No Show Off, But Sacrifice

Once I received an email, asking for the parish account details. Someone wanted to make a donation to the parish. I obliged. Sure enough I received a handsome amount of twenty-five thousand dollars. It was given towards the much needed repair of the Church. There was no appeal for money made and the payment was totally the donor's initiative. Therefore, it was a surprise. But there was more to the story. The name on the email did not ring any bells. Therefore, I wrote back asking for an introduction from the donor. The reply was incredible. The donor said, "I am a single mother and a parishioner. The mortgage was too much for me to bear. Therefore, I had to sell the house and move into a rented place. Now that I got some money from the sale of the house I wanted to help the church." I was stunned to read it; a single mother struggling to pay her mortgage sells her house and helps the church from the proceeds. At that time, I told her that the church is not desperate for money. Yet she wanted to maintain the donation! She made a donation from what most people would have considered critical for the security in life. I could see that her faith in God's providence weighed much more than the glamour of wealth and the approval of the people.

Jesus once told the parable contrasting the contribution of a poor widow and that of the rich people (*Mark* 12:41-44). The rich and the pompous are able to splash money and win admiration. The widow made a small contribution but it amounted most of her livelihood. Because of her selfless giving, the widow, unlike the rich, was praised by Jesus. God who reads the secrets of our hearts reward us accordingly. The life of a Christian is not to be a show off, but to be consisted of genuine sacrifices.

'As the Lord your God lives', she replied, 'I have no baked bread, but only a handful of meal in a jar and a little oil in a jug; I am just gathering a stick or two to go and prepare this for myself and my son to eat, and then we shall die.' But Elijah said to her, 'Do not be afraid, go and do as you have said; but first make a little scone of it for me and bring it to me, and then make some for yourself and for your son. For thus the Lord speaks, the God of Israel:

"Jar of meal shall not be spent, jug of oil shall not be emptied, before the day when the Lord sends rain on the face of the earth."

The woman went and did as Elijah told her and they ate the food, she, himself and her son. The jar of meal was not spent nor the jug of oil emptied, just as the Lord had foretold through Elijah.

And he does not have to offer himself again and again, like the high priest going into the sanctuary year after year with the blood that is not his own, or else he would have had to suffer over and over again since the world began. Instead of that, he has made his appearance once and for all, now at the end of the last age, to do away with sin by sacrificing himself. Since men only die once, and after that comes judgement, so Christ, too, offers himself only once to take the faults of many on himself, and when he appears a second time, it will not be to deal with sin but to reward with salvation those who are waiting for him.

The more severe will be the sentence they receive.'

Then he called to his disciples and said to them, 'I tell you solemnly, this poor widow has put more in than all who have contributed to the treasury; for they have all put in money they had over, but she from the little she had has put in everything she possessed, all she had to live on.'

FEAST & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Tuesday—9 November - The Dedication of the Lateran Basilica (Feast)



The Dedication of the Lateran Basilica The Lateran Basilica, the cathedral of the diocese of Rome, was dedicated to Christ the Saviour in the fourth century. The anniversary has been celebrated as a feast of the Latin Church on this date since the twelfth century. It honours the local Church of Rome

as a link with earliest Christian tradition and as a sign of our communion in Christ.

Wednesday, 10 November - St Leo the Great (Memorial)



Died in Rome on this day in 461. Elected pope in 440. Tried to protect the city from the devastation of barbarian invasion. His surviving letters illustrate the leadership and guidance he exercised as bishop of Rome toward other Churches in the West. Remembered for the clarity

of his thought on the two natures of Christ, affirmed at the Council of Chalcedon, for his eloquent sermons, and for the prayers he composed for the Roman liturgy.

Thursday, 11 November - St Martin of Tours (Memorial)



He was born in Arona (Italy) in 1538. Died on this day in 1584 in Milan. Only twenty-two when he was appointed cardinal, secretary of state, and given the administration of the diocese of Milan by his uncle, Pius IV. Prominent in the final sessions of

the Council of Trent during 1562-1563 and, at its end, was ordained presbyter, then bishop and became archbishop of Milan. Known for implementing the Council's reforms in liturgy, education, presbyterial formation, and diocesan organisation. Remembered as an exemplary and pastoral bishop and an ardent proponent of reform and renewal.

Friday, 12 November - St Josaphat (Memorial)



Born in Vladimir (Ukraine) in 1580. Died at Vitebsk (Belarus) on this day in 1623. A Basilian monk who became archbishop of Polotsk. Worked strenuously to uphold and spread the Union of Brest-Litovsk by which Churches of the province of Kiev, with their

Byzantine liturgy and customs, had entered into communion with Rome. In a complex situation of national and religious antagonism, he was killed by violent opponents. Remembered for his energetic pastoral reform and courageous ecumenism.

REFLECTIONS ON MARK 12:38-44

Living the Gospel – Hypocrisy Throughout the gospels, what Jesus appears to abhor more than anything else is hypocrisy. His harshest condemnation of the scribes and the Pharisees is that they are hypocrites. In this passage, whilst Jesus hates the scribes' parading around and claiming honour that is not their due, what really sees him condemn them is their mistreatment of widows 'while making a show of lengthy prayers'. We cannot praise God in prayer while at the same time mistreating our neighbour. That is hypocrisy! Our actions are an extension of our prayer. We cannot celebrate the Eucharist on Sundays and fail to live it the rest of the week!

Have you thought? What's in a word?

It's interesting that we have traditionally read Jesus' comments about the widow's offering as praise and perhaps even some pride in her actions. Nothing in the words themselves give away Jesus' emotion. Try reading Jesus' words with a variety of different emotions: anger; sadness; joy; triumph; dismay. How does the emotion with which we read these words change our understanding of them? Can you think of other passages that could be read in a whole new light if we changed our preconceived ideas about the emotion with which Jesus spoke?

Historical Context - The Widow In ancient Jewish culture, until a woman was married she was literally the property of her father. Upon marrying, the woman left her family and became part of her husband's family and became specifically the property of her husband. If the woman's husband were to die, leaving her a widow, she no longer had anywhere to belong. Because a woman's identity was based on which man she belonged to, she effectively ceased to belong anywhere. It is for this reason that the Torah names widows as deserving of special care and protection from the whole community.

Monsignor Michael Berbari



Monsignor Michael Berbari has moved into St Charbel Aged Care Punchbowl. He came to Sydney in 1985 as the first chaplain for the Syrian Catholics. Upon the request of then Vicar for Immigration, Fr Phil Zadro, Fr Graham Kings and the parishioners offered him accommodation at Berala. From here he travelled around the greater Sydney and Melbourne serving Syrian and Coptic Catholics. Cardinal Edward Clancy, gave him the faculties of the Archdiocese and thereafter he has been supported by the Archdiocese of Sydney, as one of its own. He was ordained Cor-bishop by Cardinal Mousa Daud in Egypt prior to his coming to Australia. It is

a title existing only in the Antiochian tradition and unknown to the Latin (Roman) Rite. The nearest equivalent to Cor-bishop in Roman Rite is Monsignor, and that became his title.

Monsignor Berbari was active celebrating the daily morning Mass, hearing confessions and visiting families, in our parish too, until a couple of years ago when ill health made it difficult for him to do it any more. Therefore, he decided to move into an assisted living facility. He is enjoying the Lebanese culture and food there. Along with all parishioners, I wish him a happy and safe living at St Charbel. The Blessing of Death

St Ambrose

St Paul says, The world is crucified to me, and I to the world. Then he tells us that he means death in this life, and a good death: We carry with us in our body the death of Jesus, so that the life of our Lord Jesus, too, may always be seen in our body.

Let death do its work in us, therefore, so that life may do its work also: a good life after death, that is, a good life after victory, after the battle is over, when the law of the flesh is no longer in conflict with the law of the mind, when we have no more battles with mortal flesh but in mortal flesh we have victory. I wonder if this death might not have more power in it than life. St Paul's authority certainly suggests it when he says Death works in us but life in you.

One man's death has laid the foundations of life for so many people! And so St Paul teaches that we should seek that death in this life, so that Christ's death should shine out in our bodies. That blessed death, in which our outer nature falls away and our inner nature is renewed, and our earthly dwelling is dissolved so that our heavenly home is laid open to us.

A man imitates this death when he drags himself away from being part of this flesh and breaks those chains that the Lord had spoken of through the prophet Isaiah: Break unjust fetters, undo the thongs of the yoke, let the oppressed go free, and break every unjust constraint.

It was to put an end to guilt that the Lord permitted death to come into the world; but so that human nature should not end up perishing by death instead of guilt, the resurrection of the dead was given us. By death, guilt would be ended, and by resurrection, human nature would be eternal.

And thus this death is a journey for everyone. You must always be journeying: from decay to incorruptibility, from mortality to immortality, from turbulence to peace. Do not be alarmed by the word 'death' but rejoice at the good that the journey will bring. For what is death except the burial of vice and the raising up of virtue? Hence Scripture says, May I die the death of the just – that is, may I be buried with them, put down my vices, and put on the grace of the just, who carry the mortification of Christ around in their bodies and their souls.
