Are you with 'Leaf People' or 'Branch People'

In this winter we see many trees with bare branches after having shed the leaves. Before shedding them, the leaves turned very colourful, attracting everyone's attention, the social media gets filled with autumn colours. Yet it is not those colourful leaves but the branches that will survive the winter. Unlike the leaves, the bare branches eventually go on to produce new leaves and fruits. It is a good parable for human life. There are people who are like the autumn leaves, colourful and attractive. But their celebrity status is precarious. Come harsh tests of life, they fall away. Whereas there are people who are like branches, who do not live on the admiration of the world yet can endure any harsh tests of life. The only thing that can fail them is to be cut off from the trunk of the tree. Just as branches can produce new leaves and fruits these people are also full of real life. Whereas the 'leaf people' though can be good show-offs, cannot produce fruits of real life. That is because, unlike branches, they do not contain any qualities of stem in them.

The Body and Blood of Christ is a great gift we have from God that helps us to be 'branch people'. Through the sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ we connect intimately with the stem, Jesus Christ, for the life sap. People who have come into a union with Christ through the Eucharist are able to withstand the tests and hardships of life. Their lives bear goodness for themselves and others like shade giving leaves and good fruits generated by healthy branches. Just as the qualities of the branches share the qualities of the stem, we through our intimacy with Jesus share the qualities of the risen Christ. Jesus said, "He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I live in him." (Jn 6:54).

Now ask yourself whether you are with 'branch people' or with 'leaf people'.

This faith to Christian men is given – Bread is made flesh by words from heaven:

Into his blood the wine is turned: What though it baffles nature's powers Of sense and sight? This faith of ours Proves more than nature e'er discerned.

Concealed beneath the two-fold sign, Meet symbols of the gifts divine, There lie the mysteries adored: The living body is our food; Our drink the ever-precious blood; In each, one undivided Lord.

Not he that eateth it divides
The sacred food, which whole abides
Unbroken still, nor knows decay;
Be one, or be a thousand fed,
They eat alike that living bread
Which, still received, ne'er wastes away.

The good, the guilty share therein, With sure increase of grace or sin, The ghostly life, or ghostly death: Death to the guilty; to the good Immortal life. See how one food Man's joy or woe accomplisheth. We break the Sacrament; but bold

And firm thy faith shall keep its hold; Deem not the whole doth more enfold Than in the fractured part resides: Deem not that Christ doth broken lie; 'Tis but the sign that meets the eye; The hidden deep reality In all its fullness still abides.

Behold the bread of angels, sent For pilgrims in their banishment, The bread for God's true children meant, That may not unto dogs be given: Oft in the olden types foreshadowed; In Isaac on the altar bowed, And in the ancient paschal food, And in the manna sent from heaven.

Come then, good shepherd, bread divine, Still show to us thy mercy sign; Oh, feed us still, still keep us thine; So may we see thy glories shine In fields of immortality;

REFLECTIONS ON JOHN 6:51-58

Scriptural context - Eucharist in Scripture

The gospel of John does not include any account of Jesus taking bread and wine and urging the disciples to 'do this in memory of me'. The three synoptic gospels, however, all feature these actions and words, as does Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, which predates all of the gospels. Rather than using these words of institution, the gospel of John includes an entire chapter much earlier in the gospel in which Jesus theologises about the image of himself as the Bread of Life. It is this discourse, more than the Last Supper accounts, that provides much of the theological understanding of Eucharist.

Living the Gospel

Meals are very important events. Not only do we physically need food and drink to keep ourselves alive, but we use meals to mark occasions and celebrate events: birthdays; weddings; dates; achievements; disappointments; reunions. There is a sacredness about gathering with friends and family and sharing a meal together. Stories are told; memories shared; the food is appreciated and more often than not there's a drink to accompany the meal. Treating such occasions with gratitude – as blessed moments of grace – is living out the Eucharistic reality of welcoming Jesus into our lives and seeking to be more like him.

Gospel Focus – Real Presence

In the gospel passage, Jesus speaks a number of times about his followers eating his flesh and drinking his blood; 'For my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink.' In the Eucharist, we celebrate the 'real presence' of Jesus, understanding that bread and wine is changed into the body and blood of Christ. This change does not occur in a physical, observable way. The Church teaches that the 'substance' of bread and wine (what makes them bread and wine in essence) is changed but not the physical attributes. This is known as 'transubstantiation' – change of substance.

FEAST & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Tuesday, 13 June - St Anthony of Padua (Memorial)



Born in Lisbon (Portugal) in 1195. Died at Padua (Italy) on this day in 1231. At first an Augustinian priest and scholar, then became a Franciscan to do missionary work in north Africa but this was thwarted by illness. Instead, he became a teacher of theology and a brilliant popular

preacher in southern France and Italy. Remembered and loved as an inspired preacher, a servant of the poor, and a *(Memorial)* worker of miracles.

Sacred Heart, encouraged by medieval mystics and promoted by St Gertrude, St Margaret, Mary Alacoque, St John Eudes and others, represents a devotion to Jesus in his human nature, in particular referring to the heart as the seat of the emotions. Traditionally, school kids make contribution to St Vincent de Paul to observe this feast.

The Feast of Corpus Christi

St Thomas Aquinas

Since it was the will of God's only-begotten Son that men should share in his divinity, he assumed our nature in order that by becoming man he might make men gods. Moreover, when he took our flesh he dedicated the whole of its substance to our salvation. He offered his body to God the Father on the altar of the cross as a sacrifice for our reconciliation. He shed his blood for our ransom and purification, so that we might be redeemed from our wretched state of bondage and cleansed from all sin. But to ensure that the memory of so great a gift would abide with us for ever, he left his body as food and his blood as drink for the faithful to consume in the form of bread and wine.

O precious and wonderful banquet, that brings us salvation and contains all sweetness! Could anything be of more intrinsic value? Under the old law it was the flesh of calves and goats that was offered, but here Christ himself, the true God, is set before us as our food. What could be more wonderful than this? No other sacrament has greater healing power; through it sins are purged away, virtues are increased, and the soul is enriched with an abundance of every spiritual gift. It is offered in the Church for the living and the dead, so that what was instituted for the salvation of all may be for the benefit of all. Yet, in the end, no one can fully express the sweetness of this sacrament, in which spiritual delight is tasted at its very source, and in which we renew the memory of that surpassing love for us which Christ revealed in his passion.

It was to impress the vastness of this love more firmly upon the hearts of the faithful that our Lord instituted this sacrament at the Last Supper. As he was on the point of leaving the world to go to the Father, after celebrating the Passover with his disciples, he left it as a perpetual memorial of his passion. It was the fulfilment of ancient figures and the greatest of all his miracles, while for those who were to experience the sorrow of his departure, it was destined to be a unique and abiding consolation.

Church Roof Work

OOSH at SJW Auburn South

Sydney Catholic Early Childhood Services have started a new OOSH services at Auburn South. It provides before school care 6.30AM–9AM Monday – Friday; and after school care 2PM–6.30PM Monday to Friday; and vacation care 6.30AM–6.30PM Monday to Friday. Though the location of the service is at the SJW school premises, for the benefit of both parishes, the plan was to provide transportation from Regents Park for SPC families. As per now there are only a couple of children from Regents Park have registered. Therefore, the transportation facility from SPC School premises will not be commencing till January 2024.
