From your Pastor

Trash and Treasure

The Malaysian airline tragedy over tUkraine shook the conscience of the world. Our prayers and sympathies go to all those who lost their dear ones in this atrocity. We, as a community, prayed together for the lives that perished in this act of violence. As some human remains are prepared to be flown to their home lands, the loved ones are awaiting, though in grief, to receive some consolation by being able to bury those charred bodies.

On the other end of the spectrum of life, there are people who have won the jackpot in the lottery. A lot of business people work towards making a fortune for themselves. When they see opportunities, they are prepared to risk everything for the fortune they hope is awaiting them. Suppose their dreams are realised, what euphoria it will cause. Jesus says the Kingdom of God is like that.

It is interesting to note that the sole mission of Jesus was to preach about the Kingdom of God but he never gave a definition as to what is this Kingdom. To explain it he always used parables. The last few weeks' gospel readings have been parables about the Kingdom of God. There was the parable of the sower, the parables of the seed and weed, the parable of the mustard seed, the parable of a little leavening the dough, and so on. Each of these stories spoke about at least one of the aspects of the Kingdom of God. But none of them actually defined what it is. The Kingdom of God is to be experienced. It cannot be explained. It is like friendship. No amount of explanation adequately explains a friendship, or a mother's bonding with her child. It has to be experienced. So is the Kingdom of God. It needs to be experienced to understand what it is.

We have all heard the expression, "fall in love". Love relationships are not really planned. It happens. The same could be said of finding the Kingdom of God. It happens. And when it happens, its bonanza surprises us like finding a huge treasure. Ironically it is not just the good fortunes that will benefit us, sometimes God can use our misfortunes to bring valuable treasures of the Kingdom of God to our lives. A fall from the grace and status in life can sometimes trigger an appraisal of life and help reconnect us with Christ and his Kingdom. Many humanitarian initiatives of the world are started as a response to some misery or pain one had to endure.

In my presbytery, I have a picture of Blessed Augustine, the Little Priest, from the parish where I was baptised. His life is very inspiring. As a newly ordained priest at the age of 30 he wished to undertake ministry in a parish. But his bishop decided that he was too sick and incapable of doing anything worthwhile and efficient as a priest. Therefore he was denied formal appointment. Even other priests and this companions did not think much of him. Slowly he found his ministry among the 'Dalits' (downtrodden) in the parish and around, bringing about amazing fruits for the Kingdom of God by the time he died at the age of 82 in 1973. The one who was considered as good for nothing, is now declared as blessed and on his way to sainthood.

Our God is a God of surprises and he does amazing things with our life. Our God is capable of turning human trash to divine treasure. Therefore in your trials and toils, do not loose heart, God may be taking you to a treasure hunt. If only you could have glimpse of this great prize, you would be prepared to sell everything else for it.

Money Collections

Sometimes I am asked why we have two collections. Let me explain the collections.

The First Collection: It is the responsibility of the parishioners to look after and pay their priests and deacons, and support the bishops of the archdiocese. The First collection on Sundays and the gifts received for baptisms, marriages, Christmas and Easter finance these payments. If there is any surplus, it is given to the common pooling of the archdiocese to pay priests in smaller parishes.

The Second Collection: Is for the support of the Parish. Though most of the pastoral work of the parish is done by volunteers, there are a number of wages and bills to pay. Building or renovation of any facility of the parish is supported by this collection. To enable tax deductibility and make financial planning easy, we have the planned giving (envelope) program. At the end of each financial year all contributors are provided with a receipt. You can either donate through weekly envelopes or authorise the parish office to make periodic deductions from you credit card. You can also set up your own direct debit using MAKE A PAYMENT portal at the bottom of the parish website (www.stpeter-stjoseph.org.au). This facility has Commonwealth Bank security.

Charitable works fund (CWF): One of the ongoing commitments of the Parish has to the Archdiocese is the Charitable works funds. Each Parish is given a quota to meet. The appeal is made three times a year. All donations to the CWF of \$2 or more are 100% tax deductable. After the collections, the short fall is made up from the Church fund (second collection). There are specially marked envelopes for donation to the CWF. You can either make donation through the parish or the archdiocesan office. The address is printed on CWF envelopes. It is also possible to use credit card for a one-off donation or to organise a periodic deduction.

Why Marry in the Catholic Church?

Today is Marriage Sunday. Today we pray that more Catholics specially will always find meaning and joy in Sacramental Marriages. There is a leaflet, brought out by Life, Marriage, & Family Centre, available at the main entrance of the church for you to take home.
