Call to be a Shepherd

Ukraine war, like any other war, is all about dominion over people and territory. So is the internal conflict in Sudan of which we hear terrible stories of atrocities. China is accused of using debt trap to expand its control over countries and their trade. All these cases fall in one category - fight for dominion. Imperial world of the old was no different. Roman Empire of Biblical times maintained its superiority by force and intimidation. In such bleakness, Jewish hope was that a Messiah will come to liberate them from the evil domains. At the time of Moses, God made a covenant with Israelites to be his people. The lived experience of the Israelites at Jesus' time was far from the security and freedom they initially enjoyed. They craved to be gathered as God's people once again, like Moses did. Some enthusiasts from among them fought unsuccessfully the Romans to establish the domain of God. In this situation, Jesus announces the regathering of the scattered tribes of Israel.

When Jesus says, "they were harassed and dejected, like sheep without a shepherd", he was reflecting the aspiration of the Israel for a Messiah, a Saviour. Then the Gospel goes on to name twelve apostles, called and commissioned by Jesus, to indicate that Our Lord has re-established the People of God. Nobody is called to take up arms and fight any worldly powers. God's domain is re-established through love, compassion and service. It is like a shepherd tendering his sheep, not like a warrior fighting an evil enemy.

People all over the world are thirsting for God's rule. The harvest is rich. There are plenty of opportunities for you and I to work for God's domain. We don't do it through proselytization, but by serving people in their needs, curing the sick, raising the spirit of those live like dead people, helping the outcasts regain their dignity, and by casting out the evil influences on our brothers and sisters. We are not talking about any job undertaking for monetary benefit, but voluntary service as a way of life. You and I, in fact all Christians, are commissioned by the Lord to a life of service so that God's domain will prevail for all people.

to make us righteous, is it likely that he would now fail to save us from God's anger? When we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, we were still enemies; now that we have been reconciled surely we may count on being saved by the life of his Son? Not merely because we have been reconciled but because we are filled with joyful trust in God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have already gained our reconciliation.

When Jesus saw the crowds he felt sorry for them because they were harassed and dejected, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, 'The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest.'

He summoned his twelve disciples, and gave them authority over unclean spirits with power to cast them out and to cure all kinds of diseases and sickness.

These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon who is called Peter, and his brother Andrew; James the son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas, and Matthew the tax collector; James the son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; Simon the Zealot and Judas Iscariot, the one who was to betray him. These twelve Jesus sent out, instructing them as follows:

'Do not turn your steps to pagan territory, and do not enter any Samaritan town; go rather to the lost sheep of the House of Israel. And as you go, proclaim that the kingdom of heaven is close at hand. Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out devils. You received without charge, give without charge.'

REFLECTIONS ON MATTHEW 9:36-10:8

Scriptural context – The House of Israel

The gospel passage has Jesus telling his newly commissioned Israel, not to go to Samaritans or into pagan territory; the ministry of the apostles is only to be addressed to Jews. But this is the first part of a two-phase ministry. At the conclusion of the gospel, the Risen Jesus directs his followers to 'make disciples of all the nations'. For the Matthew community, (unlike the community of Luke) it was the House of Israel that needed renewal first before the message of Jesus could be taken to gentile and pagan communities.

Have you thought? - The labourers are few

This passage is often used as the basis for sermons, conversations apostles to go only to the House of or even marketing about vocations vocations to religious life as well as lay vocations. The image of a rich harvest with not enough labourers to reap the harvest is a powerful one. In the Western world in particular today it is very true of priestly and religious vocations. However, it is equally true of lay vocations. Too few people are prepared to 'own' their faith and live the message of the gospel in their day to day work and interactions with others. In what way are you a labourer in the harvest?

Living the Gospel – Apostles, not disciples

There is a lovely distinction in this gospel passage between disciples and apostles. Jesus calls his twelve disciples, commissions them and sends them out to continue his work. From then on, they are referred to as 'apostles'. Disciples are followers, but apostles have been sent out. In our own lives we are called to accept the challenge of being apostles, not disciples. For we are not just followers, we have been sent out by Jesus to continue his work. To be a disciple is just the first step. Disciples follow a path; apostles take the initiative and forge their own path.

FEAST & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Wednesday, 21 June - St Aloysius Gonzaga (Memorial)



Born in Lombardy (Italy) in 1568. Died in Rome on this day in 1591 of the plague, contracted while caring for its victims. Devout and ascetical from the time of his childhood in a family of Italian nobility. Pursued a religious vocation as a Jesuit against enormous

family opposition. Remembered for his youthful ideal of perfection and his determination to achieve it.

Thursday, 22 June - Sts John Fisher & Thomas More (Memorial)



John Fisher: Born at Beverley (England) in 1469. Died at London on this day in 1535. Chancellor at Cambridge and bishop at Rochester, combining diligent pastoral ministry with the defence of Catholic doctrine.

Thomas More: Born in London in 1478. Died there for the faith on 6 July 1535. An

Oxford scholar, a noted humanist and apologist, an incorruptible judge and Lord Chancellor, a devoted husband and loving father.

Drawn into conflict with Henry VIII, both were imprisoned and beheaded for treason. Remembered for their wide learning, for their devotion to the Church, and for their uncompromising integrity and courage. An opportunity to celebrate all the English martyrs, Catholic and Protestant, of the Reformation era. Coming from every walk of life, people rich and poor, married and single, women and men died on the scaffold, perished in prison, or suffered harsh persecution for their faith.

Saturday, 24 June - The Nativity of St John the Baptist (Solemnity)



This feast was observed on this date in the fourth century. It celebrates the holy birth of "the greatest of all the prophets," the one who leapt for joy in his mother's womb, who prepared the way for Christ, announced his presence, and baptised him

in the Jordan River.

Prayer comes from a humble heart

St Cyprian's treatise on the Lord's Prayer

Let our speech and our petition be kept under discipline when we pray, and let us preserve quietness and modesty – for, remember, we are standing in God's sight. We must please God's eyes both with the movements of our body and with the way we use our voices. For just as a shameless man will be noisy with his cries, so it is fitting for the modest to pray in a moderate way. Furthermore, the Lord has taught us to pray in secret, in hidden and remote places, in our own bed-chambers – and this is most suitable for faith, since it shows us that God is everywhere and hears and sees everything, and in the fullness of his majesty is present even in hidden and secret places, as it is written *I am a God close at hand and not a God far off. If a man hides himself in secret places, will I not see him? Do I not fill the whole of heaven and earth?*, and, again, *The eyes of God are everywhere, they see good and evil alike*.

When we meet together with the brethren in one place, and celebrate divine sacrifices with God's priest, we should remember our modesty and discipline, not to broadcast our prayers at the tops of our voices, nor to throw before God, with undisciplined long-windedness, a petition that would be better made with more modesty: for after all God does not listen to the voice but to the heart, and he who sees our thoughts should not be pestered by our voices, as the Lord proves when he says: Why do you think evil in your hearts? – or again, All the churches shall know that it is I who test your motives and your thoughts.

In the first book of the Kings, Hannah, who is a type of the Church, observes that she prays to God not with loud petitions but silently and modestly within the very recesses of her heart. She spoke with hidden prayer but with manifest faith. She spoke not with her voice but with her heart, because she knew that that is how God hears, and she received what she sought because she asked for it with belief. The divine Scripture asserts this when it says: *She spoke in her heart, and her lips moved, and her voice was not audible; and God listened to her.* And we read in the Psalms: *Speak in your hearts and in your beds, and be pierced.* Again, the Holy Spirit teaches the same things through Jeremiah, saying: *But it is in the heart that you should be worshipped, O Lord.*

Beloved brethren, let the worshipper not forget how the publican prayed with the Pharisee in the temple – not with his eyes boldly raised up to heaven, nor with hands held up in pride; but beating his breast and confessing the sins within, he implored the help of the divine mercy. While the Pharisee was pleased with himself, it was the publican who deserved to be sanctified, since he placed his hope of salvation not in his confidence of innocence – since no-one is innocent – but he prayed, humbly confessing his sins, and he who pardons the humble heard his prayer.
