## He has done all things well

Mark 7:31-37

The ability to listen to others and to speak to them is very important in anyone's life. The ability to listen to the worries and cares of the people around us and the ability to tell them wise and consoling advises is all the more important for you and me as Christians. Without this key faculty to hear and speak we cannot announce any good news. In today's Gospel Jesus encounters a man who could not see or listen to what was in front of him or around him. Our Lord gave him sight and listening. One can only imagine the joy that brought to this man who was healed in a pagan territory.

To appreciate this story we read it in the context of the Messianic expectation of the people of God. Mark, the Gospel writer, says it happened in the region of pagans. That means Jesus performed this miracle not among the Jewish people who were waiting for the Kingdom of God. It happened in a non-Jewish territory. Mark has not written anything in his Gospel which does not have special significance in the wider spectrum of the Kingdom of God. The first reading from Isaiah gives a clue. The prophecy of Isaiah is a promise of the Saviour to the people of God. Isaiah, inspired by the Holy Spirit, announced that in the New Kingdom established by the Saviour, there will be special signs. The signs are that the blind will see, the deaf will hear, and the people who live in the land of captivity will find freedom. What Prophet Isaiah told more than six centuries before Jesus was seen fulfilled in the works of Jesus. Only the inspiration of the Holy Spirit could enable Isaiah to speak of HOPE at a time marked by disasters like the fall of the northern half of the Kingdom of Israel and later the fall of Jerusalem to Sennacarib. Similarly in the land of pagans, Jesus provided sight to the blind and voice to the voiceless. That means Jesus was unfolding the Kingdom of God announced by great prophets like Isaiah. It brought joy to whole world.

If Jesus went out to the pagan territory to empower someone to listen and speak, we too have people in our times who are not heard and not allowed to speak. The refugee issue in Australia and in the world at large is such a situation. They may not belong to our land. But just as Jesus entered the pagan territory, we too should be prepared to enter the territory of the refugees so that we can assist the process of providing them a voice. It may not be easy, but it is necessary for us to fulfil the messianic promises we believe in. this is just one of the examples of practical implication of living out the Gospel message. There are plenty more such implications to this Gospel. I am happy to initiate programs and opportunities for such practical response to the Gospel. Let me know if you are interested in the challenges. About Jesus, they said, "He has done all things well." For people to say the same about us we may have to reorganise our lives of faith.







I wish all families the best joy on this Fathers Day. Fathers play a very important role in bringing up children, along with their wives. The role of fathers and mothers are central to defining marriage. This aspect is all the more important in present time as there is a strong move to define marriage only in terms of the personal gratification between two adults, leaving out the place of children. Therefore I wish that this Fathers day may be another assertion of the centrality of children in families and the importance of parental role. I wish you fathers, their wives, all their children a happy Fathers Day.

8 September - The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary: This feast originated in Jerusalem about the sixth century, a development of the feast of the dedication of the church of Saint Anne, built in Jerusalem "where Mary was born". Observed in Rome in the seventh century, it was later used to determine the date of Mary's Immaculate Conception. Because of her importance in salvation history, Mary's birthday is celebrated as well as those of her son Jesus the Lord, and of Saint John the Baptist (24 June).


