THE HARVEST DEPENDS ON THE OPENNESS OF THE DISCIPLES

I have a problem in preparing my homilies each week. To be an effective communicator I need to speak at the level of my audience. But if the audience are at different levels of understanding, what do you do? Still worse is when your audience are at different levels of openness to the Word of God. Some people may be attending the Church out of habit. For such people just a routine is enough and the what I say is secondary. There are others who are looking for solutions for the problems in their lives. They are earnest seekers of the Word of God, as long as the Homily is addressing their problems. There are also studious people interested in learning the Bible for intellectual satisfaction. A scholarly discourse is what these people are looking for. Then there are people wanting to improve on their commitment as disciples of Jesus Christ. Such spiritual seekers are not the majority. How to preach to such a diverse audience? This dilemma of mine is not unique, and not to this time.

The disciples in the early Church were also frustrated that their teachings and preaching did not always produce a hundred percent result. The 1st century preachers even faced a lot of hostility as well. Therefore, the Lord advised his disciples with the parable of the sower and the seeds meaning that a lot of seeds will be wasted in different ways. But some will be yielding fruits of different measures. Though limited, be satisfied with the harvest you are able to reap. Leave the responsibility of not wasting the Word of God to the hearers for whom the Word of God is sown. You, as a preacher, can only be as effective as the openness of the disciple allows.

Wednesday, 15 July - St Bonaventure, bishop, doctor (Memorial)
Born at Bagnoregio (Italy) about 1218. Died at Lyons (France) on this day in 1274. He joined the Franciscans when studying in Paris and eventually became minister general of the order. Later appointed cardinal-bishop of Albano and died assisting Pope Gregory X during the Council of Lyons. Known as the "Seraphic Doctor". Remembered as a teacher, for his extensive biblical and mystical writings, and for his holiness, gentleness, and compassion.

REFLECTIONS ON MATTHEW 13:1-9

Historical Context – Matthew's community

The gospel of Matthew is written at a time and particular context in which the community audience were feeling the effects of having been ostracised from the Jewish community. They were confounded by the fact that other Jews could not accept the reality of the Jesus message as they had. This parable, and the accompanying conversation with the disciples in which they are blessed for their understanding, would have been a comfort for the Matthew community. Although they were frustrated, they were being told through this story that not everyone is ready to hear the message that they had heard and accepted.

Scriptural context – A Parable Chapter

The gospel of Matthew is nothing if not a well-crafted and highly structured piece of writing. Throughout the gospel there are five major 'discourses' or teachings. Chapter 13, which consists entirely of a collection of parables, is the central discourse of the five. It is the pivotal point of the entire gospel. The nature of the parables indicates that the message of Jesus has not been universally accepted and the parables present metaphors about the consequences for those who do and do not accept the message of Jesus about the reign of God.

Living the Gospel – Scatter that seed!

The teaching of the parable of the sower is as true for us today as it was in its original context. The word of the kingdom continues to fall on people who are at various stages of readiness to receive it. What Jesus suggests to his disciples - and to us - is that the 'good soil' can't always be predicted. Jesus doesn't tell his disciples to only sow the word in people who are receptive. Rather, he wants them – and us – to scatter the word everywhere and to rejoice when it does find good soil and yields a rich harvest.

Put Christ Before Everything

From the Rule of Benedict, (Saturday, 11 July is the memorial feast of Saint Benedict)

Whenever you begin any good work you should first of all make a most pressing appeal to Christ our Lord to bring it to perfection; that he, who has honoured us by counting us among his children, may never be grieved by our evil deeds. For we must always serve him with the good things he has given us in such a way that he may never – as an angry father disinherits his sons or even like a master who inspires fear – grow impatient with our sins and consign us to everlasting punishment, like wicked servants who would not follow him to glory.

So we should at long last rouse ourselves, prompted by the words of Scripture: Now is the time for us to rise from sleep. Our eyes should be open to the God-given light, and we should listen in wonderment to the message of the divine voice as it daily cries out: Today, if you shall hear his voice, harden not your hearts; and again: If anyone has ears to hear, let him listen to what the Spirit is saying to the churches. And what does the Spirit say? Come my sons, listen to me; I will teach you the fear of the Lord. Hurry, while you have the light of life, so that death's darkness may not overtake you.

And the Lord as he seeks the one who will do his work among the throng of people to whom he makes that appeal, says again: Which of you wants to live to the full; who loves long life and the enjoyment of prosperity? And, if when you hear this you say, I do, God says to you: If you desire true and everlasting life, keep your tongue from evil and your lips from deceit; turn away from evil and do good; seek peace and pursue it. And when you have done these things my eyes will be upon you and my ears will be attentive to your prayers; and before you call upon my name I shall say to you: Behold, I am here. What could be more delightful, dearest brothers, than the voice of our Lord's invitation to us? In his loving kindness he reveals to us the way of life.

And so, girded with faith and the performance of good works, let us follow in his paths by the guidance of the Gospel; then we shall deserve to see him who has called us into his kingdom. If we wish to attain a dwelling-place in his kingdom we shall not reach it unless we hasten there by our good deeds.

Just as there exists an evil fervour, a bitter spirit, which divides us from God and leads us to hell, so there is a good fervour which sets us apart from evil inclinations and leads us towards God and eternal life. Monks should put this fervour into practice with an overflowing love: that is, they should surpass each other in mutual esteem, accept their weaknesses, either of body or of behaviour, with the utmost patience; and vie with each other in acceding to requests. No one should follow what he considers to be good for himself, but rather what seems good for another. They should display brotherly love in a chaste manner; fear God in a spirit of love; revere their abbot with a genuine and submissive affection. Let them put Christ before all else; and may he lead us all to everlasting life.

WHAT'S NEW?

Relaxation of the COVID Restrictions

Now the number of people allowed inside the church will be determined by the 'one person per 4 square metre' rule, with no upper limit. This means we can have 90 people in our church. Going by last weekend's observation, the demands for attendance at the Masses are far below 90. Therefore, no prebooking is necessary. Mass attendance will be controlled by 1st come first served basis. In case of too many turning up to the church, after the first 90 entered the Church, the door will be closed. Live streaming of the 8AM Mass will continue for the time being, for the benefit of those who cannot attend the Church in person. Each time you come to the church, you will be required to register your name and contact details. If you are feeling unwell you should not come to the Church. If are unwell, please consult your GP. Thank you for your continued cooperation.

The Children's Liturgy and Communion Run will take some more time to resume. There will not be any Choir practices allowed for the time being.

Volunteers are welcome to monitor the church after Mass hours. We need to make sure all those who enter the Church are registering their name and contact details as well as sanitising their hands.

Now we are also starting to get to recommence other pastoral and liturgical activities as much as we can. Saturday devotion of the Holy Hour will be on from $8.30 \, \text{AM} - 9.30 \, \text{AM}$, starting with Rosary prayer. Bookings for Baptisms, anointing of the sick, marriages are welcome. Schedule for Confessions will be on at $8.30 \, \text{AM}$ to $9.30 \, \text{AM}$ on Saturdays. But you are also welcome to call and make an appointment for any other time.

The Sacramental Programs are also modified according to the demands of the COVID19 situation.

Many of you have been supporting the parish financially through this time of restrictions. There has been an increase in the use of direct debits and the use of the tap facility. Electronic means of paying is the preferred way of the parish. It reduces many risks. The overall income is less than half of the normal. I would like to thank all contributors for their support.
