Two Great Commandments

One of the joys of going home is meeting up with some of the exceptional people. Pyloth of Emmanuel Krupa is one of them. Pyloth retired a few years ago as a Bank officer. He was already a widower by then and his two daughters have married and settled down. One of them is married to a brother of mine. One thing that bothered Pyloth was the number of mentally sick people wandering around with no place to go to and no one to care for. He started to invite them to his house. He would make sure they all took their medication in time. The patients are invited to help with cooking, and other house chores. He gets them also to pray with him each morning and evening. Thomas MM and his wife from my home parish are another such exceptional people. They decided to adopt children deprived of caring families offering a proper family to live and grow. These are not isolated stories.

These stories are examples of radical commitment to the call of Jesus to love God and Neighbour. This world is becoming better and better because of such people. Many people know us as Christians because of such dedication to God's love.

While Liturgy is the Source and Summit of our faith life, the flesh and blood of our faith is the Love of God expressed through the Love of Our Neighbour. The challenge posed by today's Gospel is to be radical in our Love for our Neighbour. We are called to Love Our Neighbours As We Love Ourselves. And we know that living in a globalised world, the Neighbour is not just the one who lives immediately next to us. Visiting Vietnam, I was challenged to express my Christian Charity to people living in floating villages in the rivers and lakes who are deprived of legal documents to prove their mere existence. I am not sure I found a way to do it. But as a Christian I need to be working constantly to get my Christian charity to reach such people.

Biblical faith (on whose tradition Jesus relies) is a process through which we acknowledge God as absolute in our lives. God is not something abstract but someone whom we must love "with all our mind and with all our strength" (Mark 12:30). This is the reason for the categorical rejection of all forms of idolatry that we find in the Bible. As we know, idolatry means putting in our trust in someone other than God. This is a danger for all believers. Perhaps we idolise things other than God – money, personal property, celebrities. So the question to ask is what do our bank balances and diary entries reveal?

All Saints Day

(Homily by Fr Thomas at St Joseph the Worker, last Thursday)

We know of Mary MacKillop of the Cross as the saint – the only saint – of Australia. But I say that there are a lot more saints in Australia. All those who are baptised to be a child of God are meant to be saints. Therefore the Feast of All Saints is the feast of all Christians. In fact, being a disciple of Christ implies striving to be holy.

We expect every Christian we meet to be a saint. Saints live in heaven. Therefore we should be creating heaven for everyone we expect to be a saint.

Today's Gospel tells us how to create heaven for others. The passage we read in Mass today is from the Gospel of Matthew and it is commonly known as the beatitudes. It is the Magna Carta of Christian living.

The eight beatitudes speak to us of the fundamental attitudes of Jesus' disciples - Christians.

Blessed are the poor in spirit means we should totally trust in God.

Blessed are those who weep means we must share the suffering of others.

Blessed are the meek means we must be kind to others.

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness means we must fervently want justice to reign in this world.

Blessed are those who are pure in heart means we must be consistent and upright in our lives.

Blessed are those who work for peace means we must do our best to establish peace as the outcome of justice. In short this means we should always be striving to prepare heaven for others. In that course be prepared to be opposed by those who refuse to recognise the rights and dignity of others.

In this spirit, Blessed Theresa of Calcutta (Mother Theresa) prepared a prayer.

"Deliver me, O Jesus: From the desire of being esteemed From the desire of being loved From the desire of being honoured From the desire of being praised From the desire of being preferred to others From the desire of being consulted From the desire of being approved From the desire of being approved From the desire of being popular.

Deliver me, O Jesus: From the fear of being humiliated From the fear of being despised From the fear of being rebuked From the fear of being slandered From the fear of being forgotten From the fear of being wronged From the fear of being treated unfairly From the fear of being suspected And, Jesus, grant me the grace To desire that others might be more loved than I That others might be more esteemed than I That in the opinion of the world, others may increase and I decrease That others may be chosen and I set aside That others may be preferred to me in everything That others may become holier than I, provided that I, too, become as holy as I can."

As we are called to be saints, let us make this prayer of Blessed Theresa our prayer too. Instead of getting disappointed after expecting too much from others, let us do a lot for others and surprise them. That is what all the saints did.

Feasts this week

The Dedication of the Lateran Basilica – Friday 9 November, Feast

Today the liturgy celebrates the dedication of the Lateran Basilica, called "mother and head of all the churches of the city and the world." In fact, this basilica was the first to be built after Emperor Constantine's edict, in 313, granted Christians freedom to practice their religion.



The emperor himself gave Pope Miltiades the ancient palace of the Laterani family, and the basilica, the baptistery, and the patriarchate, that is, the Bishop of Rome's residence — where the Popes lived until the Avignon period — were all built there. The basilica's dedication was celebrated by Pope Sylvester around 324 and was named Most Holy Saviour; only after the 6th century were the names of St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist added, and now is typically denominated by these latter.

Initially the observance of this feast was confined to the city of Rome; then, beginning in 1565, it was extended to all the Churches of the Roman rite. The honouring of this sacred edifice was a way of expressing love and veneration for the Roman Church, which, as St. Ignatius of Antioch says, "presides in charity" over the whole Catholic communion (Letter to the Romans, 1:1).

On this solemnity the Word of God recalls an essential truth: the temple of stones is a symbol of the living Church, the Christian community, which in their letters the Apostles Peter and Paul already understood as a "spiritual edifice," built by God with "living stones," namely, Christians themselves, upon the one foundation of Jesus Christ, who is called the "cornerstone" (cf. 1 Corinthians 3:9-11, 16-17; 1 Peter 2:4-8; Ephesians 2:20-22). "Brothers, you are God's building," St. Paul wrote, and added: "holy is God's temple, which you are" (1 Corinthians 3:9c, 17).

St Leo the Great - Saturday 10 November, Memorial

St Leo the Great was the pope for twenty years from the year 440. During his pontificate he defended Rome from the barbarian conquerer, Atilla the Hun, by convincing him to accept tribute from the city rather than sacking it. St Leo's greatest triumph as pope came from the acceptance of

his dogmatic letter, which taught that Jesus Christ is one Person, in whom both human and divine nature are permanently united. Almost one hundred of his letters and sermons still survive; he was declared a doctor of the church in 1754.
