You are the Salt and the Light



Cashless cards for poker machines is a proposal hotly debated currently in NSW. On one hand, freedom to enjoy gambling as a leisure activity is part of the human right. Clubs availing facilities and making a business out of it is providing job opportunities. The clubs share the proceeds from the pokies with charities in the form of grants. Thus, the gambling industry is not as bad as it sounds. But on the other hand, there are many very sad stories of problem gamblers becoming misfits in the society and ruining their own lives. Addiction to gambling have been causing increased poverty, homelessness, family breakups, violence, and suicides. Anyone who loves his fellow human beings cannot let this problem perpetuate. Hence a number of measures were taken, including confidential counselling facilities for those who are affected by the vice of gambling. Still the darkness and gloom surrounding the poker machines have not disappeared. Therefore, the proposed cashless cards for gaming should be evaluated on its effectiveness to promote greater hope, joy, and fullness of life. If it is helping the problem gamblers not to get out of control, it should be a welcome thing. After all, our Christian faith and charity demands such a positive response.

Jesus said, *"You are the salt of the earth. But if salt becomes tasteless, what can make it salty again? It is good for nothing, and can only be thrown out to be trampled underfoot by people. You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill-top cannot be hidden.... your light must shine in the sight of men, so that, seeing your good works, they may give the praise to your Father in heaven."* (Cf Mt 5:13-16). When it comes to the crunch of the matter, being the salt of the earth and the light to the world require proper discernment. Response to the government proposal for cashless cards for pokies is just one such example. In every social issue that affects the dignity of human life, you and I are called to discern God's will for the right response. In the face of such challenges, we cannot be recluse. We need to be actively promoting goodness. Let our lives be witness to God's goodness.

REFLECTIONS ON MATTHEW 5:13-16

Scriptural context – Following blessings

Today's gospel passage is one that is quite commonly quoted and relatively well known. When it is taken in isolation, it's very easy to forget that these words immediately follow the Beatitudes that we heard in last week's gospel. The imperative for justice in the images of salt and light of the world becomes even clearer when we remember that these words follow the blessings on those who are poor; who mourn; who are merciful and fight for justice. Jesus has blessed all these who are least in the world and then charges the disciples to be salt and light for them.

Have you thought? – Affirmation or Challenge

The salt and light of the world passage is often used to affirm and encourage, but when Jesus tells his disciples – and us – to be salt and light of the world it is not so that they can draw attention and glory to themselves. The whole purpose of being salt and light is to lead others into right relationship with one another and with God. Whilst the translation we have clearly states that disciples are to be salt and light of the world, it is just as clear that the intention is that they/we be salt and light for the world.

Scriptural context – Following blessings

Gandhi, the great leader of the Indian independence movement, is credited with saying, 'You must be the change you want to see in the world.' He sought a life free from tyranny and violence and so led a movement of non-violent resistance. It's tempting to think that he may have been influenced by some of the teachings of Jesus because so much of his approach reflected Jesus' call for justice. The charge to be the light of the world that shines in the sight of all and sets an example for all is echoed succinctly in Gandhi's words.

FEAST & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Monday, 6 February - St Paul Miki & Companions & Martyrs (Memorial)



Born in Piedmont (Italy) in 1815. Died at Turin on this day in 1888. Grew up in extreme poverty and, after ordination, devoted his whole life to educating young people, especially the poor. Founded the Society of the Sacred Childhood. Died on 5 February 1597, a group of twenty-six martyrs crucified at Nagasaki (Japan). Most were Japanese and most were laypeople, some still youths. The first of many martyrs in a young Church. Paul Miki, aged thirty-five years at his death, was a Jesuit scholastic from an aristocratic Japanese family. Remembered as a notable preacher who inspired the local Church in his own time and in

the centuries that followed to be strong in faith during persecution and isolation.

Friday, 10 February - St Scholastica (Memorial)



Born at Norcia (Italy) about 480. Died near Monte Cassino in the 540s. Like Saint Benedict (11 July), her brother and by tradition her twin, she dedicated herself to God through the monastic life. Remembered for her part in establishing Benedictine monasticism.

Let us understand the workings of God's grace

An explanation of Paul's letter to the Galatians by Saint Augustine

Paul writes to the Galatians to make them understand that by God's grace they are no longer under the law. When the Gospel was preached to them, there were some among them of Jewish origin known as circumcisers – though they called themselves Christians – who did not grasp the gift they had received. They still wanted to be under the burden of the law. Now God had imposed that burden on those who were slaves to sin and not on servants of justice. That is to say, God had given a just law to unjust men in order to show them their sin, not to take it away. For sin is taken away only by the gift of faith that works through love. The Galatians had already received this gift, but the circumcisers claimed that the Gospel would not save them unless they underwent circumcision and were willing to observe also the other traditional Jewish rites.

The Galatians, therefore, began to question Paul's preaching of the Gospel because he did not require Gentiles to follow Jewish observances as other apostles had done. Even Peter had yielded to the scandalised protests of the circumcisers. He pretended to believe that the Gospel would not save the Gentiles unless they fulfilled the burden of the law. But Paul recalled him from such dissimulation, as is shown in this very same letter. A similar issue arises in Paul's letter to the Romans, but with an evident difference. Through his letter to them, Paul was able to resolve the strife and controversy that had developed between the Jewish and Gentile converts.

In the present letter Paul is writing to persons who were profoundly influenced and disturbed by the circumcisers. The Galatians had begun to believe them and to think that Paul had not preached rightly, since he had not ordered them to be circumcised. And so the Apostle begins by saying: I am amazed that you are so quickly deserting him who called you to the glory of Christ, and turning to another gospel.

After this there comes a brief introduction to the point at issue. But remember in the very opening of the letter Paul had said that he was an apostle not from men nor by any man, a statement that does not appear in any other letter of his. He is making it quite clear that the circumcisers, for their part, are not from God but from men, and that his authority in preaching the Gospel must be considered equal to that of the other apostles. For he was called to be an apostle not from men nor by any man, but through God the Father and his Son Jesus Christ.
