# New Life in Jesus Identified by his Scars

Before sitting for School Leaving Certificate Exams, my school authorities were collecting data to prepare a certificate for me. My School Leaving Certificate was going to be the basis for all other important personal identification documents in the future for me. Therefore it is very important. And the authorities were looking for unique identification marks on me. They identified two permanent scars on my body as the proper identification for my certificate. This was done before the age of computers and holograms. Yes, scars on my body were to be taken as the most important ID.

It is interesting Jesus also kept his scars – scars of his suffering and crucifixion - as his ID even after his resurrection. He could easily erase them and have some other means of identification. But he chose otherwise. The apostles recognised him looking at the scars. Thomas who was not with the rest while the appearance took place also demanded to see the scars on his body.

The scars on the body of Jesus have a message for all Christians. Through baptism we are reborn into the family of God, becoming heirs of Jesus' resurrection. But we are not immune to the scars and wounds in our life. We Christians also will be attacked by other people. People will slander us just like any other person. People will oppose us and deceive us like everyone else. It may cause a permanent scar in our lives. Even though we will be bearing the wounds and scars, we can win over death and gain resurrection like Jesus.

Jesus' suffering, death, and resurrection together make the Easter Mystery. Therefore we cannot isolate the wounds and scars from his resurrection. Many of you may be wearing scars and wounds of many different kinds from the past. Some people find it more frightening like the disciples who locked themselves in the room. That did not stop them from meeting Jesus. He came into their midst in the locked room. Some others may be more brave like Thomas who was out in the hostile world of Jesus who mocked at the life and resurrection of Jesus. He may have been out to get the provisions for his friends or something similar. He too did not miss out on meeting the resurrected Jesus. Irrespective of whether they were brave or not they all had the message of Peace from Jesus.

Speaking about our own world, some people may resent scars and wounds of the past. But for many others such wounds and scars of the past may be strengthening their faith in Jesus Christ. For them the scars of the past may have helped them witness to Christ more powerfully. Your suffering or pain of the past, your faith which brought you out of the fallen-ness, and your new life in Jesus will be a great witness to the risen Christ in our world. Such witnessing stories are powerful. Such people will have greater sense of Christ's peace. We will be able to offer the same peace to others who need the peace of Christ Risen. Jesus Risen with the wounds of nails and the glorious body of resurrection will be our identity as Christians.



# **Divine Mercy Sunday**

Pope John Paul II made the surprise announcement in his homily at the canonization of St. Faustina on April 30, 2000. There, he declared: "It is important then that we accept the whole message that comes to us from the word of God on this Second Sunday of Easter, which from now on throughout the Church, will be called 'Divine Mercy Sunday.' "

"I shall sing forever the Lord's mercy." (Ps 89 [88]) Between 1930 and 1938 Christ appeared to Sister Faustina, a Sister of Mercy in Poland who initiated the Divine Mercy devotion. On Good Friday, 1937, Jesus requested that Blessed Faustina make a special novena before the Feast of Mercy, from Good Friday through the following Saturday. Jesus also asked that a picture be painted according to the vision of Himself as the fountain of mercy. He gave her a chaplet to be recited and said that it was appropriate to pray the chaplet at three o'clock each afternoon (the Hour of Great Mercy).

# Feasts of the Week

### 1 May – St Joseph the Worker.

The veneration of St Joseph occurred very late when compared with other saints, and it wasn't until the 10th century that St Joseph, husband of the Holy Mother Mary and guardian of Jesus, began to be celebrated with his own Feast Day. Almost a millennium later, St Joseph was again commemorated this time by Pope Pius XII who declared 1st May as the Feast of St Joseph the Worker in recognition of Joseph's work as a carpenter and the family breadwinner.



So unlike most saints, St Joseph has not one but two feast days, with the first created to remember him as the guardian of Jesus on 19 March, and the second to pay tribute to him as a worker on 1st May. The original Feast of 19 March was only initially celebrated in some parts of Europe, and was not given official sanction by Rome as part of the Church calendar until 1479. Then in 1847 when Pope Pius IX declared St Joseph, Patron of the Universal Church, another feast was instituted to celebrate St Joseph the Worker. This was given as the Wednesday that fell in the second week after Easter. But this somewhat confusing date was later abolished by Pope Pius XII in 1955 and replaced instead by 1st May as St. Joseph the Worker's official feast day.

### 28 April – St Peter Chanel, priest, martyr. Memorial.

The protomartyr of the South Seas, St. PeterChanel was born in 1803 at Clet in the diocese of Belley, France. His intelligence and simple piety brought him to the attention of the local priest, Father Trompier, who saw to his elementary education. Entering the diocesan Seminary, Peter won the affection and the esteem of both students and professors. After his ordination he found himself in a rundown country parish and completely revitalized it in the three year span that he remained there. However, his mind was set on missionary work; so, in 1831, he joined the newly formed Society of Mary (Marists)

which concentrated on missionary work at home and abroad. To his dismay, he was appointed to teach at the seminary at Belley and remained there for the next five years, diligently performing his duties.

In 1836, the Society was given the New Hebrides in the Pacific as a field for evangelization, and the jubilantSt. Peter was appointed Superior of a little band of missionaries sent to proclaim the Faith to its inhabitants. On reaching their destination after an arduous ten month journey, the band split up and St. Peter went to the Island of Futuna accompanied by a laybrother and an English layman, Thomas Boog. They were at first well received by the pagans and their king Niuliki who had only recently forbidden canabalism. However, the kingsjealousy and fear were aroused when the missionaries learned the language and gained the people's confidence; he realized the adoption of the Christian Faith would lead to the abolition of some of the prerogatives he enjoyed as both highpriest and sovereign.

Finally, when his own son expressed a desire to be baptized, the king's hatred erupted and he dispatched a group of his warriors to set upon

the saintly head of the missionaries. Thus, on April 28, 1841, three years after his arrival, St. Peter was seized and clubbed to death by those he had come to save. And his death brought his work to completion - within five months the entire island was converted to Christianity.





Catherine, the youngest of twenty-five children, was born in Siena on March 25, 1347. During her youth she had to contend with great difficulties on the part of her parents. They were planning marriage for their favorite daughter; but Catherine, who at the age of seven had already taken a vow of virginity, refused. To break her resistance, her beautiful golden brown tresses were shorn to the very skin and she was forced to do the most menial tasks. Undone by her patience, mother and father finally relented and their child entered the Third Order of St. Dominic.

Unbelievable were her austerities, her miracles, her ecstasies. The reputation of her sanctity soon spread abroad; thousands came to see her, to be converted by her. The priests associated with her, having received extraordinary faculties of absolution, were unable to accommodate the crowds of penitents. She was a helper and a consoler in every need. As time went on, her influence reached out to secular and ecclesiastical matters. She made peace between worldly princes. The heads of Church and State bowed to her words. She weaned Italy away from an anti-pope, and made cardinals and princes

promise allegiance to the rightful pontiff. She journeyed to Avignon and persuaded Pope Gregory XI to return to Rome. Even though she barely reached the age of thirty-three her accomplishments place her among the great women of the Middle Ages. The virgin Catherine was espoused to Christ by a precious nuptial ring which, although visible only to her, always remained on her finger.

### 2 May – St Athanasius, bishop, doctor. Memorial.

A champion of orthodoxy! He did not die a martyr, but his life was martyrdom in the truest sense. Athanasius was the Church's greatest hero in the battle against Arianism (a heresy that denied Christ's divinity). Even as a young deacon at the Council of Nicea (325), he was recognized as "Arius' ablest enemy" and the foremost defender of the Church's faith. After the death of his bishop (328), "the entire Catholic congregation with one accord, as one soul and body, voiced the wish of the dying bishop Alexander that Athanasius should succeed him. Everyone esteemed him as a virtuous, holy man, an ascetic, a true bishop."

There followed fifty years of constant conflict. Under five emperors and by exile on five different occasions, he gave testimony to the truth of the Catholic position. His allegiance to the Church never wavered, his courage never weakened. As consolation in the face of horrendous calumnies and




cruel persecution, Athanasius looked to the unwavering love of his Catholic people. Even time brought no mitigation in Arian hatred. For five years he hid in a deep, dry cistern to be safe from their raging wrath and their attempts to assassinate him. The place was known only to one trusted friend who secretly supplied necessary food.

That Athanasius enjoyed God's special protection should have been obvious to all. On one occasion when the emperor's assassins were pursuing him, Athanasius ordered the ship on which he was fleeing to double-back and sail upstream so that he might meet and by-pass his persecutors. Not recognizing the boat upon meeting in semi-darkness, they naively asked whether the ship carrying Athanasius was still far ahead. Calmly and truthfully Athanasius himself called back, "He is not far from here." So his persecutors kept sailing on in the same direction, allowing the saint to complete his escape.

Preserved by divine Providence through a lifetime of trial and danger, he finally died in his own quarters at Alexandria during the reign of the Emperor Valens (373). Athanasius enriched Christian literature with many important works, some pointed toward piety and edification, others polemical and dogmatic in nature. He ruled the Church of Alexandria for forty-six years.

3 May – St Philip & James, apostles. Feast.



James, Son of Alphaeus: We know nothing of this man except his name, and of course the fact that Jesus chose him to be one of the 12 pillars of the New Israel, his Church. He is not the James of Acts, son of Clopas, "brother" of Jesus and later bishop of Jerusalem and the traditional author of the Letter of James. James, son of Alphaeus, is also known as James the Lesser to avoid confusing him with James the son of Zebedee, also an apostle and known as James the Greater.

**Philip:** Philip came from the same town as Peter and Andrew, Bethsaida in Galilee. Jesus called him directly, whereupon he sought out Nathanael and told him of the "one about whom Moses wrote" (John 1:45).

Like the other apostles, Philip took a long time coming to realize who Jesus was. On one occasion, when Jesus saw the great multitude following him and

wanted to give them food, he asked Philip where they should buy bread for the people to eat. St. John comments, "[Jesus] said this to test him, because he himself knew what he was going to do" (John 6:6). Philip answered, "Two hundred days' wages worth of food would not be enough for each of them to have a little [bit]" (John 6:7).

John's story is not a put-down of Philip. It was simply necessary for these men who were to be the foundation stones of the Church to see the clear distinction between humanity's total helplessness apart from God and the human ability to be a bearer of divine power by God's gift.

On another occasion, we can almost hear the exasperation in Jesus' voice. After Thomas had complained that they did not know where Jesus was going, Jesus said, "I am the way...If you know me, then you will also know my Father. From now on you do know him and have seen him" (John 14:6a, 7). Then Philip said, "Master, show us the Father, and that will be enough for us" (John 14:8). Enough! Jesus answered, "Have I been with you for so long a time and you still do not know me, Philip? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father" (John 14:9a).

Possibly because Philip bore a Greek name or because he was thought to be close to Jesus, some Gentile proselytes came to him and asked him to introduce them to Jesus. Philip went to Andrew, and Andrew went to Jesus. Jesus' reply in John's Gospel is indirect; Jesus says that now his "hour" has come, that in a short time he will give his life for Jew and Gentile alike.
