alms from your possessions." (Tobit 4:7)
- Have I been a good steward of the gifts God has given me? Do I use them for his glory?
- Am I an active supporter and contributor to the work of the church and of organizations that serve the needy? Or have I been stingy with my time and talents?
- Are there situations in which I resist giving the "alms" of forgiveness to someone who has hurt me? Is there anyone I need to forgive? Anyone whose forgiveness I need to ask?

#### **Chrism Oil and Chrism Mass**

On Holy Thursday of each year Cardinal invites all priests, deacons, auxiliary bishops and the laity of the Archdiocese of Sydney to St Mary's Cathedral for the blessing of Chrism and other sacred oils. It will be a special experience participating in this Special Liturgy. During the Mass, Archbishop Cardinal George Pell will bless the oil of catechumens, the oil of the sick, and the oil of chrism. We use the first for adult catechumens and infants, the second for anointing the sick, and the sacred oil of chrism for baptism, confirmation, ordination of priests, and consecration of altars. All three are basically olive oil; chrism oil has balsam mixed with it.

Bishops have blessed oil ever since the early church. They baptized catechumens at the Easter Vigil and prepared chrism fresh for the occasion. While they were blessing chrism, they blessed the other oils as well. But later in the history bishops blessed these oils at the previous celebration of the Eucharist, Holy Thursday. This also allowed time to transport vessels of oil from the cathedral to all the churches in the diocese. In 1955 Church added a separate Mass earlier on Holy Thursday morning at the cathedral for that purpose, the Mass of Chrism.

At Chrism Mass has also acknowledged the ministry of priests. It invites them to renew their commitment of service and to receive the prayers and support of the people. The Mass of Chrism gathers the faithful of the Archdiocese at their mother church with their shepherd to prepare for celebrations of Christ in all our churches throughout the year.

#### **New Patens and Candle Stands**

St Peter Chanel Berala parish is buying four gold plated Patens to distribute Communion. Three patens will cost \$380 each and one bigger one will cost \$612. The parish is also buying six matching candle stands for the Altar. Each Candle Stand will cost \$270. Anyone wishing to sponsor one or more these items is welcome to contact Fr Thomas. ## **Audrey's story**

Audrey is a Bardi woman from Djarindjin, a remote community 200km north of Broome in Western Australia. As is sadly true of many Australian Indigenous communities, the rates of deadly 'lifestyle' diseases such as diabetes, heart disease, stroke and kidney failure run high in Djarindjin. Just a few years ago the diabetes rates in Audrey's community were well over 30%, many times higher than the Australian average.

With your solidarity, Caritas Australia works in partnership with the Unity of First People of Australia (UFPA) to run a holistic, community-owned Diabetes Management and Care Program in Djarindjin and

eight other remote communities across the Kimberley region. With an emphasis on the dignity of wellness, the program strives to prevent diseases like diabetes and to improve healthcare across these vulnerable communities. Audrey and her husband first heard about the program in 2005 when UFPA's staff visited her children's school. Audrey was eager to support her family's health and on learning about the wellness initiative, she decided to do her part to make her



community a healthier one. "Aboriginal people die too young from diabetes – it is important to stop this," Audrey told us. "There are lots of people with diabetes here but before, people didn't know about it." Audrey encouraged families to attend an initial community health assessment and many adults and children were found to be overweight – a significant risk factor for chronic Australian Indigenous diseases. The assessments were a challenging new step for the community but with Audrey's support, UFPA welcomed families on a journey towards wellness. In partnership with local Aboriginal communities, UFPA trains volunteer carers, like Audrey, who help their communities deal with and prevent 'lifestyle' diseases like diabetes. Audrey now encourages families in Djarindjin to make preventive lifestyle and dietary changes, as well as enhancing the quality of life for those people already affected by diabetes.

All nine communities supported by Caritas Australia and UFPA have seen sustained behaviour changes, including edible community gardens, community cooking classes, school breakfast programs managed by teachers and parents, and diabetes and nutrition education programs. Increasingly, the community stores are stocking healthy food choices, communities are embracing new leisure and sports initiatives, and the Elders are regaining their place as community leaders. Through their consistent and respectful local presence, culturally appropriate initiatives, and frequent consultations, UFPA's program has built close and trusting relationships with communities, bridging the gap between remote communities and mainstream medical, government and educational services.

As the program goes from strength to strength, people are starting to take control of their own wellbeing. Indeed, at Djarindjin's most recent health assessment there was not a single new case of diabetes recorded – an enormous credit to the partnership of UFPA and the communities. "Now there are less people with diabetes; people are looking after themselves," Audrey explains. "But diabetes is still a big challenge for our community. We're trying to slow things down by drinking water and eating less sweets and takeaway." As a scout leader and member of the Djarindjin Community Council, Audrey is a valuable advocate for UFPA's health and wellness program: "Perhaps the greatest satisfaction I've felt is knowing how good my own results were by going to the clinic and checking my sugar levels." It is with a sense of pride that communities across the Kimberley have embraced wellness initiatives that champion their rights and dignity.

Thanks to your support, Caritas Australia and our local partners are reducing the gap in health status between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal Australians. "My hope for the future for our community is for better health," Audrey told us. "Thank you for bringing this program to our community."
