The Narrow Door of Sharing, Loving, Compassion

There is a humour about a man who died and went to hell. To his surprise he saw his parish priest there. "Father, I did not expect you here", he said. The priest shushed him, "the bishop is below us. Don't let him hear you". This cruel joke contains some biblical truth.

When asked "Lord is it true that only a few will be saved?" (Luke 13:23), Jesus said "strive to enter through the narrow door" (Luke 13:24). It made the early Christians, who were a mix of people from different cultures and places, reflect on the Jewish heritage of the Church. Majority of the Jews in Jerusalem were observant of their temple practices and laws of ritual purity. Therefore, they would have considered themselves as already in the Kingdom of God. Yet not a lot of the Jews were found among the early Church communities. Where did they go wrong? The answer is that they were not generous in living out God's goodness. While observing all the rituals of the religion to the detail, they were focussed on themselves and not concerned about others. They were not generous with the spirit of love and compassion. They did not try hard enough to enter the Kingdom of God. Mind you, this warning was not just for the Jews, but for all of us.

If any member of the Church think that going through all the motions of the sacraments and Sunday obligation will assure you a place in the Kingdom of God, think again. You might tell the Lord, "We ate and drank your company and you taught in our streets", meaning doing Churchy things; yet if you are not generous with the Spirit of God, which is love and compassion, you too could be counted to be the last by God. The Lord who sees the inner dealings of the heart will probe beyond your ritual observations in judging your religious integrity. Therefore, let us strive hard to enter through the narrow door of sharing, loving, and compassion.

What is your faith commitment? Can you say that you have chosen Jesus Christ above all other considerations?

REFLECTIONS ON LUKE 13:22-30

Scriptural context – A gospel of the least

The gospel of Luke portrays Jesus as focusing his ministry on those considered the least in society. In the Lukan version, the birth of Jesus is witnessed by lowly shepherds as opposed to the regal wise men of Matthew's version. In the parable of the Good Samaritan, it is the Samaritan outsider who responds with compassion. The Lost (Prodigal) Son is welcomed back with great rejoicing. Zacchaeus, the resented tax collector, is treated with acceptance and makes a conversion of heart. All of these stories are unique to this gospel and paint a very particular picture of a compassionate Jesus.

Gospel Focus – First and Last

'Yes, there are those now last who will be first, and those now first who will be last.' These words of Jesus carry with them a major thrust of his ministry in the gospel of Luke. Jesus reminds his audience that their status in society means nothing when it comes to their status in the kingdom of God. What will make people 'first' in the kingdom is their acceptance of Jesus' message, their faith and their compassionate actions toward others. Jesus' insistence on the inherent value of the 'last' in society must have been a constant irritant to those who considered themselves 'first'.

Living the Gospel – Consequences To be Christian is more than a name; more than a title. If we put our hand up and claim the title of Christian, then there are consequences that flow from that. Those who are disillusioned by religion frequently name hypocrisy as the major reason for their disillusionment. Sometimes, that's an easy out. We can't all live like Jesus all of the time. However, we are called to take Jesus as our model of the Christian life and to use his example as a guiding beacon. To call ourselves Christian is to try to be Christ-like in all our actions.

FEASTS & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Monday, 22 August—The Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary (Solemnity)



This feast was established by Pius XII in 1955 and was celebrated on 31 May. Since 1969 it has been observed

on 22 August to stress its relationship to the Assumption (15 August): taken up into glory, Mary became queen of heaven and earth.

Mass of the Feast at 6.45am.

Wednesday, 24 August - St Bartholomew (Memorial) Named in the list of apostles and



generally identified with Nathaniel of Cana, the "Israelite without guile" (John 1:47) who was led to Jesus by

the apostle Philip (3 May). Said to have preached the gospel in India and in Armenia, where tradition indicates he was martyred.

Mass of the Feast at 6.45am.

Saturday, 27 August - St Monica (Memorial)

Probably born at Tagaste (Algeria) about 331. Died at Ostia (Italy) in 387. Before her marriage her faith bore fruit in her recovery from a



drinking problem and later helped bring her husband and mother-in-law to Christianity. Undertook

many years of penance and prayer for her brilliant but wayward son Saint Augustine (28 August). Following his conversion and baptism in Milan, she died at the beginning of her journey home to Africa. Remembered for her parental devotion, her patience, and her persistence in prayer.

Receiving the Holy Communion

(Part 4)

St John Paul II said "The Eucharist builds the Church." (*Redemptor Hominis 20*). The Holy Communion bonds the participants into a Body of Christ (*Cf 1 Corinthians 12:13*). This week we are looking at who can receive Holy Communion.

"Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you"" (John 6:53). All those who aspire for the fullness of life, approach the Altar for Holy Communion, by eating the Body and Blood of Christ. In doing so, the communicant takes the teaching of St Paul seriously. The Apostle said, "Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be answerable for the body and blood of the Lord. Examine yourselves, and only then eat of the bread and drink of the cup. For all who eat and drink without discerning the body, eat and drink judgment against themselves" (1 Corinthians 11:27-29). Therefore we must be in a state of grace to receive the Holy Communion. The Catholic Church sets out specific guidelines regarding how we should prepare ourselves to receive the Lord's body and blood in Communion.

A person living in grave sin is not in a state of grace and he/she is not eligible to receive holy communion. The gravity of sin depends on the gravity of matter and how knowing the seriousness of it and wilfully doing it. Grave matter may include, murder, abortion, having sexual relations outside of valid marriage, depriving the vulnerable people of justice, harmful misuse of the duty of care and any other actions that are evil. St Paul lists some of the deadly sins in his letters (*Cf 1 Cor. 6:9–10 and Gal. 5:19–21*). In short anything that does not support the integrity of the family (the Domestic Church) and any deviation from the mission of bearing Christ's justice and compassion to others are grave sins that can make you undesirable for Holy Communion (*Cf Canon Law 916*). Therefore you must have been to confession since your last grave sin.



The manner of approaching the Sacrament is also important. Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches "To prepare for worthy reception of this sacrament, the faithful should observe the fast required in their Church. Bodily demeanour (gestures, clothing) ought to convey the respect, solemnity, and joy of this moment when Christ becomes our guest" (Paragraph # 1387).

Canon law states, "One who is to receive the most Holy Eucharist is to abstain from any food or drink, with the exception only of water and medicine, for at least the period of one hour before Holy Communion" (Canon 919 §1). Elderly people, those who are ill, and their caretakers are excused from the Eucharistic fast (Canon 191 §3).

Is receiving holy communion in a second Mass attended on the same day is permitted? Unless there is special reason, attending more than one Mass does not have any additional spiritual benefit. But if you are to attend the Holy Mass more than once, it is only proper to receive Holy Communion, each time (Cf Catechism of Catholic Church 1388). In fact full participation in the Eucharist requires reception of the Holy Communion.

Catholics with intellectual disabilities may be admitted to Holy Communion if they are able to distinguish the body of Christ from ordinary food, even if this recognition is evidenced through manner, gesture, or reverential silence rather than verbally.

Can an Orthodox Church member receive Holy Communion in Catholic Church? The Church's law permits Orthodox Christians to receive the Eucharist from Catholic ministers "if they seek such on their own and are properly disposed" (Cf Canon 844 § 3, Catechism of the Catholic Church para # 1399).

But with the Protestants, it is a different matter. Protestant theology may differ to the Catholic understanding of Eucharist and other Sacraments. Unlike Orthodox Churches, Protestant Churches have broken the apostolic succession in their ordination of the ministers. Because of this, they are not allowed to have Holy Communion in a Catholic Mass. But there are exceptions.

Protestants may receive the Eucharist from Catholic ministers if they are in danger of death. To receive the Eucharist under those circumstances, Protestants must "seek such on their own accord" and "manifest Catholic faith in respect to these sacraments" and be "properly disposed." In other words, in addition to being in a most grave and unusual situation, the law of the Church says that Protestants who want to receive need to believe what the Church teaches about the Eucharist — that it is the real sacramental presence of Jesus Christ, with the appearance of bread and wine.

Each time we take Holy Communion, we are aware that our partaking of the Body and Blood Christ in Eucharist binds us together as one Body of Christ, the Church.

I love because I love, I love that I may love

From a sermon of St Bernard of Clairvaux (1090-1153)

Love is sufficient of itself, it gives pleasure by itself and because of itself. It is its own merit, its own reward. Love looks for no cause outside itself, no effect beyond itself. Its profit lies in its practice. I love because I love, I love that I may love. Love is a great thing so long as it continually returns to its fountainhead, flows back to its source, always drawing from there the water which constantly replenishes it. Of all the movements, sensations and feelings of the soul, love is the only one in which the creature can respond to the Creator and make some sort of similar return however unequal it may be. For when God loves, all he desires is to be loved in return; the sole purpose of his love is to be loved, in the knowledge that those who love him are made happy by their love of him.

The Bridegroom's love, or rather the love which is the Bridegroom, asks in return nothing but faithful love. Let the beloved, then, love in return. Should not a bride love, and above all, Love's bride? Could it be that Love not be loved?

Rightly then does she give up all other feelings and give herself wholly to love alone; in giving love back, all she can do is to respond to love. And when she has poured out her whole being in love, what is that in comparison with the unceasing torrent of that original source? Clearly, lover and Love, soul and Word, bride and Bridegroom, creature and Creator do not flow with the same volume; one might as well equate a thirsty man with the fountain.

What then of the bride's hope, her aching desire, her passionate love, her confident assurance? Is all this to wilt just because she cannot match stride for stride with her giant, any more than she can vie with honey for sweetness, rival the lamb for gentleness, show herself as white as the lily, burn as bright as the sun, be equal in love with him who is Love? No. It is true that the creature loves less because she is less. But if she loves with her whole being, nothing is lacking where everything is given. To love so ardently then is to share the marriage bond; she cannot love so much and not be totally loved, and it is in the perfect union of two hearts that complete and total marriage consists. Or are we to doubt that the soul is loved by the Word first and with a greater love?
