Your Faith Your Strength

Manipur state of India is burning with violence now. Taking advantage of the conflict between Meitei and Kuki people, Hindus are attacking Christians and burning churches. At least 80 Christians have been reported killed since the violence started on 3rd of May. (The real number may be higher). To make things worse, the Prime Minister of India has not said a thing until now though the persecution is continuing. The same Prime Minister was complaining about the lack of religious freedom for Hindus in USA. In this bleak political situation and physical persecution what do you think would be the response of the Manipuri Christians?

"We believe that God is with us in this battle," says a local Kuki believer. "Though the churches don't function as normal, the church is open for the believers to come and pray, and many believers are praying. We believe that the prayers from Christians all over the world have kept the tribal believers safe until now. Pray with us that God will strengthen Christians to be on their knees to pray and seek God."

The steadfastness of their faith amid such an adversity is simply inspirational! They trust in the Gospel words, "Do not be afraid. For everything that is now covered will be uncovered." Our Lord said, "Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell." (Mt 10:26, 28). Ask yourself whether your faith is strong enough to believe in the Gospel promises, as the persecuted Christians demonstrate.

Loss of faith in Jesus makes a person sinful, which no faithful would want. Out of our frail human nature, we all fail in our love for one another and for God. Sometimes it may even lead to doing evil things. That makes us, all of us, sinners. God forgives sinners. But when you turn your back to God, showing no trust and faith in Jesus, you become sinful. Even God cannot forgive sinfulness. Such outright rejection of the love of God will end up in eternal damnation. May the love of God help you to face any challenges the world might throw at you, even persecutions and lead you to the fruits of the Kingdom of God, peace, joy and fellowship. Your faith is your strength.

'Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell. Can you not buy two sparrows for a penny? And yet not one falls to the ground without your Father knowing. Why, every hair on your head has been counted. So there is no need to be afraid; you are worth more than hundreds of sparrows.

REFLECTIONS ON MATTHEW 10:26-33

Gospel Focus - Fear

When scripture uses the term fear, it tends to fall into one of two meanings. When used in the context of 'do not be afraid' or 'fear not', it is a command to not be daunted by the woes and trials that the world imposes. The other use tends to be a command that we should fear God. In this context, the word does not mean to be frightened of God but rather to show proper reverence. To fear God is to stand in wonder and awe rather than to cower and hide. So, fear God, but do not be afraid!

Living the Gospel – From the house-tops

One of the messages of Jesus to his disciples and, through him, of Matthew to the original community, is to have courage and to have pride in their belief. No matter what threat or persecution they are to endure, the command is to proclaim the message of Jesus from the housetops. They are to be proud of what they believe and be prepared to share it with others. In a world today that is not always open to the message of Jesus, we too are called to be proud of what we believe and not whisper it in the darkness.

Scriptural context – The Q source

This gospel passage that appears at Mt 10:26-33 is virtually reproduced in the gospel of Luke (12:2-12) but does not appear in the gospel of Mark. Both the gospels of Matthew and Luke draw extensively on the gospel of Mark as a source for their writing but scholars have also deduced that they shared another unknown source. The content of this lost source can only be deduced by the identification of parallel passages such as this one that appear in Matthew and Luke but not Mark. The undiscovered document is known as the 'Q source' after the German word, Quelle (source).

FEAST & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Wednesday, 28 June - St Irenaeus (Memorial)



Born probably at Smyrna (Turkey) about 130. Died at Lyons (France) about 200. A pupil of Saint Polycarp (23 February) who became a presbyter and bishop of Lyons, the principal city of Gaul. Intervened in Rome for patience and reconciliation in

Church disputes. Among the first theologians of the Western Church, he refuted gnosticism and further developed the theology of the incarnation. Remembered for his fidelity to apostolic tradition and traditionally venerated as a martyr.

Mass of the Feast at 6.45am.

Thursday, 29 June - Sts Peter & Paul (Solemnity)



Died as martyrs at Rome under Nero, between 64-67. This pre-eminent feast day of the city of Rome has been observed on this date since the mid-third century. It commemorates the martyrdoms of Peter the "chief of the apostles" and Paul the "apostle to the Gentiles".

Remembered for their faith, their courage, and their leadership during the difficult days of the birth of the Church.

Mass of the Feast at 6.45am.

Alpha is just the beginning. Once guests experience Alpha, they understand who Jesus is and can start to explore their relationship with him."



The Christian is another Christ

A treatise on Christian Perfection by St Gregory of Nyssa

More than anyone, St Paul understood who Christ is and those requirements needed by the person named after him. Paul spoke of what he himself had accomplished and accurately imitated him in a manner to show the Lord expressed in his own person. By careful imitation Paul became a model so that it is no longer he who is perceived as living and speaking, but Christ who lives in him. Knowing his own blessings, that good man said *You seek proof that Christ is speaking in me* and, elsewhere, *It is no longer I who live but Christ who lives in me*.

Paul's words show us the significance of Christ's name, when he said that Christ is the power and wisdom of God. But he also called Christ: peace; the inaccessible light where God dwells; our sanctification and redemption; the great high priest; our Passover and our sacrifice of expiation; the brightness of glory; the very image of God's substance; the creator of the ages; our spiritual food and drink; the rock and the water; the foundation of faith; the chief cornerstone; the image of the great and invisible God; the head of his body, the Church; the first-born of the new creation and the first-fruits of those who have fallen asleep; the first-born from the dead, the first-born among many brothers; the mediator between God and man; the only-begotten Son crowned with honour and glory; the Lord of glory; the beginning of all things; the King of justice, but not only of justice but also the King of peace and the King of all things, the King whose kingdom is boundless.

Paul gave all these names to Christ and many others too: so many that they cannot easily be counted. But they are all related, and if you understand the meaning of each of them on its own and put those meanings together then you will come to understand the full meaning of that one word "Christ" and that will show you – as far as the human soul is able to comprehend it – God's inexpressible greatness.

The good Lord has granted us the privilege of sharing in this, the greatest, most divine and chief of all names, so that, honoured by the name of Christ, we are called "Christians." So then we must ensure that in us are seen all the meanings of the name of Christ, so that our title is not false and meaningless but is borne out by our lives.
