Barabbas or Jesus, have your pick!

The trial of Jesus in front of Pilate the Governor should inspire you and me to a personal reflection. Pilate wants the people to make a choice between Barabbas and Jesus. "Barabbas" literally means "son of the father", presumably the Father in Heaven. Even though he bears such a beautiful name, by his own choice his life shows anything but. Here is a man who made a mockery of his name; the Gospel describes him as a criminal. He is the figure of those who are initiated to be children of God through baptism but has abandoned the Christian ways to a self-gratifying way of living. Whereas "Jesus" means "God saves". As the true

Christian ways to a self-gratifying way of living. Whereas "Jesus" means "God saves". As the true Son of the Father in heaven, Jesus is the figure of trust in God's love. Jesus never looked for his personal glory. He was here to show the Glory of the Father in Heaven. Reading the narrative of Pilate's call to choose between Barabbas and Jesus is an invitation for us to reflect on whether we are figures of God's love or only Christians by name.

In your examination of conscience, if you have found yourself chosen to favour Barabbas, this is the time to act. Make an act of contrition like Peter who wept over his denial of Jesus as his master. Peter remembered the words of Jesus, who commented on his life by predicting that he will deny Jesus three times. In reading the Bible we let the Word of God interpret our life. If, unfortunately, you too are lapsed like Peter, pray to be restored to the fellowship of Christ and to be made worthy of the promises of the Resurrection. This Holy Week liturgies are setting the mood for a Christian conversion.

REFLECTIONS ON MT 26:14 - 27:66

Scriptural context – Passion narratives

Towards the end of the 19th Century, the German scholar, Martin Kähler, described the gospels as 'passion narratives with lengthy introductions'. Over time, this description was more commonly applied to the gospel of Mark, but it is quite true of all four gospels. The passion elements are the climax of each gospel narrative and were probably written first to establish the unique interpretation of each of the gospel communities. The remainder of the gospel was written to 'set the scene' for the culmination of the message in the passion. Reading the four accounts of the passion reveal the unique styles and themes of the different gospel writers.

Different View – The Blame Game

This Passion narrative has been used in the past as justification for persecution of Jews. The text has the people of Jerusalem calling out, 'his blood be on us and on our children!' This has been interpreted (poorly) as reason to condemn all subsequent generations of Jews for the death of Jesus. However, this gospel was written in the aftermath of the fall of Jerusalem and destruction of the Temple in 70 CE. The gospel writer sought some explanation for this disaster in the story of Jesus' life and death: it is the children of the crowd at Jesus' death who suffered in the fall of Jerusalem.

Gospel Focus – Uniquely Matthew The passion narrative in the gospel of Matthew follows the gospel of Mark very closely. However, unlike in other sections of the gospel the Matthew writer has not just inserted sections from the Mark account. Rather, the material is reworked and given a unique Matthean 'flavour'. In addition, the Matthew account includes five events that are not found in the Mark account: Judas hanging himself (27:3-10); Pilate's wife's dream (27:19); Pilate's washing his hands (27:24-25); extraordinary events at the time of Jesus' death (27:51b-53); sealing and guarding the tomb (28:62-66).

The Triduum

Palm Sunday (Passion Sunday) marks the beginning of Holy Week. The latter half of Holy Week is a period of exalted liturgical celebration. Mass of the Lord's Last Supper is the start of a three days long liturgy. This three days of liturgical observance


reaches its high point in Easter Vigil, closes with evening prayer on Easter Sunday. (Ref General Instruction to Roman Missal 18,19)

During these three days though we recall the historical last supper, crucifixion, and the mystery of resurrection of the Lord, it is only as elements of one whole Liturgy. Therefore, there is no dismissal from the liturgy either on *Holy Thursday* evening or on *Good Friday*. The *Sign of the Cross* and usual greetings are omitted on *Good Friday* and at the *Vigil*.

This indicates these are three moments of the one celebration, a continuum which ends with the *Easter Alleluias*. Thus, to participate in the whole liturgy over these days we need to be there for each moment.

The Lord's Supper

The link between Eucharist and service is made on Holy Thursday. The washing of the feet shows the kind of community we are called to be. 'We pray that in this Eucharist we may find the fullness of love and life'. (*Opening prayer*). The offering of our donation to Project Compassion reflects the mission we undertake from Mass to the poor in the world.



The solemn removal and procession of the *Blessed Sacrament* leads to time for quiet adoration until midnight. The stripping of the altar sets the tone for the next stage of the *Triduum*. The first celebration of the *Triduum*, the *Celebration of the Lord's Supper* ends in silence, so the *Celebration of the Lord's Passion* begins in silence. The altar is bare, and the reserved Blessed Sacrament has been removed. The second part is about to begin.



Celebration of the Lord's Passion, Good Friday

Silently the ministers enter and use the ancient gesture of 'prostrate prayer'. The community join in the silent stillness of the gesture preparing to listen to the word from *Isaiah* and *Hebrews*, then the passion account. An ancient form of the *General Intercessions* concludes the *Liturgy of the Word*.

The final part of the celebration is the distribution of *Holy Communion*. Following the *Prayer after Communion* there is a prayer over the people sending us out 'in the sure hope of the Resurrection.' The silent departure of

the priest and people is an indication that we are in the middle of the *Triduum* and are being sent away for reflection and so to engage completely in the *Easter Vigil* on the following evening.

Easter Vigil

The Easter Vigil is the high point of the *Triduum*. Our faith would not have any meaning without the mystery of Resurrection. Therefore, the Lord's resurrection becomes the most important feast in Christian Calendar. After a day's silence before the empty tabernacle in her place of worship, the Church emerges with thrilling joy on Easter vigil. The new life Christ has brought to us is celebrated with the blessing of fire, and Easter water for baptism. A solemn singing of praises to Christ our Light is sung on this night.

Adults preparing for admission into the Church are baptised and received into the church at the vigil celebration. David Phillips and Ekaterina (Katy) Korolkova will be baptised at vigil this year. Also, Nancy Manalatas and Mark Bader will be receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation at the Easter Vigil.

All are invited to a supper in the Jubilee Hall after Easter Vigil Celebrations to celebrate the initiation of the newest members of our faith Family. You are welcome to bring some food to share at supper with others. The joy of Easter is continued to be celebrated on Easter Sunday.

From the discourse "On the Palm Branches" by Saint Andrew of Crete

Let us go together to meet Christ on the Mount of Olives. Today he returns from Bethany and proceeds of his own free will towards his holy and blessed passion, to consummate the mystery of our salvation. He who came down from heaven to raise us from the depths of sin, to raise us with himself, we are told in Scripture, *above every sovereignty, authority and power, and every other name that can be named*, now comes of his own free will to make his journey to Jerusalem. He comes without pomp or ostentation. As the psalmist says: *He will not dispute or raise his voice to make it heard in the streets*. He will be meek and humble, and he will make his entry in simplicity.

Let us run to accompany him as he hastens towards his passion, and imitate those who met him then, not by covering his path with garments, olive branches or palms, but by doing all we can to prostrate ourselves before him by being humble and by trying to live as he would wish. Then we shall be able to receive the Word at his coming, and God, whom no limits can contain, will be within us.

In his humility Christ entered the dark regions of our fallen world and he is glad that he became so humble for our sake, glad that he came and lived among us and shared in our nature in order to raise us up again to himself. And even though we are told that he has now ascended above the highest heavens – the proof, surely, of his power and godhead – his love for man will never rest until he has raised our earthbound nature from glory to glory, and made it one with his own in heaven.

So let us spread before his feet, not garments or soulless olive branches, which delight the eye for a few hours and then wither, but ourselves, clothed in his grace, or rather, clothed completely in him. We who have been baptized into Christ must ourselves be the garments that we spread before him. Now that the crimson stains of our sins have been washed away in the saving waters of baptism and we have become white as pure wool, let us present the conqueror of death, not with mere branches of palms but with the real rewards of his victory. Let our souls take the place of the welcoming branches as we join today in the children's holy song: *Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Blessed is the king of Israel*.
