Not Waiting for Jesus' Birthday

From your Pastor Last Tuesday was a great celebration at St Mary's Cathedral. The occasion was the visit of the head of Syro-Malabar Catholics who has come to meet his subjects in diaspora. A Cathedral full of Syro-Malabar Catholics were delighted to see bishops from different Oriental Catholic Churches in Sydney applauding as bishop Julian Porteous (representing Cardinal Pell) and I spoke words of welcome to Major Archbishop George Cardinal Alencherry. People who are away from their homeland can experience a special joy when the head of their Church visits them in their adopted homeland. This Joy was brooding ever since they heard the news that their Major Archbishop was planning a visit to Australia.

In fact we all are in diaspora. Our true homeland is with God. Therefore any news about our God coming to visit us will be of great delight to all Christians. As we start with Advent today, we are primarily invited to reflect on this joy of Christ coming again to us.

Gospels for second and third Sundays of Advent are on how to prepare for to receive God's Son when he comes into our life. Only on the fourth Sunday of Advent, just one out of four Sundays, the Gospel reading at the Mass calls us to reflect on the birth of Jesus. This framework helps us to understand why Christmas is more than the birthday of Jesus.

God has come into the human story through the birth of Jesus. We celebrate this as a prelude to the second coming of Christ. The whole world joins in this celebration.

The signs referred to in the Gospel of the day are frightening. "There will be signs in the sun and moon and stars; on earth nations in agony, bewildered by the clamour of the ocean and its waves; men dying of fear as they await what menaces the world, for the powers of heaven will be shaken." (Lk 25, 26) When Jesus spoke to his disciples about the troubled times that lie ahead, he describes how people can easily be discouraged and lose heart when things go wrong.

In spite of all the comforts and security of the modern society, we are surrounded by alarming events and conditions of people - from natural disasters to violence and war, from personal tragedies to social unrest and riots. It is easy to feel overwhelmed. Many people are constantly afflicted by fear and anxiety. To them the Lord says, don't be alarmed. "they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. When these things begin to take place, stand erect, hold your heads high, because your liberation is near at hand." (Lk 21:28)

The first Christian Community experienced the tension between the two comings of the Lord, his earthly ministry and his return at the end of time. Believing this Second Coming (Parousia) of Christ is imminent, they also believed in living in blameless lives.

But the Christians for who Luke is writing are already aware of another dimension. For them the Lord's coming is not for some unknown time in the future: he is already here and now. At any moment he may suddenly pass judgement on the inner meaning which we give to our existence.

Church is the sacramental presence of Christ in our midst. There are lots of occasions of worrying and sometimes even frightening happenings in the history which became advent signs of Church as a sacrament of Christ on earth. The latest in our times that rocked the Church would be the child abuse clergy. Like many other near disastrous happenings in the history before,

Continued from previous page once again the evil actions of the darkness are being brought to light and the coming of Christ of hope and joy is established. That is the good news. In that sense the coming of Christ has come more real to many people. When we look at the totality of such pictures we can appreciate the Lord's words: "When these things begin to take place, stand erect, hold your heads high, because your liberation is near at hand."

This Advent is not a time of waiting for and preparing for an annual birthday celebration of Jesus, but it is a time of waiting and preparation for Christ coming with hope, peace, and joy to the humanity.

Amalgamation of Parishes

Last Sunday was the parish meetings for both parishes. I would like to thank all those who showed an interest in the affairs of the parish and attended the meetings. Their opinions and suggestions are much appreciated. Those who gathered for the meetings were in agreement that it is time for both parishes to be amalgamated. For the benefit of those who have not voted on the issue of amalgamation, there will be a document circulated at Mass on next weekend, Second Sunday of Advent, to sign.

These days you have been voting on the name of the New Parish when it is created of the amalgamation of two parishes. A number of people have registered their votes. I urge the rest of the parishioners to register their vote by Tuesday, 4 December. With that I will be able to advise you how the trend is. By the end of the year I am hoping to prepare documents of recommendation to the Cardinal. Hopefully early next year Cardinal will be able to advise us on his deliberations.

I am grateful to all parishioners for your support.

Feasts this week

3 December - St Francis Xavier, priest. Memorial

St Francis Xavier was born in Spain in 1506 and studied at the University of Paris. He met St Ignatius of Loyola and joined his group of disciples who would found a new religious order; the Jesuits. Preaching in foreign missions became a fundamental aim of the Jesuits and in 1541, he sailed to Goa in India. He worked and lived with the poor people in every place he visited; from India and Ceylon to Japan and the Malay peninsula.

During his ten years as a missionary, he is believed to have converted many thousands to Christianity. He is recognised as the patron saint of foreign missions.

7 December - St Ambrose, bishop, doctor. Memorial

St Ambrose was born at Trier in 334 AD. While practising law he was appointed governor of the province of Aemilia and Liguria. Four years later when the see of Milan became vacant, St Ambrose was chosen as the new bishop, despite the fact that he was not even baptised. He reluctantly accepted the position, was baptised, ordained a priest and then installed as bishop. In 390 AD, after Emperor Theodosius ordered the savage massacre of many people, St Ambrose impressed upon the Emperor to perform a public penance for this act of cruelty.

St Ambrose is listed as one of the four great Latin doctors of the church. He was a great orator who gave sermons that offered practical teachings for his people. He was also the first teacher in the West to make significant use of hymns as a popular means of praise.

The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Solemnity

The Feast of the Immaculate Conception is the subject of a lot of misconceptions (so to speak). Perhaps the most common one, held even by many Catholics, is that it celebrates the conception of Christ in the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary. That the feast occurs only 17 days before Christmas should make the error obvious! We celebrate another feast—the Annunciation of the Lord—on March 25, exactly nine months before Christmas. It was at the Annunciation, when the Blessed Virgin Mary humbly accepted the honour bestowed on her by God and announced by the angel Gabriel, that the conception of Christ took place.

The Feast of the Immaculate Conception, in its oldest form, goes back to the seventh century, when churches in the East began celebrating the Feast of the Conception of Saint Anne, the mother of Mary. In other words, this feast celebrates the conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the womb of Saint Anne; and nine months later, on September 8, we celebrate the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary.
