From your Pastor

Good Shepherd

Last Wednesday New Zealand parliament redefined marriage as union between two persons. Thus it has shown irreverence to the sacredness of marriage which is truly possible only between a man and a woman. The Word of God preached is not greeted well in such circumstances. While at the time of Apostle Paul and Barnabas in Antioch, the Jews and the Romans refused to believe the Word of God preached to them, these days we have a different kind of rejection to the Gospel of Jesus. But the rejection from the powerful Jews and Romans did not stop the spreading of the Good News. So should be the case always. Legislating the wrongs in our times by countries is not going to stop the spread of the Good News of Jesus. If family is the foundation of the society according to the will of God, no aberration to it will help the society, and nothing other than the will of God be good news. Sometimes it requires courage to stand up to the misguidance of the power lobby to proclaim the truth according to the risen Christ.

Last Monday Boston was rocked by exploding bombs. If it was another of the evil works by the Islamist Terrorist groups, their idea of standing for God's will is very sacrilegious and evil. Our God is love and love only. There is no place for hatred and evil in the proclamation of God's message. In today's Gospel we are told that Christ is the good shepherd. Believing in Jesus Christ requires listening to his voice and acting accordingly. If we believe in Jesus Christ we also trust him that he will not allow his own to be lost.

You and I, who are baptised and christened, are to be Jesus Christ to the world. You and I are to make sure no one will steal God's chosen ones. Therefore let us try to make stronger bonds with one another and get to know one another better. Our communion with God and with one another is the way to protect the faithful and the seekers of the truth from robbers. Jesus who is our good shepherd has given us a share in the responsibility of shepherding others. Let us try to do it properly.

Abortion Law “Backdown”

A few weeks ago, Monica Doumit – the “young Catholic lawyer who lives locally” – drew our attention to *the Reproductive Health (Access to Terminations) Bill 2013* – a vicious abortion bill designed to eliminate pro-life presence. We were asked to express our concern to the

Tasmanian Department of Health and Services. Fortunately, 1750 out of the 2000 submissions made in the past weeks have been against it. Monica reports:

The proposed abortion laws in Tasmania will be changed to:

reduce the period for "legal" abortion from 24 weeks' to 16 weeks'

remove penalties for doctors or counsellors who conscientiously object to providing or referring for terminations

At this stage, the "access zones" are still part of the proposed law, but these will be further opposed in the coming weeks.

This “improvement”, albeit not at all the end of the story, should serve as a little reminder that a people of good will can and must always work together toward achieving greater justice. According to the Catechism, ‘Justice is the moral virtue that consists in the constant and firm will to give their due to God and neighbour.’ (1807)

Here is Pope Francis, as Cardinal Bergoglio, in a joint statement with the other bishops of Latin America:

We should commit ourselves to ‘eucharistic coherence’, that is, we should be conscious that people cannot receive holy communion and at the same time act or speak against the commandments, in particular when abortion, euthanasia, and other serious crimes against life and family are facilitated. This responsibility applies particularly to legislators, governors, and health professionals.

Project Compassion

Both parish schools – St Joseph the Worker and St Peter Chanel – also had Project Compassion appeals. St Joseph the Worker School raised \$940 and St Peter Chanel School raised \$1477. Appeal through St Joseph the Worker Church is \$ 1954 so far and through St Peter Chanel Church is \$ 6759 so far. Between two churches and two parish schools we have collected \$ 11130. This does not include the direct donations parishioners have made to Caritas office. Later in the year the Caritas Office will issue a receipt to the parish including all donations. Thanks to the generosity of so many good people and their concern for the less advantaged.

Monsignor Michael Berbari, Cor Bishop and Patriarchal Vicar

St Peter Chanel parishioners have known Monsignor Michael Berbari, since 1985. I have noticed great affection in the way parishioners speak of Mons Michael. We are also delighted to know that Syrian Patriarch of Antioch gave him the title **Patriarchal Vicar for Australia and New Zealand**. We pray God's blessing on him and wish him all the best with the new title.



Michael was born to a Maronite Catholic family in Cairo on 1 August 1940. He did his schooling in De La Salle College and Syrian Catholic School in Egypt. Later he joined Coptic Catholic Seminary in Cairo which was followed by philosophy studies in a Catholic Seminary in Lebanon. Before starting the theology studies he worked for 3 years in a big Plumbing Company in Cairo. Then he joined the Syrian Catholic Diocese and entered a Coptic Catholic Seminary in Cairo to do the Theology. He was ordained a priest on 26 March 1967 by the Syrian Catholic Archbishop of Cairo. Twenty eight years ago Moses Daoud, Archbishop of Cairo ordained Michael as Corbishop and sent him to Sydney to look after the Syrians in Oceania. Moses Daoud later became patriarch of Antioch and still later Cardinal bishop and Prefect of the Congregation for the Oriental Churches. My memory of Moses Daoud is as the Cardinal and Prefect of the Congregation for the Oriental Churches facilitating many privileges for the Syro-Malabar Church which is my mother Church. (Cardinal Moses Daoud was also a member of Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, Congregation for the Causes of the Saints, Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity, Pontifical Council for the Interpretation of Legislative Texts, Special Council for Lebanon of the General Secretariat of the Synod of Bishops.)

A corbishop is a rank of Christian clergy below bishop. Corbishop literally means rural bishop. Both Catholic and Orthodox Eastern Churches still have corbishops. In some Eastern Orthodox Churches, "corbishop" is an alternate name for an auxiliary bishop. The Churches of the Syriac tradition, namely the Syriac Orthodox Church, the Assyrian Church of the East, the Syrian Catholic Church, the Chaldean Catholic Church, the Indian Orthodox Church and the Malankara Jacobite Syriac Orthodox Church also preserve the office, calling it corepiscopa. In these churches, the corepiscopa vests almost identically to the bishop and often serves as his representative to various liturgical events to add solemnity. As a Corbishop, Mons Berbari can ordain men to minor orders.


Monsignor Michael Berbari is a well-educated man. He holds a Law degree in addition to the degrees in Philosophy and Theology. He also speaks Arabic, French and Italian in addition to English. he also learned Coptic language, Hebrew and Latin. He taught Maths and Arabic in a Coptic College in Cairo before coming to Sydney.

He came to Australia in 1985 and August of that year he came to Berala which became his home ever since. He started in Sydney as the pastor to Syrian Catholics as well as Coptic Catholics. After eighteen months or so he was relieved of his responsibilities to Coptic Catholics as they got their own priest.

The advent of Father Rahal Dergham gave much needed assistance to Monsignor Berbari. After building a church and Hall facilities for the Syrian Community, now Mons has left most of the administrative responsibilities to Fr Rahal. Last February when Patriarch Yousef III Younan visited Sydney, his beatitude specially recognised the hard work and missionary spirit of Mons Berbari by adorning him with Patriarchal Privileges. As a Cor Bishop he was allowed to wear a pectoral Cross like a bishop. Now he is given the right to dress up like bishop with mitre, pectoral Cross, sceptre and a fisherman's ring on his finger. He is also given the title as the Patriarchal Vicar of Australia and New Zealand.

Unlike most priests, Mons Michael Berbari is multi ritual. Most of the Sydney priests are permitted to celebrate liturgy only in Roman Rite. Some of the Easter Rite Catholics working for Sydney like myself are bi-ritual. But Mons Berbari has the faculties to celebrate liturgy in Coptic, Maronite, Syrian, and Roman rites. It is a unique privilege. It is only proper to celebrate the patriarchal recognition of such a great man among us. **Therefore the Parish Community of St Peter Chanel is specially invited to an evening prayer with Mons Berbari on Friday evening, 10 May 2013, at St Peter Chanel Church.** A number of bishops and other leaders of various Oriental Churches also will be attending this special evening prayer. After the prayer there will be a small Agape in the Jubilee Hall to felicitate him. You are welcome to bring a plate to the Agape. In addition to St Peter Chanel parishioners, all well wishes and friends of Mons Berbari also are invited to the function.

Feasts of the Week

25 April – ANZAC Day.

What is ANZAC Day?

ANZAC Day – 25 April – is probably Australia's most important national occasion. It marks the anniversary of the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during the First World War.

What does ANZAC stand for?

ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. The soldiers in those forces quickly became known as ANZACs, and the pride they took in that name endures to this day.

Why is this day special to Australians?

When war broke out in 1914, Australia had been a federal commonwealth for only 13 years. The new national government was eager to establish its reputation among the nations of the world. In 1915 Australian and New Zealand soldiers formed part of the allied expedition that set out to capture the Gallipoli peninsula in order to open the Dardanelles to the allied navies. The ultimate objective was to capture Constantinople (now Istanbul in Turkey), the capital of the Ottoman Empire, an ally of Germany.

The Australian and New Zealand forces landed on Gallipoli on 25 April, meeting fierce resistance from the Ottoman Turkish defenders. What had been planned as a bold stroke to knock Turkey out of the war quickly became a stalemate, and the campaign dragged on for eight months. At the end of 1915 the allied forces were evacuated, after both sides had suffered heavy casualties and endured great hardships. Over 8,000 Australian soldiers had been killed. News of the landing on Gallipoli had made a profound impact on Australians at home, and 25 April soon became the day on which Australians remembered the sacrifice of those who had died in the war.

Although the Gallipoli campaign failed in its military objectives, the Australian and New Zealand actions during the campaign left us all a powerful legacy. The creation of what became known as the "ANZAC legend" became an important part of the identity of both nations, shaping the ways they viewed both their past and their future.



26 April - St Mark, evangelist. Feast.



The second Gospel was written by St. Mark, who, in the New Testament, is sometimes called John Mark. Both he and his mother, Mary, were highly esteemed in the early Church, and his mother's house in Jerusalem served as a meeting place for Christians there.

St. Mark was associated with St. Paul and St. Barnabas (who was Mark's cousin) on their missionary journey through the island of Cyprus. Later he accompanied St. Barnabas alone. We know also that he was in Rome with St. Peter and St. Paul. Tradition ascribes to him the founding of the Church in Alexandria.

St. Mark wrote the second Gospel, probably in Rome sometime before the year 60 A.D.; he wrote it in Greek for the Gentile converts to Christianity. Tradition tells us that St. Mark was requested by the Romans to set down the teachings of St. Peter. This seems to be confirmed by the position which St.

Peter has in this Gospel. In this way the second Gospel is a record of the life of Jesus as seen through the eyes of the Prince of the Apostles. His feast day is April 25. He is the patron saint of notaries.
