

DON'T BE DISTRACTED FROM BRINGING GOOD NEWS TO OTHERS





The Gospel of Mark gives some idea about the activities of Jesus at Capernaum, where he lived with Simon and Andrew at their house. He taught in the local synagogue, healed the sick who came to him, and he prayed to the Father in Heaven. We can draw a model of Christian mission from the activities of Jesus mentioned in the Gospel – teaching and learning the Word of God, healing the sick, and keeping up the prayer communication with God. The more you study the Word of God, the more you discern the Will of God. The more you indulge in prayer as a communication with God, the more you will experience God's love, and you will have more confidence in God's plan for you. You may not dispute these two aspects of faith life. But healing the sick! That you may think as beyond your scope and would rather leave to medical professionals and psychologists. But some of the most damaging sickness in human stories can be better helped by you than by medical professionals.

Loneliness is a debilitating sickness affecting many. Only Christlike companionship can provide an effective remedy for loneliness in life. In another kind of scenario, many mums and dads speak about their struggle to keep peace with children and spouses. There is no lack of love between them. But still there is something that is affecting the peace and the serenity. The love and the expression of it in such families are not sweet. Home chores have become just a responsibility you do, rather than something you look forward to. Parents boss over their children, but children are still out of control. It frustrates the children as much it does the parents. Because even from a very tender age onwards human beings have a right to be treated with dignity, and they are not getting it when the parents boss over them. Listening to the little ones, reasoning out with them on their demands, answering their unending chain of questions, and never telling them anything that is not true are key to showing children respect. They may embarrass you; but as a parent you are never to embarrass them before others. In short you as a parent need Christ like humility in your dealings with your children. No physician or psychologist can help you in this regard. Similarly, injustice can make sections of society feel their dignity stolen or eroding. Legislation might help provide financial compensations for the downtrodden. But people with Christlike hearts are needed to offer them the hope of dignity. You as a disciple of Christ can help where medicine, therapies, and legislations fail.

It is human nature to bask in the glory of any success. The disciples of Jesus were feeling proud of their master, Jesus, for the admiration the village people had for him. When the disciples of Jesus found him in a deserted place they told him, "Everyone is searching for you". Hearing this, unlike other human beings, Jesus did not get inflated with an air of importance. Not losing the focus on his mission, he said, "Let us go on to the neighbouring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came out to do." Let no popularity deviate the course of your life. Let nothing distract you from the mission of delivering good news to others.

He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came.' And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.

REFLECTIONS ON MARK 1:29-39

Historical Context – Capernaum Have you thought? Simon's Jesus appears to have made Capernaum his base after leaving Nazareth. He may, in fact, have based himself at Simon Peter's house. There are many references in the gospels to Jesus' actions in Capernaum. Archaeologists have identified the house in Capernaum that they believe to be Simon Peter's house – less than 100 metres from the Capernaum synagogue. Evidence reveals carved inscriptions and symbols that identify both Jesus and Peter. The house appears to have been used as a 'house-church' until a church was built on the site in the 5th Century. Excavations of the site can be seen today.

Wife?

In this week's reading, it is Simon's mother-in-law who is healed. This obviously means that Simon is married. However, there is no mention whatsoever about his wife. Is she alive or dead? Do they have children? We have no indication. It is not until the writings of Paul (1 Cor 9:5) that we learn Simon Peter was indeed married and that his wife accompanied him on his travels. Perhaps this visit to his family home was to announce to his wife and family that he had decided to follow Jesus and give up fishing.

Living the Gospel – Prayer

In the midst of an extremely hectic 24 hours where Jesus effectively launches his public ministry, Jesus takes time to go aside to a lonely place and pray. The passage tells us that it was 'long before dawn' that he did this. It may have been his usual practice to pray early in the morning or he may have been restless after the events of the previous day and the thought of what lay ahead. Nevertheless, Jesus provides us with a model of using prayer to reflect on events and to prepare ourselves for the day ahead.

The Controversy Over Circumcision & Other Jewish Rites

From an explanation of Paul's letter to the Galatians by Saint Augustine

Paul writes to the Galatians to make them understand that by God's grace they are no longer under the law. When the Gospel was preached to them, there were some among them of Jewish origin known as circumcisers – though they called themselves Christians – who did not grasp the gift they had received. They still wanted to be under the burden of the law. Now God had imposed that burden on those who were slaves to sin and not on servants of justice. That is to say, God had given a just law to unjust men in order to show them their sin, not to take it away. For sin is taken away only by the gift of faith that works through love. The Galatians had already received this gift, but the circumcisers claimed that the Gospel would not save them unless they underwent circumcision and were willing to observe also the other traditional Jewish rites.

The Galatians, therefore, began to question Paul's preaching of the Gospel because he did not require Gentiles to follow Jewish observances as other apostles had done. Even Peter had yielded to the scandalised protests of the circumcisers. He pretended to believe that the Gospel would not save the Gentiles unless they fulfilled the burden of the law. But Paul recalled him from such dissimulation, as is shown in this very same letter. A similar issue arises in Paul's letter to the Romans, but with an evident difference. Through his letter to them, Paul was able to resolve the strife and controversy that had developed between the Jewish and Gentile

In the present letter Paul is writing to persons who were profoundly influenced and disturbed by the circumcisers. The Galatians had begun to believe them and to think that Paul had not preached rightly, since he had not ordered them to be circumcised. And so the Apostle begins by saying: I am amazed that you are so quickly deserting him who called you to the glory of Christ, and turning to another gospel.

After this there comes a brief introduction to the point at issue. But remember in the very opening of the letter Paul had said that he was an apostle not from men nor by any man, a statement that does not appear in any other letter of his. He is making it quite clear that the circumcisers, for their part, are not from God but from men, and that his authority in preaching the Gospel must be considered equal to that of the other apostles. For he was called to be an apostle not from men nor by any man, but through God the Father and his Son Jesus Christ.

New Direction for Ash Wednesday

On 12 January, The Congregation for Divine Worship (Rome) has issued a directive concerning the

Imposition of Ashes in this time of pandemic. Accordingly Ash Wednesday, 17 February 2021, Ash ceremony in our parish will be modified. Instead of the normal practice of daubing the ashes on the forehead, the minister with mask on, will sprinkle the ashes on the head of the faithful. That will ensure a contact free and COVID safe practice.

Fr Don Richardson, Liturgy Office Director of Sydney Archdiocese, has made the following comments.

- a. The act of putting on ashes symbolizes fragility and mortality, and the need to be redeemed by the mercy of God. Far from being a merely external act, it symbolizes that attitude of internal penance to which all the baptized are called during Lent.
- b. The placing of ashes on top of the head is the more ancient practice; It is the common method in many parts of the world;
- c. In time of Covid-19 it has the advantage of not requiring the priest to contact the skin of many people one after another, risking inadvertent infection;
- d. The fact that the ashes are not readily visible to others is of no concern, since they are principally intended as a sign for the person receiving them and not for others.

least four Masses on Ash Wednesday. The first one at 6.45AM and the evening one at 7.30PM. Times for the Masses during the day are yet to be finalised. It will be announced next week.

Lenten Prayer Groups

There will various Lenten groups. Already some friends groups have organised themselves to meet at one of the homes weekly to reflect and pray using the resource, 'COMFORT'. Any more groups of friends wanting to do the same are welcome to contact parish office to organise resources and any other assistance required. There could be a group meeting in the church premises on Friday evenings, subject to confirmation in a few days.

Fr Thomas will be leading a Bible reflection program on Tuesdays of the Lent. It will be based on the Scripture readings of the Lenten Sundays. Venue: St Peter Chanel Church | Time 7-8PM. You are welcome to contact parish office to join this group.

Stations of the Cross

The devotion of the Stations of the Cross will be on Fridays of Lent commencing at 7PM. No booking required for this. You can register your name on arrival at the door of the church.

Project Compassion

Last year's 'Project Compassion' appeal was disrupted by COVID restrictions. But this year we hope to hold it. The necessary envelopes and boxes will be made available soon.

Confessions/Reconciliation

Fr Thomas will be available to hear confession Tuesdays to Saturdays after the morning Mass till Holy Week.

Lenten Fast

Lent is a time of fasting, prayer and alms giving.

Lenten Penance Explained

The Church's Canon law reaffirms the obligation to do penance – to interrupt the usual comforts of life, to rediscover in prayer the saving love of God, and to practice charity and justice towards those in need. During Lent and on the Fridays of the year, we do penance, not only on our own account, but also in the name of the Church and of the world. We must take seriously our penitential obligations and be sure to carry them out. The Australian Catholic Bishops' Conference has not restricted our penance to fast and abstinence in all cases, it has left room for our own responsible choices. We should carefully select the form of penance that we consider most appropriate for our own circumstances and growth in the Christian life.

Days of Penance

- 1. Abstinence from meat, and fasting, are to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. All who have completed their 18th year and have not yet begun their 60th year are bound to fast. All who have completed their 14th year are bound to abstain.
- 2. On all other Fridays of the year including the Fridays of Lent, the law of the common practice of penance is fulfilled by performing any one of the following:
 - (a) prayer for example, Mass attendance; family prayer; a visit to a church or chapel; reading the Bible; making the Stations of the Cross; praying the Rosary.
 - (b) self-denial for example, not eating meat; not eating sweets or dessert; giving up entertainment to spend time with the family; limiting food and drink so as to give to the poor of one's own country.
 - (c) helping others for example, special attention to someone who is poor, sick, elderly, lonely or overburdened.

Lent lasts from Ash Wednesday (February 17) to the Mass of the Lord's Supper (April 1) exclusive. On Good Friday and, if possible, also on Holy Saturday until the Easter Vigil, the Easter fast is observed.

Paschal Precept

Each of the faithful is obliged to receive Holy Communion at least once a year. This is to be done between Ash Wednesday, February 17, and Trinity Sunday, May 30, 2021 unless for a good reason it is done at another time during the year. All the faithful are obliged to confess their grave sins at least once a year.



Who are we?

Local parishioners who make time each school week to reach out to the ends of our Parish to have about 30 minutes with children from K – 6 classes in three stages of learning about the Catholic Faith and teachings of the Catechism.

I have been a Catechist for just six months and have enjoyed the experience immensely. I am eager to start teaching scripture again at Regents Park Public School later this month for Years 5 & 6 students and also serve as relieving Catechist at Berala Public and Auburn West.

Be COVID Safe

Following is an excerpt from NSW Health Department.

All religious services

- The person leading the wedding, funeral or other religious service does not need to wear a mask. This is because they need to be clearly understood by congregants.
- The congregation needs to wear masks indoors, unless exempt.
- The congregation must not exceed one person per 4 square metres of publicly accessible space.

Weddings

- During a wedding service, the person leading the service does not need to wear a mask, nor does the wedding party. This includes the wedding couple whilst they say their vows.
- If a wedding occurs in a place of worship as part of a religious service, attendees at the service need to wear a mask indoors, unless exempt.
- Up to a maximum of 300 people can attend a wedding. But our church is limited to 100 following the four square metre rule.

Funerals

- The person leading the funeral service does not need to wear a mask, nor does anybody while delivering a eulogy or similar as part of the funeral service.
- Attendees at the service need to be wearing a mask indoors, unless exempt.
- Up to a maximum of 300 people can attend a funeral. But our church is limited to 100 following the four square metre rule.

Music performances during religious services, weddings and funerals

• Where music performance is part of a service (religious, weddings or funerals), masks do not need to be worn by the performer if impractical for the performance such as wind instruments or singing.

Singing and chanting advice

- No more than 5 performers should sing indoors, with 1.5 metres between performers and 5 metres between performers and the audience.
- In indoor areas, audience members and congregants should not participate in singing or chanting.

In our Church, St Peter Chanel, as good citizens, we too shall comply with the regulations. We do it for the good of the community at large. To assist with protocols, we have five volunteers acting as COVID Marshals. The parish is grateful to Joseph Lahoud, Robert McGinn, Solomone Funaki, Charlie Scully, and William Andrews for volunteering. They will be encouraging the use of QR code to sign in as you arrive. Therefore, please remember to bring your smartphone with you. If you are not equipped to use the QR code, you can sign on the paper form at the door. Should you forget your face mask, (which can easily happen) there will be a few spare ones available at the entrance for your use. The dispenser on the wall is to help you with touch free sanitisation of your hands before Mass.

The doors of the Church will be closed at the start of the Mass so that the Marshals can also join the congregation to celebrate Mass. The unattended doorway would risk people wandering in without complying with the protocols. We shall all consider the care for each other as our Christian charity and do it seriously.
