

I WILL GIVE YOU REST





Once, John, a reformed alcoholic expressed his willingness to help other addicts. Therefore, I referred him to someone who had a terrible drinking problem. John, after studying the case, told me that the client is not broken enough to be helped. The alcoholic will have to hit rock bottom before he admits that things are beyond his control. That's when he could be helped. Brokenness in life makes it easy to realise the futility of relying on wealth and riches. It also helps to realise how gracious God is. Someone who is totally broken would be totally dependent on God like a child clinging to mum. Clinging to Jesus like a child with total trust is the kind of faith we need.



With childlike submission to Jesus, the Word of God will not be a burden for you, but a delightful experience. Like a child cherishing the words coming out of its mum's mouth, he would find joy in the words of Jesus. Yoke in the Bible is a metaphor for the Law of Moses or the religious precepts. The Mosaic Law taught what the People of God should not be doing. They were restrictive. But Jesus' teachings were liberating. The Lord taught how to employ the Love of God and neighbour to greater satisfaction in life. Loving God and neighbour is not a burden, but joyful and peaceful. Real faith is personal like a Father—Son relationship; where there is total trust, and the disciplines are not burdensome. Having entered in such a personal

relationship with God, Jesus will give us 'rest'. It is a 'rest' like the rest of God in the book of Genesis. God who created the world. After each day's creation God found them good. At the end of all creation God rested on the seventh day with a sense of accomplishment. Similarly, if you trust Jesus and depend on him to recreate your life from whatever brokenness you may have, you will be able to rest with a sense of joy and accomplishment. Let this good news be the guide for your life.

REFLECTIONS ON MATTHEW 11:25-30

Historical Context – Jewish education

Education in Galilee at the time of Jesus invites us to shoulder his Jesus was highly valued. From the age of five, all boys and girls studied to memorise in totality the five books of the Torah (the first five books of the Bible). This period of study was called Beth Sefer. From about 10-14 they continued studying and memorising the remaining books of scripture (Beth Talmud). From about 14 or 15, only the very best students would enter Beth Midrash and apply to a rabbi to become his talmid – disciple – and seek to take on that rabbi's yoke.

Living the Gospel – Shoulder my voke

voke and learn from him for he is gentle and humble in heart. The yoke he invites us to shoulder is the deceptively simple teaching: love God and love your neighbour. To love God is to consciously make a place in our lives for God. The busy spin that tends to be characteristic of so many people's lives today does not allow room for God; does not allow room for prayer and quiet; does not allow room for compassionate response to others. To love God and love our neighbour we must first make room for them.

Have you thought? Thank God! Jesus' quite intimate words to the Father in today's passage carry with them an enormous amount of relief and perhaps released frustration. It is almost a cry of 'Thank God!' for his disciples have finally 'got it'. Jesus blesses the Father for revealing the truth to these simple men whom Jesus had chosen to follow him. The men Jesus chose as disciples were not following another rabbi and so had not been the very best students from their village. They had the education of most children but nothing more – otherwise they would have been following someone else!

FEAST & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Tuesday, 11 July - St Benedict, Abbot (Memorial)



St Benedict was born at Nursia in c.480, the brother of St Scholastica. Most of what is known of his life comes from St Gregory the Great's writings. He left his studies in Rome to become a hermit in the mountains near Subiaco, and after a while many followers joined him. It is believed that some monks tried to poison him, possibly out of jealousy or due to his strict discipline. He moved to Monte Cassino, where he completed his Rule; a written guide for those living a monastic life, with a strong emphasis on obedience, moderation and community life. Although Benedict never became a priest or ever intended to found a religious order, his Rule became the fundamental monastic code in Europe and is still observed by many religious orders throughout the world.

Fr Josh Arrives On 11 August



A sacrifice to God is a contrite spirit

From a sermon by Saint Augustine

I acknowledge my transgression, says David. If I admit my fault, then you will pardon it. Let us never assume that if we live good lives we will be without sin; our lives should be praised only when we continue to beg for pardon. But men are hopeless creatures, and the less they concentrate on their own sins, the more interested they become in the sins of others. They seek to criticise, not to correct. Unable to excuse themselves, they are ready to accuse others. This was not the way that David showed us how to pray and make amends to God, when he said: I acknowledge my transgression, and my sin is ever before me. He did not concentrate on others' sins; he turned his thoughts on himself. He did not merely stroke the surface, but he plunged inside and went deep down within himself. He did not spare himself, and therefore was not impudent in asking to be spared.

Do you want God to be appeased? Learn what you are to do that God may be pleased with you. Consider the psalm again: If you wanted sacrifice, I would indeed have given it; in burnt offerings you will take no delight. Are you then to be without sacrifice? Are you to offer nothing? Will you please God without an offering? Consider what you read in the same psalm: If you wanted sacrifice, I would indeed have given it; in burnt offerings you will take no delight. But continue to listen, and say with David: A sacrifice to God is a contrite spirit; God does not despise a contrite and humble heart. Cast aside your former offerings, for now you have found out what you are to offer. In the days of your fathers you would have made offerings of cattle – these were the sacrifices. If you wanted sacrifice, I would indeed have given it. These then, Lord, you do not want, and yet you do want sacrifice.

You will take no delight in burnt offerings, David says. If you will not take delight in burnt offerings, will you remain without sacrifice? Not at all. A sacrifice to God is a contrite spirit; God does not despise a contrite and humble heart.

You now have the offering you are to make. No need to examine the herd, no need to outfit ships and travel to the most remote provinces in search of incense. Search within your heart for what is pleasing to God. Your heart must be crushed. Are you afraid that it might perish so? You have the reply: *Create a clean heart in me, O God.* For a clean heart to be created, the unclean one must be crushed.

We should be displeased with ourselves when we commit sin, for sin is displeasing to God. Sinful though we are, let us at least be like God in this, that we are displeased at what displeases him. In some measure then you will be in harmony with God's will, because you find displeasing in yourself what is abhorrent to your Creator.
