Temptations and Ministry

Recent floods in many parts of the state and beyond isolated some communities and people in the submerged areas like Lismore were forced to leave their homes for refuge centres. Another heart-breaking news is the war in Ukraine. Our concern for these situations are heightened even before our memory of volcanic disaster in Tonga and that of the war torn Lebanon. And the whole world is yet to recover from the COVID pandemic. There is something common in all these: Humanity is taken away from its comfort zone and compelled to contemplate on the mission and meaning of life. Every devastation, both manmade devastations and natural calamities, are a kind of wilderness. Terrible losses of people and property are the primary experience in all these situations. Such situations, though horrible, also has a positive side. In times of such dire need, we all think about how to help others. It is a time when we are all compelled to contemplate on the mission of our lives, and ask the question "What can I do for others?" Turning the focus from one's own self to the other is the first step towards God. Perhaps every missionary of the good news had a wilderness experience, some of it could personal though.

Just as the Hebrew people were tested through the wilderness of Sinai before reaching the Promised Land, Jesus took himself to a wilderness to be tested before announcing the Kingdom of God. To make this connection, the Gospels speak of forty days of Jesus in the wilderness. In the wilderness, Jesus our saviour was first tempted to selfishly feed himself. But his ministry is not to feed himself. Jesus is to feed the people with God's Word. Nothing else can satisfy human hunger like God's Word. The second temptation is to take power and authority over all the world. We see in Ukraine war, and every war, the craving for power and authority resulting in evil deeds and devastation. Jesus and his Kingdom are not about domination, but to fulfil God's plan of service. The third temptation is about grandstanding. Does any celebrity status make human life any fuller? A life that is great before God and people is the one prepared to minister to the lowly. The mission of life is not to be about oneself, but about the lowly, the needy and the seekers. This lent is a forty day retreat we undertake. Let us use this time to become clear headed about the mission of life. We are pilgrims walking to the fullness of life in the Kingdom of God through our ministry to the lowly humans.

DO YOU WANT TO FAST THIS LENT? In the words of Pope Francis

- * Fast from hurting words and say kind words.
- Fast from sadness and be filled with gratitude.
- * Fast from anger and be filled with patience.
- * Fast from pessimism and be filled with hope.
- * Fast from worries and have trust in God.
- * Fast from complaints and contemplate on simplicity.
- * Fast from pressures and be prayerful.
- * Fast from bitterness and fill your hearts with joy.
- * Fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others.
- * Fast from grudges and be reconciled.
- * Fast from words and be silent so you can listen.

Gospel

Lk 4:1-13

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Jesus left the Jordan and was led by the Spirit through the wilderness, being tempted there by the devil for forty days. During that time he ate nothing and at the end he was hungry. Then the devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, tell this stone to turn into a loaf.' But Jesus replied, 'Scripture says: Man does not live on bread alone.'

Then leading him to a height, the devil showed him in a moment of time all the kingdoms of the world and said to him, 'I will give you all this power and the glory of these kingdoms, for it has been committed to me and I give it to anyone I choose. Worship me, then, and it shall all be yours.' But Jesus answered him, 'Scripture says:

You must worship the Lord your God, and serve him alone.' Then he led him to Jerusalem and made him stand on the parapet of the Temple. 'If you are the Son of God', he said to him 'throw yourself down from here, for scripture says: He will put his angels in charge of you to guard you, and again: They will hold you up on their hands in case you hurt your foot against a stone.' But Jesus answered him, 'It has been said:

You must not put the Lord your God to the test.' Having exhausted all these ways of tempting him, the devil left him, to return at the appointed time.

REFLECTIONS ON LUKE 4:1-13

Scriptural context – The temptations

The three temptations Jesus faces all focus upon the nature of his mission and ministry. The first temptation is to miraculously feed himself – is his ministry to be about himself or others? The second is to take power and authority over all the world – to fulfil the human expectations of what a Messiah ought to be or fulfil God's plan of service, rather than domination? The third temptation is about grandstanding – to make a spectacular declaration of his arrival or to minister to the lowly and reveal himself in that way?

Have you thought? – The Devil

The personification of 'the devil' is sometimes difficult to contemplate. The one who tempts Jesus in the wilderness is referred to in this passage as 'the devil'. Devil is the English translation of a Greek word, diabolos. As the gospel of Luke was originally written in Greek, we can assume that diabolos was the word used. Diabolos has several meanings: the accuser; the slanderer; the one who separates. It is the purpose of the temptations to 'separate' Jesus from God and from his intended approach to his ministry. The temptations we face are often those that 'separate' us from what we know to be right.

Living the Gospel – Lent

The 40 days that Jesus spent praying and preparing in the wilderness is reflected in the season of Lent that lasts 40 days from Ash Wednesday until the day before Easter Sunday (not counting Sundays in the season). It has been traditional that during the time of Lent Christian people renew their efforts in prayer, fasting and almsgiving. All three of these practices are actions of preparation. Just as Jesus prepared for his ministry in the wilderness, so too is Lent an opportunity for us to be deliberate about our reflection on what we are called to do in this world.







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Is Ash Wednesday, a day of obligation?

The Ash Wednesday at the start of Lent and Good Friday in Easter Triduum are two days Catholics are obliged to fast and abstain from eating meat. Catholics make an attempt to attend Church on these days. Are these days obligatory for Catholics to attend Mass or Church? Contrary to the common belief, there is no obligation for the Catholics to attend Mass or Church on these days. But it is highly desirable to attend Church on these days. If these days are not, what are the days of obligation for the faithful to attend Mass?

Every Sunday of the week is to be observed as the Lord's Day. From the very beginning of the Christianity, the disciples gathered to "*Break the Bread and Share the Cup*" on Sundays. Every Sunday is a Day of obligation for the Catholics to attend Mass. There are only two other days then obligatory to attend Mass; they are the Feast of Assumption the Blessed Virgin Mary (August 15) and the Nativity of the Lord (December 25). But it will be of great spiritual benefit for you to participate in the daily Mass, if one could.

With COVID-19 a new way of participation has developed, namely "online Mass". When the Churches were closed, online was a substitute. But it always has been far from satisfactory. When we gather in the church for Mass, we as the Body of Christ are witnessing to the presence of Christ. No Mass is complete without the Holy Communion by receiving the Blessed Sacrament. Neither of these happen in the online presentation of the Mass. Therefore, watching Mass on your TV, laptop or phone is not a real participation in the Mass. Now that the churches and Masses are open to all, every faithful Catholic has an obligation to participate in Sunday Masses. You are exempt from it, if you unable to attend Church because of sickness, frailty, or some other reason. Let us come together as much as possible to join the Sunday fellowship. Now we have additional intentions to pray for. We pray for the Ukraine, the flood affected parts of our own country. You may have other personal intentions as well. Bring them to the Altar.

Let us show each other God's generosity

From a sermon by Saint Gregory Nazianzen

Recognise to whom you owe the fact that you exist, that you breathe, that you understand, that you are wise, and, above all, that you know God and hope for the kingdom of heaven and the vision of glory, now darkly as in a mirror but then with greater fullness and purity. You have been made a son of God, co-heir with Christ. Where did you get all this, and from whom?

Let me turn to what is of less importance: the visible world around us. What benefactor has enabled you to look out upon the beauty of the sky, the sun in its course, the circle of the moon, the countless number of stars, with the harmony and order that are theirs, like the music of a harp? Who has blessed you with rain, with the art of husbandry, with different kinds of food, with the arts, with houses, with laws, with states, with a life of humanity and culture, with friendship and the easy familiarity of kinship?

Who has given you dominion over animals, those that are tame and those that provide you with food? Who has made you lord and master of everything on earth? In short, who has endowed you with all that makes man superior to all other living creatures?

Is it not God who asks you now in your turn to show yourself generous above all other creatures and for the sake of all other creatures? Because we have received from him so many wonderful gifts, will we not be ashamed to refuse him this one thing only, our generosity? Though he is God and Lord he is not afraid to be known as our Father. Shall we for our part repudiate those who are our kith and kin?

Brethren and friends, let us never allow ourselves to misuse what has been given us by God's gift. If we do, we shall hear Saint Peter say: Be ashamed of yourselves for holding on to what belongs to someone else. Resolve to imitate God's justice, and no one will be poor. Let us not labour to heap up and hoard riches while others remain in need. If we do, the prophet Amos will speak out against us with sharp and threatening words: Come now, you that say: When will the new moon be over, so that we may start selling? When will the sabbath be over, so that we may start opening our treasures?

Let us put into practice the supreme and primary law of God. He sends down rain on just and sinful alike, and causes the sun to rise on all without distinction. To all earth's creatures he has given the broad earth, the springs, the rivers and the forests. He has given the air to the birds, and the waters to those who live in the water. He has given abundantly to all the basic needs of life, not as a private possession, not restricted by law, not divided by boundaries, but as common to all, amply and in rich measure. His gifts are not deficient in any way, because he wanted to give equality of blessing to equality of worth, and to show the abundance of his generosity.
