See the Signs of God Coming

Federal elections are due in a few months and the politicians are in campaign mode now. Their challenge is to show how they will brighten up the apparently bleak future. COVID restrictions caused a lot of anxiety in terms of economy, mental health, personal freedom, and wellbeing. Climate change and related issues are presenting a gloomy picture. Foreign relations and policies, especially with China, have been worrying many. In these gloomy scenario, the politicians are challenged to take cues from these matters and tell us how they see the future is promising. On the first Sunday of Advent, the Gospel is about recognising a promising future for Christians even in the midst of calamities.

The early Christian Community of Luke went through the horrors of persecution of the Christians by Nero and other rulers, a devastating war in which the city of Jerusalem and the temple were destroyed. In such a situation, what hope the Christians could have for the Kingdom of God? Answering this question, the Gospel uses various prophetic passages from the Old Testament, either explicitly or implicitly. The thread that binds the prophetic verses is their interpretation of the Babylonian assault on Israel and the deportation of the Jews seven centuries before Christ. The prophets showed God's hand was at work even through the darkest days of the history of Israel. God re-established Israel and its temple. These verses are re-read in Luke to promise that the Kingdom of God will be established in the name of Jesus, in spite of the atrocities and disasters they experience. Thus the Gospel is helping Christians to interpret the world around them through the eyes of the Scripture. Christians are not to succumb to fear and uncertainty. Be alert to all that is happening around you. Find strength in your faith to see God's Kingdom unfolding trough the events of your own life and around you. When you see the trees sprout leaves, you know that the cold and dark winter is over and a warm and sunny summer is approaching. Similarly, as a disciple of Christ you should be able to read the signs of God's Kingdom emerging even in difficult times. As we start preparing to celebrate the birth of God into human history and story, see how God's coming is continuing in varied ways in your life and in the world. We are in preparation, not just for the birth anniversary of Jesus, but the ongoing coming of God and his presence in our present time.

REFLECTIONS ON LUKE 21:25-28. 34-36

Scriptural context

This week's gospel passage comes from a lengthy passage in the gospel of Luke in which Jesus speaks extensively about the future. It is a very different style of writing from the usual narrative, teaching and parable forms that make up most of the gospel. The style is an echo of the prophetic writings of the Old Testament. Compare this passage with this week's first reading of other passages from the writings of the prophets. The style is always rich in metaphor and symbol. There is a grandness about the style. We know, just from the use of language, that great things are afoot!

Have you thought? - Waiting, waiting, waiting ...

I'm not a big fan of waiting! Anticipation is pretty good; getting prepared and getting ready are OK, too. But when is comes down to being all dressed up and ready to go, I'm just hopeless at waiting. If Advent is a time of pointless waiting for Christmas then we've somehow missed the message. Rather than just waiting, Advent is a time of preparation and anticipation. But it's not just about anticipating Christmas. That's part of it, sure. However, Advent is about reminding ourselves that we have a job to do: preparing for the reign of God – in time to get it right. . our lives and in our world.

Different View - We're doomed! Fundamentalists love readings like this week's apocalyptic gospel passage. Full of portent and urgency, it inspires the sort of thinking that says, 'Repent now, because you could be dead tomorrow!' It is easy to look at a passage like this and apply it to the conditions of the world today: everything's going to rack and ruin; it's just as the Bible foretold; the end of the world is just around the corner. But we have to remember that this was written nearly 2,000 years ago! Yes, there is still urgency! Yes, there is still need for change! But we still have

FEAST & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Tuesday, 30 November - St Andrew (Feast)



Born at Bethsaida (Galilee). A fisherman and perhaps a disciple of John the Baptist (24 June). Introduced his brother, Simon Peter (29 June), to Jesus and became one of the first to follow Christ. Mentioned a number of times in the gospels, for example, in introducing some Gentiles to

Jesus (John 12:20ff.). Widely venerated since ancient times and remembered as one of the twelve who bore witness to the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

Friday, 3 December - St Francis (Memorial)



Born in 1506 in Navarre (Spain). Died on this day in 1552 off the coast of China. Met Saint Ignatius of Loyola (31 July) while studying in Paris, became one of the first Jesuits, and went to Goa (India) as a missionary. Travelled extensively through southeast Asia to Japan, winning many converts

and leaving behind organised Christian communities. Remembered for the witness of his poverty and for his tireless efforts as a missionary.



The twofold coming of Christ

From the Instructions to Catechumens by St Cyril of Jerusalem

We do not preach only one coming of Christ, but a second as well, much more glorious than the first. The first coming was marked by patience; the second will bring the crown of a divine kingdom.

In general, whatever relates to our Lord Jesus Christ has two aspects. There is a birth from God before the ages, and a birth from a virgin at the fullness of time. There is a hidden coming, like that of rain on fleece, and a coming before all eyes, still in the future.

At the first coming he was wrapped in swaddling clothes in a manger. At his second coming he will be clothed in light as in a garment. In the first coming he endured the cross, despising the shame; in the second coming he will be in glory, escorted by an army of angels.

We look then beyond the first coming and await the second. At the first coming we said: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. At the second we shall say it again; we shall go out with the angels to meet the Lord and cry out in adoration: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

The Saviour will not come to be judged again, but to judge those by whom he was judged. At his own judgement he was silent; then he will address those who committed the outrages against him when they crucified him and will remind them: You did these things, and I was silent.

His first coming was to fulfil his plan of love, to teach men by gentle persuasion. This time, whether men like it or not, they will be subjects of his kingdom by necessity.

The prophet Malachi speaks of the two comings. And the Lord whom you seek will come suddenly to his temple: that is one coming.

Again he says of another coming: Look, the Lord almighty will come, and who will endure the day of his entry, or who will stand in his sight? Because he comes like a refiner's fire, a fuller's herb, and he will sit refining and cleansing.

These two comings are also referred to by Paul in writing to Titus: The grace of God the Saviour has appeared to all men, instructing us to put aside impiety and worldly desires and live temperately, uprightly, and religiously in this present age, waiting for the joyful hope, the appearance of the glory of our great God and Saviour, Jesus Christ. Notice how he speaks of a first coming for which he gives thanks, and a second, the one we still await.

That is why the faith we profess has been handed on to you in these words: He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

Our Lord Jesus Christ will therefore come from heaven. He will come at the end of the world, in glory, at the last day. For there will be an end to this world, and the created world will be made new.
