First Reading

2 Sm 5:1-3

All the tribes of Israel came to David at Hebron. 'Look' they said 'we are your own flesh and blood. In days past when Saul was our king, it was you who led Israel in all their exploits; and the Lord said to you, "You are the man who shall be shepherd of my people Israel, you shall be the leader of Israel." 

Christ Our King

"Ageing population is a time bomb", concerned Treasurer Josh Frydenberg said last Monday. In a 'use and throw' society like ours, it is no surprise a national treasurer considers the men and women retired from formal jobs as a burden. Josh is not the first one to consider the aged population as burden. Many other economic and political leaders of the world also have done so in Singapore, China and other significant countries. These economists and politicians are putting the dignity and worth of human beings at stake. Human life is much more precious to be dumped like broken crockery or used plastic cups. But I know someone who was very different. He invited the marginalised people to the of centre social and religious life. Jesus forgave sinners and cured the lepers to restore their human dignity. For him, tax collectors and the poor were not outcasts.

He was also different in his fight against evil. At a time when the Jewish population tried armed conflict against the evil dominion of the Roman Empire, Jesus taught that the Kingdom of God is gained through mercy and compassion. He showed how to repair broken lives so that they can commence a new existence with all the excitement and beauty of a newborn. The joy you bring about by lifting the fallen and mending the broken is something no money can buy. In fact the ultimate meaning of life depends on your ability to reach out to the needy with mercy and compassion.

No wonder the disciples of Jesus have been reaching out to the needy always. For the last two thousand years the Church has been busy feeding the poor, seeking justice for the refugees and other disadvantaged, building schools, hospitals, aged care facilities and setting up social action programs and movements. The peace, joy and human dignity brought about by the missionaries and disciples of Jesus Christ are amazing! Yet many people in world are blind to it, or refuse to acknowledge it.

In the early twentieth century Pope Pius XI saw Secularism take its grip on the world. Communism, which gained popularity in the most part of the last century, was a terrible attempt to devalue Christ and his message. Starting in Russia in 1917 with a revolution, Communism was to take hold of about one third of the world population towards the end of twentieth century. Compassion and mercy did not count in Communism. It always had been ruthless. Anticipating the disaster Communism would bring about, Pope Pius XI instituted the Feast of Christ the King. He wanted the world to know that only Christ can provide proper human dignity and fullness of life. All other ideologies will fail. This was proved, towards the end of last century about Communism by the fall of many Communist systems.

The world at large may not be in the iron grip of Communism any more. But by and large the world, especially the western culture is still secular. Anti-religious agendas are dominating social discussions. Let us defy it by intentionally subjecting ourselves to the wisdom, inspiration and influence of Christ in our personal life as well as in our society. Let us share Pope Pius' hope and vision. Pius XI hoped that the feast of the Kingship of Christ, which in future will be yearly observed, may hasten the return of society to our loving Saviour."

REFLECTIONS ON LUKE 23:35-43

Historical Context – Christ the King

The Feast of Christ the King was introduced to the liturgical calendar by Pope Pius XI in 1925. The establishment of the feast took place in a world that had suffered through the First World War and was unknowingly heading towards the Second World War. In this setting, the world was experiencing a dramatic growth in secularism and an even more dramatic growth in dictators who were rising to power in various states. The introduction of the feast was a call back from the secular and a call to remember Christ as having authority above and beyond any earthly leader.

Scriptural context – Shepherds and Criminals

The gospel of Luke is underlined by a message of hope for those who are afflicted, outcast and poor. In this gospel, the message and ministry of Jesus are directed specifically to these lowly ones. The significance of the role played by the poor is highlighted by the framing of the whole narrative in this gospel: the birth of Jesus is celebrated by shepherds and his death is accompanied by criminals. Shepherds and criminals – two classes of people on the absolute fringe of society; not dignitaries or wise men from afar – are witness to the birth and death of Jesus.

Gospel Focus – A kingdom of inclusion

In response to the criminal's faith, Jesus assures him, 'today you will be with me in paradise'. There is a certainty and immediacy about the response. Jesus does not tell him that some time in the future he will be rewarded for his faith. No, it is today that the criminal will join Jesus in paradise. It is an expression of the welcome and inclusion that Jesus has extended to the outsider and undervalued throughout his ministry. It is a clear indication that the Kingdom of God that Jesus has worked to bring about is a kingdom of inclusion and welcome. .

Thy Kingdom Come

From a discourse of Origen (AD 184-253) on prayer..

The coming of the kingdom of God, says our Lord and Saviour, does not admit of observation, and there will be no-one to say "Look here! Look there!" For the kingdom of God is within us and in our hearts. And so it is beyond doubt that whoever prays for the coming of the kingdom of God within himself is praying rightly, praying for the kingdom to dawn in him, bear fruit and reach perfection. For God reigns in every saint, and every saint obeys God's spiritual laws — God, who dwells in him just as he dwells in any well-ordered city. The Father is present in him and in his soul Christ reigns alongside the Father, as it is said: We will come to him and make our dwelling with him.

Therefore, as we continue to move forward without ceasing, the kingdom of God within us will reach its perfection in us at that moment when the saying in the Apostle is fulfilled, that Christ, his enemies all made subject to him, shall deliver the kingdom to God the Father that God may be All in All.

For this reason let us pray without ceasing, our souls filled by a desire made divine by the Word Himself. Let us pray to our Father in heaven: hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come.

There is something important that we need to understand about the kingdom of God: just as righteousness has no partnership with lawlessness, just as light has nothing in common with darkness and Christ has no agreement with Belial, so the kingdom of God and a kingdom of sin cannot co-exist.

So if we want God to reign within us, on no account may sin rule in our mortal body but let us mortify our earthly bodies and let us be made fruitful by the Spirit. Then we will be a spiritual garden of Eden for God to walk in. God will rule in us with Christ who will be seated in us on the right hand of God — God, the spiritual power that we pray to receive — until he makes his enemies (who are within us) into his footstool and pours out on us all authority, all power, all strength.

This can happen to any one of us and death, the last enemy may be destroyed, so that in us Christ says Death, where is your sting? Death, where is your victory? So let our corruptibility be clothed today with holiness and incorruption. With Death dead, let our mortality be cloaked in the Father's immortality. With God ruling in us, let us be immersed in the blessings of regeneration and resurrection.

FEASTS & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Monday, 25 November - St Catherine of Alexandria (Memorial)



Died in Alexandria (Egypt) perhaps in the early 4th century. Nothing is known about her. The famous tenth-century legend depicts her as a well-educated noblewoman, confronting the Emperor,

confounding the philosophers in debate, and collapsing the wheel upon which she was to be executed. Remembered as a heroine of the Middle Ages.

Saturday, 30 November - St Andrew, apostle (Feast)



Born at Bethsaida (Galilee). A fisherman and perhaps a disciple of John the Baptist (24 June). Introduced his brother, Simon Peter (29 June), to Jesus and became one of the first to follow Christ. Mentioned a number of times in the gospels, for example, in

introducing some Gentiles to Jesus (John 12:20ff.). Widely venerated since ancient times and remembered as one of the twelve who bore witness to the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.
