From your Pastor

Fire and Power

It is that time of the year again, when everyone is busy. All are busy organising gifts, parties, collecting food for the less advantaged, and sending Christmas greeting cards. In such a warm mood we are in, I do not think any of you would have chosen today's Gospel as part of the celebration. In Gospel today, John the Baptist calls for repentance. He even rebukes the people for the lack of repentance they have shown.

As I said last weekend, Christmas is not just the celebration of the Birthday of Jesus. Christ is coming again into our lives and our human story. He will come to realise the Kingdom of God in our midst. This advent is the time to prepare for the coming of Christ with his Kingdom. As prophet Isaiah, in the first reading says, the coming of Christ will bring peace and joy. Everyone aspires for the Kingdom of God with all its peace and Joy. But we want the Christmas without any advent; Easter without Lent; joy without sacrifices, peace without justice. That is where John the Baptist has a strong message for us. John called for the repentance of hearts. Even Pharisees and Sadducees who lead an apparently good life, John said, need to repent. It is not enough to have a good humanitarian approach, to receive the Kingdom of God. Our lives need to have Christ at the centre.

John was quick to tell the people that his baptism is only a mark of conversion of hearts. Jesus Christ who is coming after him will be baptising with the power of The Holy Spirit and Fire of Love. As baptised people we need to produce the fruits of the Fire of Love and power of the Holy Spirit in our lives. The flood of charity that flows at the time of Christmas is the produce of the Fire of Love Christians try to live out. Similarly we can produce amazing results as people baptised with the Power of the Holy Spirit. Last Wednesday night Christine D'Rozario from Justice and Peace Office was explaining with examples around us to show how the fire of love could be ignited in our community. Working with Sydney Alliance is a powerful and practical way.

Most times to reveal the glory of God, He chooses the weakest link to produce the power of the Holy Spirit. That may explain how the Catholic Church which was oppressed early in the history of the country and was poor of money till after the Second World War succeeded in becoming the most efficient educators and best providers of social welfare activities in the country. You may have personal stories of how you have inspired and ignited new hope in other people's lives. A lot of times it happens when you were either sick or when you thought that you are not having the best of luck in your life.

This advent is time to realise that even in our weakness we are baptised with the Fire of Love and the power of the Holy Spirit. Let us try to produce its fruits in our lives so that we will not disappoint ourselves and God.



Feasts of the Week

9 December – The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Solemnity.

The Feast of the Immaculate Conception is the subject of a lot of misconceptions (so to speak). Perhaps the most common one, held even by many Catholics, is that it celebrates the conception of Christ in the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary. That the feast occurs only 17 days before Christmas should make the error obvious! We celebrate another feast—the Annunciation of the Lord—on March 25, exactly nine months before Christmas. It was at the Annunciation, when the Blessed Virgin Mary humbly accepted the honor bestowed on her by God and announced by the angel Gabriel, that the conception of Christ took place.

The Feast of the Immaculate Conception, in its oldest form, goes back to the seventh century, when churches in the East began celebrating the Feast of the Conception of Saint Anne, the mother of Mary. In other words, this feast celebrates the conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the womb of Saint Anne; and nine months later, on September 8, we celebrate the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

13 December - St Lucy, virgin, martyr. Memorial.

Lucy's name means "light", with the same root as "lucid" which means "clear, radiant, understandable." Unfortunately for us, Lucy's history does not match her name. Shrouded in the darkness of time, all we really know for certain is that this brave woman who lived in Syracuse lost her life in the persecution of Christians in the early fourth century. Her veneration spread to Rome so that by the sixth century the whole Church recognized her courage in defense of the faith.

Lucy's name is probably also connected to statues of Lucy holding a dish with two eyes on it. This refers to a legend in which Lucy's eyes were put out by Diocletian as part of his torture. The legend concludes with God restoring Lucy's eyes.

Whatever the fact to the legends surrounding Lucy, the truth is that her courage to stand up and be counted a Christian in spite of torture and death is the light that should lead us on our own journeys through life.

14 December - St John of the Cross, priest, doctor. Memorial.

Born in Spain in 1542, John learned the importance of self-sacrificing love from his parents. His father gave up wealth, status, and comfort when he married a weaver's daughter and was disowned by his noble family. After his father died, his mother kept the destitute family together as they wandered homeless in search of work. These were the examples of sacrifice that John followed with his own great love -- God.

When the family finally found work, John still went hungry in the middle of the wealthiest city in Spain. At fourteen, John took a job caring for hospital patients who suffered from incurable diseases and madness. It was out of this poverty and suffering, that John learned to search for beauty and happiness not in the world, but in God.

After John joined the Carmelite order, Saint Teresa of Avila asked him to help her reform movement. John supported her belief that the order should return to its life of prayer. But many Carmelites felt threatened by this reform, and some members of John's own order kidnapped him. He was locked in a cell six feet by ten feet and beaten three times a week by the monks. There was only one tiny window high up near the ceiling. Yet in that unbearable dark, cold, and desolation, his love and faith were like fire and light. He had nothing left but God -- and God brought John his greatest joys in that tiny cell.

After nine months, John escaped by unscrewing the lock on his door and creeping past the guard. From then on his life was devoted to sharing and explaining his experience of God's love.

John left us many books of practical advice on spiritual growth and prayer that are just as relevant today as they were then. These books include: Ascent of Mount Carmel, Dark Night of the Soul and A Spiritual Canticle of the Soul and the Bridegroom Christ.


