OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE YEAR C

20 NOV 2022

Christ An Influential King



For us it is the Solemnity of Christ the King, but for the sporting world the World Cup championship competition is commencing in Qatar. With this event, Qatar, a kingdom about the size of the greater Sydney is attracting the attention of the world for more than one reason. In preparation for the World Cup, it has been transformed with a new metro, skyscrapers, highways, new Universities, museums and most of all seven new stadiums. While the kingdom wants to bathe in the glory of these achievements, the International Labour Organisation and the media expose a dark side of the development. In the nine years of building facilities, many of the media say that there were 6,500 work related deaths. Qatar has very poor human rights records and it lacks in safe working practices. Human tragedies and injustice, unlike ancient times, has become a concern for everybody. It is the Christian values that makes us concerned about injustice and related human issues. All those who have received Christ's message may not associate themselves with the Church or call themselves Christians. But the message of Christ is deep rooted in the heart and mind of most civilizations that evil against the human dignity and peace do not go unnoticed. Yes, in a sense, Jesus Christ has taken over the rule of the world. But the disciples of Jesus are to keep working on human dignity and fight against injustice to strengthen the rule of Christ. But violence is not the way to achieve it.

Jesus was unique in his fight against the evil. At a time when Jewish population tried armed fight against the evil dominion of the Roman Empire, Jesus taught that the Kingdom of God is gained through mercy and compassion. He showed how to repair the broken lives so that they can commence a new beginning with all the excitement and beauty of a new born. The joy we bring about by lifting the fallen and mending the broken is something no money can buy. In fact the ultimate meaning of life depends on our ability to reach out to the needy with mercy and compassion.

No wonder the disciples of Jesus have been reaching out to the needy always. For last two thousand years Church has been busy feeding the poor, seeking justice for the refugees and other disadvantaged, building schools, hospitals, aged care facilities, and setting up social actions programs and movements. The peace, joy, and human dignity brought about by the missionaries and the disciples of Jesus Christ are amazing. Yet many fail to see it, or may be refusing to acknowledge it.

In early twentieth century Pope Pius XI saw that the world focussed is more concerned about making money through industrial revolution then anything else. In such a situation, Communism was an attempt to stand for the poor workers, but it devalued Christ and his message. Starting in Russia in 1917 with a revolution, communism was to take hold of about one third of the world population towards the end of twentieth century. Compassion and mercy did not count in Communism. It always had been ruthless. Anticipating the disaster Communism will bring about, Pope Pius XI instituted the Feast of Christ the King. He wanted the world to know that only Christ can provide proper human dignity and fullness of life. All other ideologies will fail, and it was proved towards the end of last century.

The world at large may not be in the iron grip of Communism any more. But by and large the world, especially the western culture is focussed more on money than on human dignity. Anti-religious agendas are dominating social discussions. We need to defy it by intentionally subjecting ourselves to the wisdom, inspiration, and influence of Christ in our personal life as well as in our society. Let us share Pope Pius' hope and vision. Pius XI hoped that the feast of the Kingship of Christ may hasten the return of society to our loving Saviour."

REFLECTIONS ON LUKE 23:35-43

Historical Context – Christ the King

The Feast of Christ the King was introduced to the liturgical calendar by Pope Pius XI in 1925. The establishment of the feast took place in a world that had suffered through the First World War and was unknowingly heading towards the Second World War. In this setting, the world was experiencing a dramatic growth in secularism and an even more dramatic growth in dictators who were rising to power in various states. The introduction of the feast was a call back from the secular and a call to remember Christ as having authority above and beyond any earthly leader.

Scriptural context – Shepherds and Criminals

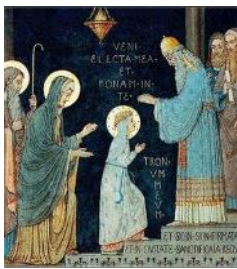
When the gospel of Mark was written The gospel of Luke is underlined by a message of hope for those who are afflicted, outcast and poor. In this gospel, the message and ministry of Jesus are directed specifically to these lowly ones. The significance of the role played by the poor is highlighted by the framing of the whole narrative in this gospel: the birth of Jesus is celebrated by shepherds and his death is accompanied by criminals. Shepherds and criminals – two classes of people on the absolute fringe of society; not dignitaries or wise men from afar – are witness to the birth and death of Jesus.

Gospel Focus – A kingdom of inclusion

In response to the criminal's faith, Jesus assures him, 'today you will be with me in paradise'. There is a certainty and immediacy about the response. Jesus does not tell him that some time in the future he will be rewarded for his faith. No, it is today that the criminal will join Jesus in paradise. It is an expression of the welcome and inclusion that Jesus has extended to the outsider and undervalued throughout his ministry. It is a clear indication that the Kingdom of God that Jesus has worked to bring about is a kingdom of inclusion and welcome.

FEASTS & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Monday, 21 November - The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary (Memorial)



This memorial originally marked the dedication of a sixth century church of the Virgin Mary near the Temple of Jerusalem. The East took it up as a celebration of Mary's presentation to God in the Temple at the age of three, a non-biblical story from the apocryphal gospel of James. Established in the West late in the Middle Ages, the feast was universally observed by the sixteenth century. It celebrates Mary in her grace-filled life, wholly given over to the Holy Spirit from the time of her conception.

Tuesday, 22 November - St Cecilia, Virgin & Martyr (Memorial)



Though a late fourth century church in Rome was named after her, nothing is known of her life or death. Popular legends were written about her in the late fifth century, and in the sixteenth century she was named the patron of music. Remembered in tradition as a virgin, martyred for the faith. Her name is included in Eucharistic Prayer I (The Roman Canon).

Mass of the Feast at 6.45am.

Thursday, 24 November - St Andrew Dung-Lac, Priest & Companions, Martyrs (Memorial)



Baptised at the age of fifteen, worked first as a lay missionary and then as a diocesan presbyter before being beheaded at Hanoi (Vietnam). Listed among 117 canonised martyrs who died in Vietnam between 1820 and 1862: ninety-six Vietnamese, eleven Spanish Dominicans, and ten presbyters from the Paris Foreign Mission Society. Remembered as representatives of the thousands of Christians tortured and martyred in Vietnam between the seventeenth and nineteenth centuries: bishops, presbyters, religious, and lay people, both children and adults.

Mass of the Feast at 6.45am.

Friday, 25 November - St Catherine of Alexandria (Memorial)



Died in Alexandria (Egypt) perhaps in the early 4th century. Nothing is known about her. The famous tenth-century legend depicts her as a well-educated noblewoman, confronting the Emperor, confounding the philosophers in debate, and collapsing the wheel upon which she was to be executed. Remembered as a heroine of the Middle Ages.

The Gospel Of Matthew Today

*A Course by Fr Thomas

Thy kingdom come From a discourse of Origen on prayer

*The coming of the kingdom of God, says our Lord and Saviour, does not admit of observation, and there will be no-one to say "Look here! Look there!" For the kingdom of God is within us and in our hearts. And so it is beyond doubt that whoever prays for the coming of the kingdom of God within himself is praying rightly, praying for the kingdom to dawn in him, bear fruit and reach perfection. For God reigns in every saint, and every saint obeys God's spiritual laws — God, who dwells in him just as he dwells in any well-ordered city. The Father is present in him and in his soul Christ reigns alongside the Father, as it is said: *We will come to him and make our dwelling with him.**

Therefore, as we continue to move forward without ceasing, the kingdom of God within us will reach its perfection in us at that moment when the saying in the Apostle is fulfilled, that Christ, his enemies all made subject to him, shall deliver *the kingdom to God the Father that God may be all in all.*

For this reason let us pray without ceasing, our souls filled by a desire made divine by the Word himself. Let us pray to our Father in heaven: *hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come.*

There is something important that we need to understand about the kingdom of God: just as *righteousness has no partnership with lawlessness, just as light has nothing in common with darkness and Christ has no agreement with Belial,* so the kingdom of God and a kingdom of sin cannot co-exist.

So if we want God to reign within us, on no account may *sin rule in our mortal body* but let us mortify our earthly bodies and let us be made fruitful by the Spirit. Then we will be a spiritual garden of Eden for God to walk in. God will rule in us with Christ who will be seated in us on the right hand of God — God, the spiritual power that we pray to receive — until he makes his enemies (who are within us) into his footstool and pours out on us all authority, all power, all strength.

This can happen to any one of us and *death, the last enemy* may be destroyed, so that in us Christ says *Death, where is your sting? Death, where is your victory?* So let our corruptibility be clothed today with holiness and incorruption. With Death dead, let our mortality be cloaked in the Father's immortality. With God ruling in us, let us be immersed in the blessings of regeneration and resurrection.
