From your Pastor

You are here not for a season but for a reason

What chance has our Premier or Prime Minister forming a government in Heaven? Will God allow gay marriage in Heaven? The questions, silly as they are, are similar to the question the Sadducees asked about the woman who was married to 7 brothers one after another as each of them died. They imagined heaven as a place bigger and better of their known world, full of the things they aspired for and could not get to enjoy here. For a poor person, therefore the heaven could be a place of wealth and riches. For someone who always wanted to party, heaven is an eternal partying. Some people speak of the reward for the martyrs (men), as plenty of virgins in heaven. There is danger in being too graphic about heaven, because heaven is not just another world like ours. After death we are transformed and enter into another kind of existence. We cannot adequately understand or explain that existence. It is a mystery.

The Sadducees were a group of religious people who did not believe in the resurrection of the body. They were like the good humanists of our times. Humanists believe in being good to others and leading a morally good life. But they need not believe in God or his gift of resurrection of the body or the life after. To such people, the Lord's message is this: know that your lives are too precious to be lost in the grave.

When God created us, he created us with love. He created us for a reason. Even if you think you were born as a surprise to your parents, or an unwanted child in your family, there is no surprise for God, and He has a reason to create you. Each of us has a place in God's plan. You are not here just for a season, but for a profound reason. Your life is not ended with grave. It is loved and fulfilled even after the earthly journey.

Therefore see the life on this world as a pilgrimage. Do not let the media and the world trick you away from the pilgrimage. The media can trick you by presenting sins like pride, greed, envy, anger, lust, gluttony, and apathy as glamorous and normal. Under the disguise of care for our body, the commercial greed of the world can lure us into body worshippers. Do not let any of these traps deceive you. Be always people of Easter Hope and Discernment.

Resurrection is always preceded by death. Sometimes we have death like experiences in our earthly life. When a loving parent finds out that one of the children they have brought up with love and care is turned into an immoral life in his adulthood could have a devastating experience. A trusted friend letting one down through gossip and lies can make one feel like the world crumbling all around. The death of young mother due to cancer or accident may weigh down on not only the dependant family, but all her friends as well. Though such death like experiences make us baffle, we know that in the context of faith and the life of the faithful, through them God brings new lease of life,

a resurrection from the worldly life. A well known spiritual writer C.S Lewis, in spite of his deep Christian faith, was shaken when his dear wife died of cancer. After much prayer and reflection Lewis came to this conclusion: "God is like a surgeon cutting out disease, with pain as an unavoidable consequence."

We may not be able to adequately explain the mystery of suffering and pain. But we know through a humiliating death on a cross, Jesus has won us right to resurrection. It is an entry into a transformed life, not bound by any of the limitations of this world.

Christmas Luncheon

Christmas is one of the major celebrations and most people look forward to Christmas. But there are also those who find it hard to get through the Christmas period. For some, poverty makes it hard to celebrate Christmas. The Church helps them with the gift of Christmas hampers. There are others who find Christmas a difficult time to go through - because of their loneliness. For various reasons they do not have anyone to celebrate Christmas with. For the sake of such lonely people, this year our parish is putting on a Christmas luncheon. That is the decision of the Pastoral Council. Arthur Doumit will be the co-ordinator for the Christmas Lunch. The Lunch will be held in the Jubilee (Parish) Hall on Christmas Day at noon. It is a day most people will be committed to Family Celebrations. Yet there may be people who can afford to help with Christmas Luncheon for the Lonely. Some families may like to come with their children to help so that their children may see how privileged and blessed they are. If anyone can help that day, Arthur Doumit, Pastoral Council Members, and Fr Thomas will be happy to hear from them.

Feasts of the Week

11 November - St Martin of Tours, bishop. Memorial.

A conscientious objector who wanted to be a monk; a monk who was maneuvered into being a bishop; a bishop who fought paganism as well as pleaded for mercy to heretics—such was Martin of Tours, one of the most popular of saints and one of the first not to be a martyr.

Born of pagan parents in what is now Hungary and raised in Italy, this son of a veteran was forced at the age of 15 to serve in the army. He became a Christian catechumen and was baptized at 18. It was said that he lived more like a monk than a soldier. At 23, he refused a war bonus and told his commander: "I have served you as a soldier; now let me

serve Christ. Give the bounty to those who are going to fight. But I am a soldier of Christ and it is not lawful for me to fight." After great difficulties, he was discharged and went to be a disciple of Hilary of Poitiers (January 13).

He was ordained an exorcist and worked with great zeal against the Arians. He became a monk, living first at Milan and later on a small island. When Hilary was restored to his see after exile, Martin returned to France and established what may have been the first French monastery near Poitiers. He lived there for 10 years, forming his disciples and preaching throughout the countryside.

The people of Tours demanded that he become their bishop. He was drawn to that city by a ruse—the need of a sick person—and was brought to the church, where he reluctantly allowed himself to be consecrated bishop. Some of the consecrating bishops thought his rumpled appearance and unkempt hair indicated that he was not dignified enough for the office.

Along with St. Ambrose (December 7), Martin rejected Bishop Ithacius's principle of putting heretics to death—as well as the intrusion of the emperor into such matters. He prevailed upon the emperor to spare the life of the heretic Priscillian. For his efforts, Martin was accused of the same heresy, and Priscillian was executed after all. Martin then pleaded for a cessation of the persecution of Priscillian's followers in Spain. He still felt he could cooperate with Ithacius in other areas, but afterwards his conscience troubled him about this decision.

As death approached, his followers begged him not to leave them. He prayed, "Lord, if your people still need me, I do not refuse the work. Your will be done."

12 November – St Josaphat, bishop, martyr. Memorial.

In 1964, newspaper photos of Pope Paul VI embracing Athenagoras I, the Orthodox patriarch of Constantinople, marked a significant step toward the healing of a division in Christendom that has spanned more than nine centuries.

In 1595, when today's saint was a boy, the Orthodox bishop of Brest-Litovsk (famous in World War I) in present-day Belarus and five other bishops representing millions of Ruthenians, sought reunion with Rome. John Kunsevich (Josaphat became his name in religious life) was to dedicate his life and die for the same cause. Born in what is now Ukraine, he went to work in Wilno and was influenced by clergy adhering to the Union of Brest (1596). He became a Basilian monk, then a priest, and soon was well known as a preacher and as an ascetic.

He became bishop of Vitebsk (now in Belarus) at a relatively young age, and faced a difficult situation. Most monks, fearing interference in liturgy and customs, did not want union with Rome. By synods, catechetical instruction, reform of the clergy and personal example, however, Josaphat was successful in winning the greater part of the

Orthodox in that area to the union.

But the next year a dissident hierarchy was set up, and his opposite number spread the accusation that Josaphat had "gone Latin" and that all his people would have to do the same. He was not enthusiastically supported by the Latin bishops of Poland.

Despite warnings, he went to Vitebsk, still a hotbed of trouble. Attempts were made to foment trouble and drive him from the diocese: A priest was sent to shout insults to him from his own courtyard. When Josaphat had him removed and shut up in his house, the opposition rang the town hall bell, and a mob assembled. The priest was released, but members of the mob broke into the bishop's home. He was struck with a halberd, then shot and his body thrown into the river. It was later recovered and is now buried in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. He was the first saint of the Eastern Church to be canonized by Rome.

His death brought a movement toward Catholicism and unity, but the controversy continued, and the dissidents, too, had their martyr. After the partition of Poland, the Russians forced most Ruthenians to join the Russian Orthodox Church.
